TORONTO, Nov. 13.—Local military men are inclined to discredit the report from Winnipeg that the British army reservists have been notified to hold themselves in readiness for immediate mobilization. No notification was received by the reservists here who number between forty and fifty.

## STEAMER LOST IN BARRY'S BAY

(Canadian Press) EDINBURGH, Nov. 12.—A report has been received of the loss of a steamer on Madawaska River, Barry's Bay. There were 14 people on board all of whom are reported drowned.

## ROB WORCESTER HOME OF JEWELS.

WORCESTER, Nov. 12.—Jewelry valued at \$5,000 was stolen from the home of John C. MacInnes, head of one of Worcester's largest department stores, when the family was out.

## TWO WERE KILLED AND SEVERAL INJURED.

WAIHI, New Zealand, Nov. 12.—A Constable and a citizen were shot and killed and several persons injured some mortally in a strike riot here today maddened by the taunts of strikers a body of non-union workers marched to the Union Hall, burst open the door and rushed on the occupants. A fierce battle ensued during which revolvers were freely used. Police rushed to the scene, but after the riot was quelled a mob of free workers chased some strikers, severely beating them. The strike at the Waihi gold mine has been in progress for some time. The men asked for better pay and shorter hours.

## KILLED IN RUNAWAY.

HAMILTON, Ont., Nov. 12.—Mrs. S. T. Mitchell and her six-year-old daughter, of Flamboro Centre, were killed in a runaway accident on the treacherous Valley Inn hill last evening. A Grand Trunk Railway train going east, frightened the horse, which dashed down the hill till it reached a sharp turn, where its course was turned by the efforts of E. W. Steadman and A. Hilden, insurance agents. The vehicle crashed into a shed as the result of the swerving, and the occupants were thrown out. The child's neck was broken and the mother's skull fractured.

## MARRIAGE LAW CASE TO COME BEFORE HOUSE.

OTTAWA, Nov. 12.—J. P. Burnham, M. P., for Peterboro, has already sent in the order paper during the approaching session a question which indicates that the marriage law dispute is to figure in Parliament. It reads: (1) What portions of Canada are solely under Federal control and jurisdiction? (2) What are the laws in respect to marriage in these districts? Nothing has been learned from E. A. Lancaster, M. P., father of the Lancaster Bill, to indicate that he will reintroduce the subject this session.

## TURKS ARE DRIVEN FROM ADVANCED POSTS

(Canadian Press) VIENNA, Nov. 13.—The main Bulgarian attack on the Turkish forts along the line of Tethalya of Constantinople is now progressing favorably after being delayed for two days because of the difficulty of transportation in and after heavy rain, according to the correspondent of Reichpost at the Bulgarian headquarters in a despatch dated Tuesday. The Turks have been driven from the advanced posts.

(Canadian Press) ST. PETERSBURG, Nov. 13.—The Turkish council of war, according to a despatch from Constantinople, has considered the position of the Ottoman army defending Constantinople and decided it is hopeless.

(Canadian Press) LONDON, Nov. 13.—Paris reports that the Bank of France has loaned eight million dollars to the Bulgarian Government.

LONDON, Nov. 12.—Rumors are current to-day in Sofia that the Bulgarian army has captured the line of forts at Tethalya in front of Constantinople, according to a news agency despatch.

The Bulgarian column is said to have reached Birkak Cheknoednik on the Sea of Marmora, to the south of Tethalya.

It is also stated that the Bulgarian army under General Tesedoroff has reached Saloniki.

## MALAY STATES TO GIVE CRUISER TO BRITAIN.

SYDNEY, N. S. W., Nov. 12.—The federated Malay States purpose to offer a first class cruiser to Great Britain. The keel will be laid as soon as possible. The payment is to be spread over five years.

## DISMAY FELT IN NEW ENGLAND.

WASHINGTON, November 12.—Suspension of the work of construction on the Southern New England extension of the Grand Trunk railway has caused dismay among New England shippers, according to a telegram received by the inter-state commerce commission from Henry A. Baker, of the Providence board of trade. Mr. Baker apprehends that the vast industries of New England are falling as a prey to the New York, New Haven and Hartford railroad, and he appeals to the commission for help.

Chairman Prouty today wrote Mr. Barker pointing out that the commission had no jurisdiction over the construction of the Grand Trunk extension, and suggesting that if Providence is not enjoying reasonable rates it should make a complaint.

## SPECIALISTS APPOINTED TO JUDGE SCHRANK.

MILWAUKEE, Wis., November 12.—John Serank, pleaded guilty today to an attempt to murder Theodore Roosevelt, did not receive the quick disposition of his case he had looked for. Instead, on motion of District Attorney Winifred C. Zabel, Municipal Judge A. C. Backus appointed five Milwaukee alienists to act as a part of his court in determining the would-be slayer's mental condition. The court's action was the first such practice in Wisconsin criminal procedure. Under a recent statute the court was given this power. Dr. Richard Dewey was selected today as moderator of the medical commission, which expects to report about Thursday.

(Canadian Press) RAYMOND, Nov. 13.—Three hundred Mormon missionaries from Mormantown, south of Lethbridge, are to engage in what will be the greatest mission propaganda ever inaugurated in South Alberta.

The work is to be conducted during the winter months and all the territory south of the main line of the C. P. R. will be touched.

## NOTED STEAMSHIP MAGNATE, DEAD.

LITCHFIELD, Ct., Nov. 12.—Gustav Schwab, the steamship magnate, is dead at Dr. Buell's sanitarium here. Dr. Buell declined to give out any particulars of the death. Mr. Schwab had been in the local sanitarium before having spent summer abroad, and returned here in September. He had been seen about here taking walks of late, but was in poor health. Mr. Schwab was senior member of the firm of Oelrichs & Company, and for many years general agent of the North German Lloyd steamship line in the United States. He had been in ill health for a number of years. He was born in 1851.

## GENERAL DIAZ MAKES GOOD HIS ESCAPE.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Nov. 12.—General Felix Diaz, leader of the latest revolution in Mexico has escaped from prison, according to a letter received here by R. G. Kirwan, of this city, from R. H. Dickerson, of Oaxaca, Mexico. Dickerson is from Boston and is interested in mining in Mexico. The letter was dated Oaxaca, November 3, and that part of it bearing on Diaz reported escape follows: "This afternoon a special edition came out here, saying General Felix Diaz has escaped from prison by bribing sentries and had gone by boat down the coast. The whole town is wild and Emilio goes round with a broad grin on his face. Emilio says he is going with several other Mexicans here. Kirwan says the Emilio referred to is Felix Diaz's nephew."

Excitement ran high yesterday evening when word was received by the Honorable Charles Dalton, Tignish President of the Charles Dalton Silver Black Fox Company Ltd., that the much talked of deal with the syndicate in Russia had been closed. This was the purchase of six pairs of 1913 pups, from the ranch of the Charles Dalton Silver Black Fox Company, Ltd., for delivery on Sept. 1st, 1913, for the record price of 100,000.00 or at the rate of 16,666.66 a pair.

The contract calls for the safe delivery of the animals in Russia, accompanied by Mr. Dalton, who will instruct the purchasers in the building of a ranch suitable for their occupancy, and to give information as to their care and feeding. This will necessitate the absence of Mr. Dalton from this Province for about two months.

This is the inaugurate sale for the new company and the stockholders will reap the full benefit thus benefitting the entire Province.

What this sale means to Prince Edward Island is inestimable in dollars and cents as the Fox industry, which is steadily growing, has done more to advertise the Province than anything heretofore.

## PHYSICIAN GROUND UNDER CAR WHEELS.

QUINCY, Mass., Nov. 12.—While attempting to board a train from Boston as it was moving out of the Norfolk Downs station, Dr. Wellington Record, 59, the first doctor to settle and practise in Wollaston, slipped from the steps of the second car and fell between the wheels. Dr. Record was on his way home from Wollaston from a sick call, and had to run to catch the train, which was an accommodation. A brakeman standing on the platform saw him fall and opened the emergency valve bringing the train to a stop. The body was horribly mangled, his back broken and his arms and legs crushed.

Dr. F. A. Bartlett was sent for and Dr. Record was rushed to the Quincy Hospital in the police ambulance. He was still unconscious when placed on the operating table, and after ether had been administered, Drs. Bartlett, Samuel S. Hunting and Edward H. Nichols amputated his right arm and right leg. He is not expected to live.

Dr. Record is one of the best known doctors in Quincy and was the first to locate in Wollaston, where he has practised for twenty-five years. He is a former school committee member, and has taken a prominent part in Quincy affairs.

## SEVERAL PERSONS KILLED IN EXPLOSION.

HAMMOND, Ind., Nov. 12.—A terrific explosion took place at the Aetna Powder Mills twenty miles east of here this morning. Information is meagre except that the drying plant was blown up and that a number of persons were killed or badly wounded. The entire population of the town is searching the debris for bodies.

## TO TAX PASSAGE SHIPS THROUGH PANAMA CANAL

(Canadian Press) WASHINGTON, Nov. 13.—President Taft tonight issued a proclamation fixing rates so that the foreign shipping of the world shall pay their passage through Panama Canal.

The proclamation made under the authority of the Canal act passed by Congress in August, established the merchant vessel rate of \$1.20 per net ton of actual carrying capacity with the reduction of forty per cent on the ships in ballast.

## LATEST DEVICE TO STOP TRAINS.

CHICAGO, Nov. 12.—Successful demonstration of the Gollig automatic train stop was made by a series of tests conducted by the Chicago Great Western railway, near De Kalb, Ill., in the presence of fifty or more representatives of different railroads. The principal tests consisted in automatically stopping an engine and four freight cars within a distance of 400 to 500 feet while running at a speed of thirty to thirty-five miles an hour.

The automatic train stop is operated by an apparently simple device known as a shoe which is attached to the tender of the engine just over one of the front wheels. It has a spring attachment and slightly resembles the step of an engine. At the end of the block is a third rail about one hundred feet in length, which is charged with electricity. Wires extend from one block to another, connecting with the third rail. When the block itself or the block ahead is occupied, or the rail broken the circuit energizing the third rail is broken.

If the circuit is broken the shoe communicates with a device in the engine which automatically opens its valves to relieve the steam engine of its power.
