The receipts of cheese for the week ending June 12th were 95,279 boxes, which an increase of 10,860 boxes as compared with last week, and an increase of 29,121 with the same week a year ago and the total receipts since May 1st show an increase of 188,810 boxes as compared with the corresponding time last year. Of the above total there were 13,155 boxes received from the United States.

EGGS:—There is no further change in the condition of the market to note, the feeling being firm under a good steady demand for export account.

WOOL:—Lachute, Que., The Argentine Wool Growers and Sheep Breeders' Association today completed their first annual sale of wool, two days having been spent at Breuilleville and two at Lachute. In all, over 6,000 lbs. of wool was sold. Ayers, Limited, Lachute, buying the whole quantity, and paying prices according to grade, such system being one of the main objects of the Association in order to do away with the old method of selling at a flat rate. The wool which was the product of about seventy members of the Association, was prepared according to the rules of the Association, and was graded by Mr. A. A. McMillen, B. S. A., of MacDonald College. The greater part of the wool was of the higher grade. Mr. J. R. Cleland is president of the Association with Wm. Hay as vice-president and V. B. Durling, B. S. A., the MacDonald College demonstrator, resident in Lachute as Secretary-treasurer. All members of the Association are highly satisfied with the results.

WOOL:—Toronto, Wool is higher and the demand is good. The modification of the embargo caused a substantial advance, but should permit to ship to the United States be withheld at any time, it would undoubtedly result in a sharp decline, so growers are not taking chances, but are taking advantage of the present high prices to market their wool. Washed combed fleece (coarse) 31 to 33c. Washed combed fleece, medium, 33c to 35c. Washed clothing fleece (fine) 35c to 38c. Tubwashed as to quality (coarse) 31c to 33c (fine) 33c to 38c. Unwashed fleece combed (coarse) 25c to 26c (medium) 25c to 27c and Unwashed fleece, clothing (fine) 27c to 28c per lb.

BRITAIN TO PAY FOR COTTON CARGOES

WASHINGTON, June 16.—Notice was given by the British Embassy today that authority had been granted for the settlement and payment at the Embassy here and at the consulate-general in New York of the claims of American exporters on account of detentions and appropriations of cotton.

This arrangement will affect a large number of shippers whose cargoes, consigned to neutral countries of Europe, have been seized under the British order-in-council against commerce with Germany and Austria. It is expected to facilitate settlements, as proofs of ownership and destination can be submitted and certified much more quickly in the United States than in the British ports in which the ships are detained.

It has become known that early in the week the British Government had in contemplation the declaration of cotton as absolute contraband, because it is the basis of smokeless powder and gun cotton. Upon urgent representations by the United States that such a declaration would paralyze an American export trade in this staple, worth about \$800,000,000, Great Britain withheld the threatened action.

CHICAGO, June 12.—Fear of damage from heavy rains northwest had a good deal to do today with an advance in the value of wheat which advanced in price from 3/4 to 1 1/4 c per bushel. Corn gained 1 1/2 c while oats remained unchanged.

WINNIPEG, June 12.—Prices for wheat, oats and flax were higher generally. The total number of inspections on Friday were 50 cars as against 309 last year and in sight on Saturday were 225 cars.

TORONTO, June 12.—In sympathy with the strong close of the Winnipeg market, cash prices at Bay ports are a cent higher.

MONTREAL, June 12.—There is no improvement to note in the export trade in wheat here during the week, the demand from foreign buyers being still very limited. Prices remain about steady.

HOGS: There was no new developments in the local hog situation today, the tone of the market being about steady with a fair amount of business doing in dressed stock in a jobbing way and sales of slaughter fresh-kills at 27 1/2 to 27 3/4 c. The bulk at the inside figure.
