**Anniversary Service  
 At St. Thomas  
 Anglican Church**

The last of the services commemorating the 120th anniversary of St. Thomas' Anglican Church, New London, was held on Sunday evening, July 10, when a gain many friends from other churches worshipped with the congregation. The rector, Rev. S. J. Davies, B.A., conducted the service, and the choir organist, Mr. Pezden of St. Mary's, Summerside, led in hymns of praise and thanksgiving, and presented the selection "Come Unto Me, Ye Weary" (J. B. Dykes) as an anthem.

Mr. Davies welcomed the rector of St. Mary's, Summerside, and St. John's, St. Eleanor's, Ven. Archdeacon G. R. Harrison, M.A., B.D., who delivered the sermon, and who, he said, is loved by his own people, by all who know him, and especially by his clergy. He paid tribute to the early rectors of St. Eleanor's, who travelled weary miles to minister to New London, and welcomed the visiting choir and organist. The ladies of the congregation he thanked for their part in making the "semi-annual," a "red-letter day," and the Young People's Association, for personal contributions, which made possible the new sign for the church.

The Rev. Mr. Harrison expressed his personal pleasure in the occasion, and brought congratulations from St. John's and St. Mary's. As Archdeacon, he extended the congratulations of the D.C.S. and the people of the Province, as well as those of the Archbishop and the Co-adjutor Bishop, on the improvements made on the church building which, he said, "You will realize the importance of keeping, fitting for the glory of God." Taking his text from the 78th psalm, which he called "Epoch history of the wanderings of the children of Israel," and the 21st verse: "The church throughout the world? Is the waters gushed out,—but can He give bread also?" he said "In their difficulties, they expressed doubt. This is a service of thanksgiving, for the good that has happened to you in the past. God helped you and your forbears—now the uncertain future lies before you. Are we doubtful of God's power to prosper His church throughout the world? Is your thanksgiving something that has brought you closer to God?" He went on to show how our lives must be connected up in the stream of His love, so that the power of God, strength to meet the troubles of the future.
