

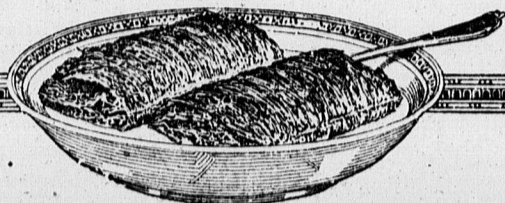

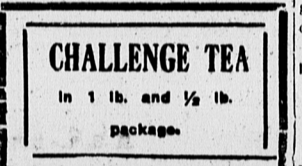
### NEW FOG DEVICES

(Scientific American.)  
Three new fog devices to overcome the drawbacks of mist and fogs to airmen are stated to be under discussion by British authorities. The first consists of the "laying along the route traversed by the airway of a powerfully charged electrical cable. This automatically sends up into the air a constant series of signals." By keeping his machine in such a position that the strength of the signals is kept constant the airman is assured that he is flying along the cable line. The second makes for safety in landing when the ground is not visible and consists of a wire, with a weight attached, which is lowered from beneath the machine; when the weight touches the earth the airman learns that it is time to "flatten out" his machine. The third is called the "artificial horizon." It is a gyroscope instrument which shows an artificial horizon line always in front of the pilot and enables him to detect instantly when his machine is heeling over too much sidewise in its relation to the real horizon, which is temporarily invisible. A tiny model aeroplane poised above the artificial horizon line mimics precisely the movements of his own machine.

### Railway Shopmen In United States Reject Wage Cut

CHICAGO, Sept. 20.—Railway shopmen belonging to the six federated crafts union have voted to strike against the railroad reduction of July 1, 1921, but will defer action until the promulgation of working rules now pending before the United States railroad labor board when another vote will be taken on acceptance or rejection of the rules. This announcement was officially made by B.M. Jewell, head of the shop's craft organizations, at a meeting of Chicago shop workers today.

Belief that a stronger fight could be made if a strike is called, with preservation of the shopmen's working rules, as one of the grievances led to the decision to withhold a strike call for the present, Mr. Jewell said.

The strike vote, completed Aug. 1, was announced as showing a constitutional majority against the wage reduction which went into effect July 1.

### Meetings in Cleveland.

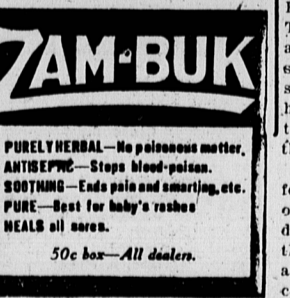
Cleveland, Sept. 20.—Cleveland members of six railroad crafts affiliated with the American Federation of Labor at mass meetings here, pledged themselves to obey the orders of the railroad department of the federation. Machinists, boiler-makers, car repair men, blacksmiths, sheet metal workers, and electrical workers attended the meetings.

They agreed not to engage in any sporadic or local strikes and to follow implicitly the strike program as arranged by the union chiefs.

GEORGETOWN, Del., Sept. 21.—When Miss Sarah Elaine Atkins daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William R. Atkins, of Millsboro, and David Brittingham, of Lewes, were married, the family ties were bound more closely than at first thought. It develops that he becomes the step-father of his daughter-in-law a brother-in-law to his son and his stepdaughter and daughter-in-law is his sister-in-law.

Mrs. Brittingham becomes the step-mother of her brother-in-law the step mother of her sister-in-law by marriage to her husband. The family mix-up is due to the bridegroom and his son marrying sisters. The senior Brittingham's wife is younger than the son.



### Real Peril Seen In The Church

Chicago Divine Says Ministers Are Trained as Salesmen, Not as Apostles

LONDON, Sept. 19.—Modern ministers are trained as mere "salesmen" instead of Christian apostles and that is one reason why the people generally have a lukewarm attitude toward religion, declared the Rev. Dr. J. S. Laid Thomas, of Chicago, in an address here today before the Ecumenical Methodist Conference. The speaker said he saw "a real peril" in the effort of denominational leaders to force the ministry into a narrow, mechanical scheme whose direct aim is to produce the largest immediate revenue.

"Poorly attended churches all over the land bear witness to the people's indifference toward institutional religion," said Dr. Thomas. "The churches are the exception rather than the rule; it is the empty church which stares us in the face and, 'more eloquently than words' speaks of the attitude of that large group of people who have rejected institutional religion as something unnecessary in their lives."

"They are pleasure mad; they have a mania for materialistic indulgence, while their belief in the modern church as the representative of God and the Ambassador of Christ does not express itself. The 'real problem,' the speaker indicated, "is how to vitalize the church so that she may authoritatively and convincingly persuade men of their divine inheritance and the mission of sacrificial service."

Asserting that "the average artisan lacks confidence in the church as the champion of the 'square deal'" he continued:  
"This indifference has arisen from a misconception of God—a wrong teaching of God—a wrong teaching of the church and a wrong teaching of the Christian life. In many of the critical hours of history the church has failed to impress the world with an authoritative message—which would bring into the dark hours on the subject of war, the relations of capital and labor and other vital questions which have been baffling the minds of men."

"Prophets and priests," Dr. Thomas said, "must challenge the people with a gospel that will restore confidence in the church trust in Christ and service to the world. The church must not forget her social message, and she must also remember that Christianity is a religion of the individual."

### Depew Left First Money In A Bank

NEW YORK, Sept. 20.—Along about 1950 or 1960 when Chauncey M. Depew decides to retire from the directorate of the New York Central Railroad and pass his declining years in rest and quiet at Briarcliff Manor, he will have a nice little nest egg laid aside for his old age. He told a reporter about it.

"The first \$100 I ever earned," he said, "was deposited in the Peekskill Savings Bank at interest. That was more than sixty years ago, the year before the civil war started. It has been there ever since, because I never had the heart to draw it, although sometimes I needed it badly. I always thought something might happen."  
"Then I forget all about it," the former senator continued. "The other day I was in Peekskill and dropped in at the bank. I asked them if I had any money there and an official told me that my old account of \$100 was still on the
