NEW IDEA IN OLD TRADE

NEW YORK, Dec. 14.—A new idea in an old business has been conceived by Irving Morange, a theatrical man of Bronxville. He has sent out his invitations to a Christmas party in the form of a photograph record, carrying his own voice, in a parody of a popular vaudeville team. The cost was not much higher than many engraved invitations sent out.

It is forty five years since Thomas A. Edison designed the first photograph, but this is the first time a personal invitation to a Christmas party has been sent out in this way. At least that is the opinion of C. R. Johnstone, vice president and general manager of the Bell Recording Corporation, who made the records for Mr. Morange, and who worked for the Edison companies in the early days of the phonograph. So that there is something new in an old business.

Mr. Morange conceived the idea a few years ago, but none of the larger record companies did work on a small scale for the individual who had to wait until Mr. Johnstone left as directory of the laboratories of the Aeolian company to produce records for individual singers, musicians or just plain citizens. Then Mr. Morange popped the idea at this old hand at the business was surprised to hear that he had created something new.

His Christmas invitation record is entitled "Christmas Egg Nogg," a carol sung to the lilting melody made famous by Mr. Gallagher and Mr. Shean. The chimes start off the invitation. Then Mr. Morange and one of his friends, in a duet explain what will happen at the party, and the record invitation ends with a melody of tunes of the pre-Viet days: "How Dry I Am" and "When I Die Don't Bury Me at All." All the invitations have been accepted.

About 75 of the records were mailed by Mr. Morange. They are seven inches in diameter and cost about 25 cents a piece. They were made in just the same way that all the records of famous singers and orchestras are made by the large companies and Mr. Morange thinks he has shown the way to a new field of phonograph business—the individual record or message which may be either a party invitation, a message from a manager to his field "forces" or a selling or advertising argument by any commercial concern.

IN MEMORIAM

MR. MALCOLM MCINNIS

Shortly after noon on Sunday, Oct. 15th, Mr. Malcolm McInnis, a very highly esteemed resident of Hopedale passed peacefully away at the age of 68 years. For about two weeks the deceased had been feeling somewhat indisposed with what seemed to be a heavy cold, but the condition of his health was not thought to be at all serious. The evening of the day before his death he was moving about the house and was chatting with friends who came in to see him. After breakfast on the following morning, he complained of not feeling so well. Toward noon he became very much distressed, and medical aid was quickly summoned. All that kind friends and medical skill could do was done but all to no avail. Not long after the doctor arrived, his spirit took its homeward flight.

Besides a sorrowing widow, Mr. McInnis leaves to mourn the loss of a kind and loving father three sons and one daughter. The sons are: Alexander, of Montano, U. S. A.; Kenneth in the employ of the P. E. I. Railway and John A. at home and the one daughter, Mrs. Allan Cummins of Hunter River.

In the family of Mr. and Mrs. Malcolm McInnis there was also one stepson, Mrs. McInnis was first married to Mr. Roderick McLeod of Hunter River. From this marriage there was one son, Roderick McLeod, now of Colorado, who also survived the deceased.

Mr. McInnis was the last member of a family of three. His only brother William was killed in Quebec, Mass. some 14 years ago and his only sister, Mrs. Murdoch McLeod of West River, P. E. I. predeceased him by about seven years.

The deceased will be much missed not only in his own home where he ever radiated an atmosphere of good cheer but also in the whole countryside where he was a general favorite, and by his genial off-handed manner he won

his way into the hearts of all who had the pleasure of knowing him. He took great delight in helping any who were in need, especially in times of sickness and sorrow. He was a loyal orangeman and ever stoutly upheld the principles for which the order stood.

Just why one who was apparently so strong, and so rugged, should be thus so suddenly, and so unexpectedly cut down, seems hard for us to understand under such circumstances, though we each must bow in submission to the Divine decree, saying, "not my will but Thine be done."

But of this we can be sure, that what we cannot understand now, we shall know hereafter.

The funeral which was one of the largest ever seen in this section of the province, was held on the afternoon of Tuesday, Oct. 17, the service was conducted by Rev. R. H. Stavert. At the grave a very impressive service was conducted by the Orangemen. The pall bearers were Messrs. John E. McLeod, Alex. K. McDonald, Daniel McQueen, John McLean, Finlay Matheson and Angus Nicholson. Interment was in the Hartsville cemetery.

BARBECUE FOR 200,000

OKLAHOMA City, Okla., Dec. 14.—A call for enough provender to serve 200,000 persons two days has gone out over Oklahoma, Governor E. C. Walton, Democrat, has invited the world at large to his inaugural party, January 10 and 11. He said he expects his guests to come by oxcarts, airplanes, motor cars, special railroads, riding the rods and the cushions, afoot horseback and by all available other methods of travel. He will serve them barbecue and give a square dance on a half mile race track.

Dan. Lackey, prizefight manager is chairman of the committee

of 3,000 members arranging the test, vites.

Here is a tentative list of supplies for the barbecue: Five hundred beef cattle, 22 hundred hogs, 200 sheep, 5,000 chickens, 1,000 turkeys, 3,000 rabbits, 1,000 squabs, 200 opossums, 500 ducks and geese, 10 buffalo, 10 bears 10 deer, 10 antelope, 5 tons of coffee, 5 tons of salt, 5 tons of sugar, 1,000 pounds of pepper, 250 bushels of onions, 100,000 loaves of bread 100,000 buns, fifteen carloads of firewood and three carloads of pine knots for kindling.

Here might be included also, as listed by Lackey, three thousand persons to serve the multitude, and five hundred expert butchers, siclers and barbecuers.

The new Governor is to take his office on a stand erected in the race track paddock. The two houses of the State Legislature will convene in joint session in the court, which opens into the Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, who will then administer the oath to the Chief Executive. This is to take place on January 9. The two-day celebration will follow.

The new Governor will ride a 35,000 saddle horse, seated on a \$10,000 saddle, in a parade which will start the festivities. The Governor-elect will be accompanied by his wife and a number of members in the Central Barbecue Committee, as is also Pawnee Bill, showman and rancher.

Among the specially invited guests of the new Governor at his inaugural party will be about 1,000 Indians, representing all the tribes living in Oklahoma. Governor-elect Walton was the nominee of the Democratic Party in his State-wide campaign he promised that if he were chosen for the office of Chief Executive his inaugural ball would be no "pink tea party for the 'four hundred,'" but would be a real old-fashioned, out-door celebration for any one who cared to be present. The barbecue will carry out his campaign promise.

TO BURY FRENCH WAR PRISONERS

PARIS, Dec. 14.—Twenty thousand French soldiers who died in Germany as prisoners of war are to be buried in a great cemetery at Sarrebourg, near the frontier, according to an arrangement concluded by the minister of war with the municipality. Sarrebourg requested the honor of providing a last resting place for "those unhappy heroes whose lives were sacrificed in captivity." The cemetery will be laid out next spring.
