### MISS TRAVIS MAY RETURN HOME

ST. JOHN, March 8.—Mr. Henry S. Culver, United States Consul, St. John, received word from the State Department, Washington, today that is of interest to many residents of the province. Under date of Feb. 4, the American Ambassador at Vienna reported that he had been advised that the hospital at Nishi, where Dr. Catherine Travis has been located, is to be closed. In consequence she may, perhaps, come to America, unless she decides to assist in the American Red Cross work now operating in Northern Serbia and Albania.

(Reports to American papers on Monday announced that Bulgaria is likely to dispense with the services of all American Red Cross nurses and said that some of them were having a difficult and unpleasant time. Dr. Travis was not among those mentioned in connection.—Globe.)

### MUST SECURE A PERMIT TO ENTER SUEZ CANAL AREA

CAIRO, Egypt, March 6.—Egypt is still very much in the dark as to what is going on along its frontier. Rumors of the most sensational kind are circulated, but there can be no doubt that the military authorities are running no risks as far as the defense of the Canal is concerned.

The Canal Zone was long ago made a restricted area in the most restricted military sense. Any person desiring to travel by railway to any station within the Canal zone is required to obtain a special permit, which is only obtained after searching inquiries on the part of the military officials. The permit may be either temporary—for one trip only—or permanent—for such as require to pay frequent visits to Port Said or Suez for business reasons. Any permit is revocable on the instant at the will of the officials.

In the case of foreigners application must first be made to the proper consular authority, which is then forwarded to the Public Security Department for investigation. Before returning from any place in the Canal Zone, the traveller must obtain a permit, properly stamped by the Governor of Port Said or Suez or the Mayor of Ismailia. Similar restrictions apply to persons residing within the Canal Zone and desirous of travelling to any station outside of it.

In many ways the Canal Zone is ideal for defensive purposes. The railway runs along the west bank of the Canal from Port Said for sixty or seventy miles. There has been intense activity throughout the entire canal belt throughout the winter.

### YACHTSMEN STILL AWAIT INSTRUCTIONS.

OTTAWA, Ont., March 6.—Some surprise is manifested over the situation in connection with the auxiliary patrol service. Some time ago the British admiralty asked the Canadian government to supply a number of experienced motor boat men for the

patrol service. And in accordance with this view publicity was given to the request. The result was that some hundreds of Canadian yachtsmen volunteered for the service.

A representative of the British Admiralty was announced would come to Canada and examine the volunteers as to their abilities and experience but he has not yet arrived and there is no information as to when he will arrive. The matter is therefore at a standstill and both the naval service department and the volunteers are awaiting instructions.

### CANADIAN DIES SUDDENLY IN NEW YORK

NEW YORK, March 9.—Charles Alexandre Chauveau, son of the first premier of Quebec after Confederation, and a former member of the Canadian judiciary, died suddenly on a pier here yesterday, soon after landing, with his wife, from the steamship Saratoga, from Havana. Arrangements were made to send the body to Quebec.
