From Montreal yesterday came the news of the death of John F. Owen, son of Charles Owen, Collector of Customs at Georgetown. Sad as it is at all times to record the deaths of those who stand at the entrance of a life's career of more than ordinary promise, the present case is one which excites more than the usual regret on the part of the numerous friends of the deceased. Possessed of the most amiable qualities of character Mr. Owen's friends felt for him sentiments of deep regard, and the news of his death at the present time, when he and those who loved him were looking forward with the highest hopes for his success in life, will be learned with sincere sorrow. The late Mr Owen was only in his 34th year. He was born in Georgetown, but as a teacher in the West Kent Street school spent many years in Charlottetown. Several years ago he became attached to the Government surveying staff, beginning work on the Murray Harbor Branch in this Province. Latterly Mr Owen had been on the Intercolonial Survey in Quebec. He was a diligent worker, and was advancing rapidly, but unfortunately he recently contracted typhoid fever. Although he went to Montreal hospital for treatment, where he received the best of care and attention, he suffered a relapse which terminated fatally yesterday. Two of his sisters, Mrs. Mackinnon, wife of the Lieutenant Governor, and Mrs. Alder Irehaut, left for Montreal a few days ago when they learned the gravity of the case. Mrs. Mackinnon returned on Wednesday evening. Mrs. Irehaut remained with her brother and is expected to arrive home this evening with the body.
