Bennett declared he denounced a policy created by the Liberal Party to "catch votes" "He is a returned man, Premier Ferguson interjected." He is a returned man from south of the 49th parallel," Mr. Bennett remarked.

The Conservative Leader emphasized that last session he had advocated the calling of an economic conference with a view to an interchange of products between the various parts of the British Empire. He had put forward that suggestion, believing that the unity of the Empire, which had come to us from long struggles, rested on a co-ordinated effort and the creation of an economic unit, "that would defy the hostile forces of all the nations of the world," by a scheme of Empire preference, but with mutual benefits, an economic unit could be built up. These, Mr. Bennett declared, were not sentiments adopted to get votes. It is not a policy adopted at election

Continued from Page 1 In 1928 pigs decreased by nearly 200,000 in Canada. In 1929 there was a decrease of another 115,000. (Page 2337, 1930 Unrevised Hansard). Exports of bacon and ham have dropped from over \$28,500,000 in 1926 to but \$6,500,000 in 1930. Imports have multiplied by five in the same period. Exports of fresh pork were four times greater in 1927 than they were last year.

These are government figures. Mackenzie King knew them. Did he do anything to stop the decline of pig breeding? He did not. He was indifferent.

MILK FOR BUTTER OR CHEESE

Government statistics (page 2337, Unrevised Hansard, 1930) show that in 1928 there were some 375,000,000 less pounds of milk used for butter production than in 1925. There were also some 240,000,000 less pounds of milk used for cheese production in 1928 than in 1925.

Mr. King had these figures. He saw that New Zealand imports were putting the Canadian Dairy man out of business. Yet he says that we imported increasing amounts of New Zealand butter because we are prosperous. Why did he not act on the figures? He was too indifferent.

LIVESTOCK EXPORTS

The Liberals claim to have helped the livestock producer. Livestock exports fell from \$99,000,000 to \$78,000,000 last year. The British market is lost. The United States have barred Canadian cattle by doubling duties this year. But Mr. King is indifferent. He has done nothing.

SHEEP RAISING

Mackenzie King's faulty fiscal policy has hurt sheep raising too. There are now but 3,000,000 sheep in Canada, which is less than at Confederation when our population was but a third of what it is now. Cheap frozen mutton under preference from New Zealand and Australia have cut our exports of mutton to but a quarter of what they were five years ago, and have trebled our imports. But Mr. King was indifferent to the figures of ruin.

Police declared today they had evidence that in 33 abandonment cases, the Matron had received \$50 for her efforts in securing foster parents to adopt the children. Twenty babies were abandoned in Three Rivers, Que., and the remainder in St. Hyacinthe, St. Genevieve and Granby. Chief Lalonde of the provincial police stated.

My Reasons For Opposing The King Government

I. It has failed to grasp a true study of Canadian economic conditions. This fact is exemplified in the increased importation of manufactured goods from the United States which under judicious and adequate encouragement should be made in Canada, thus giving employment to our own people, increasing the home market and so pursuing a course of nation-building instead of one of drift. It is further exemplified in the Australian Treaty or New Zealand arrangement which has destroyed the splendid position Canada held as a milk-producing nation and in the barren results which followed from the trade arrangements made with other countries.

II. The claim of taking credit for the merging of the different railways which now form the C. N. R. System which the Liberals fought step by step until they obtained power, when they simply carried out the scheme of development which Borden and Meighen demonstrated and fostered.

III. Mr. King's attitude of resentment towards provinces under Conservative rule — an attitude so preshadowed in the miserly treatment of constituencies electing Conservative members — that his five-cent speech in parliament made only after all, an open confession of his narrowness and an absolute want of such statesmanship and conduct as should be expected in the position he occupied.

IV. The tardiness of the Liberal government has displayed in implementing the recommendations of the Duncan Commission and the fallacious reasons for the delay in connection thereto.

V. The unfairness of the pension scheme which, in a financial way, burdens too heavily the provinces responding to it, and throws the Maritimes under the obligation to share in the general burden while financially unable to take advantage of it.

VI. The withdrawal of highway and educational grants and their opposition to the building and maintenance of a national highway.

VII. To those features of the Dunning Budget which will evidently injure the woolen and coal industries of Canada to those which make for an instability of trade with the neighboring Republic to the south of us, into whose hands have been relegated thereby the possibilities of a power which, doubtless will be used to their special advantage.

To the reasons cited many others may be added, but in another important aspect that of capability, sincerity, courage, real love of country, and in the concepts of making Canada an industrial and progressive nation, Mr. King has sadly lacked, whilst the Conservative leader, the Hon. R. B. Bennett, is the very embodiment of all those statesmanlike qualities now so well recognized by the Canadian public. J. F. D.
