MINUTES OF PRESBYTERY

At Charlottetown, and within St. James' Hall there, on Tuesday, Nov. 16th, 1909, and at eleven o'clock a.m. the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island met and was constituted by the Moderator pro tempore, Mr. T. F. Fullerton, with whom were present: Messrs S. D. McPhee, John Gillies, R. P. Murray, D. B. McLeod, J. W. McKenzie, Geo. E. Ross, Wm. McLeod, John Hawley, A. Craise, ministers; John A. Lawson and John J. McLeod, elders.

Revs L. Beaton, D. McLean and Mr. T. C. James being present, were invited to sit and correspond. The clerk was instructed to communicate with the clerk of the Presbytery of Miramichi and ask that a meeting of that Presbytery be convened as soon as possible, so that the call from Cardigan to Mr. J. M. McLeod, New Mills, may be issued without unnecessary delay.

The Presbytery then took up the call from Avonmore, Ontario, to Mr. S. D. McPhee. The clerk stated that he had cited the session and congregation of Belfast to appear for their interests at this meeting. Rev L. Beaton represented the Presbytery of Glenary and congregation of Avonmore, and urged the translation of Mr. McPhee. Commissioners from Belfast, namely, Messrs John Ross, Duncan McInnes and J. S. Moore spoke of the good and faithful work done by their minister, and expressed the deep desire of the congregation to retain his services. On motion, the call was placed in the hands of Mr McPhee and accepted by him.

It was moved by Mr. Geo. E. Ross seconded by Mr. D. B. McLeod and carried, that the translation be granted and the pastoral tie dissolved, to take effect on and after the 28th day of November instant.

Mr. T. F. Fullerton was appointed interim moderator of Belfast session and instructed to have the charge declared vacant as soon as possible after the 28th inst.

The Presbytery then adjourned, to meet at the call of the Moderator and clerk, of which public intimation was made, and this sedentary was closed with the Benediction.

THE ROOT CROPS OF THIS PROVINCE. The Department of Agriculture sometime since sent out a circular letter to 100 farmers in various parts of the Province, enquiring into the state of the potato and turnip crops. Replies were received from Prince County. The reports indicate that the crop in Prince County is a fair one, about 230 bushels to the acre.

16 of the correspondents report that the Green Mountains have been rotting very badly. One mentioned McIntyres and the remainder are of the opinion that the early varieties are rotting worse than the late varieties. There seems to be about 20 percent of the potato crop in Prince County affected with rot. The reports from Queens County show an average crop of 220 bushels per acre. Only three correspondents mention Green Mountains as rotting worse than other varieties and one mentions Whites.

It would seem that about 10 per cent of the crops of Queens County is affected with rot. 176 bushels per acre is an average reported by King's County correspondents, of which about 12 per cent is rotting. Three correspondents mention Green Mountains and two mention McIntyres, as rotting worse than other varieties. It is worth noting that the price paid in King's County is about 2c per bushel more than is paid in Prince County, while the average price in Prince County is about 1c a bushel more than the average price paid in Queens County. Enquiry was also made concerning the turnip crop. The average crop in Prince and King's is about 500 bushels per acre, while in Queen's it is 600. There seems to be a great increase in the amount of Turnips being grown. Two correspondents only, report less, nine reports with the same amount and the remainder report from 10 to 300 bushels in the last five years.
