SOUTHERN NOTES

We regret to report the loss of a valuable mare about 2 1-2 years old the property of Mr. Daniel MacPherson. The cause of death was tetanus, the source of which was unknown. A veterinary was brought from Montague but he was unable to effect a cure. The animal was one of the finest in these precincts.

Notes from Peters Road are conspicuous by their absence and this is regrettable for they were readable and contained many shrewd observations couched in good clear terms.

The world record for potatoes is now claimed according to a recent dispatch to the Guardian by a grower in Montie Vista, Colorado, who raised 1154 bushels on a measured acre of land. At the risk of making a serious error I venture to say unless my memory greatly deceives me that this record has been beaten and that by Lord Rosebery one time Prime Minister of Great Britain and Ireland between 20 and 25 years ago. MacKinnon who was Lieut-Governor at the time wrote Lord Rosebery asking him for the formula by which he produced them which was forwarded to him and I remember reading it. My impression is that the amount was over 1500 bushels. The point is worth looking up. About the same time as this wonderful crop was produced there appeared in the Family Herald of Montreal a picture of a man carrying a potato on his shoulder weighing 85 lbs, grown in Colorado.

A few nights ago in Little Sands Hall Rev. Mr. Sinclair, pastor of Valleyfield congregation delivered a lecture on Scotland to an appreciative audience. Proceeds from admission fees which were 15 and 25 cents each will be used to improve the interior of the hall. The lecture was illustrated by magic lantern views. Mr. Sinclair carried his audience with him to "the land of brown heath and shaggy woodland of the mountain and the flood," and showed them its beautiful lochs, its rugged mountains, its deep glens, its moors of heath and all the varied scenic grandeur of which Scotland can boast. He spoke of her principal spots of historic interest, her clans and the comradely and loyal spirit which obtained between the members of the same clan and the hospitality that unfortunately sometimes appeared between different clans. He spoke in admiration of her poets, her philosophers, her men of science, her heroes and of some of her kings. He gave high praise to Scottish character wherever found and dwelt on the industry and perseverance of Scottish people, and in short he demonstrated to all present the supremacy of the Scot in peace and in war. Altogether Mr. Sinclair gave a fine address.

Speaking personally I have always thought it difficult to set bounds to the possible achievements of the Scot when we consider the simplicity of his menu which consists of oatmeal and the shorter catechism. Being of Scotch ancestry myself modesty forbids me to say what his performances would be should he decide upon going on a diet of the longer catechism. H.

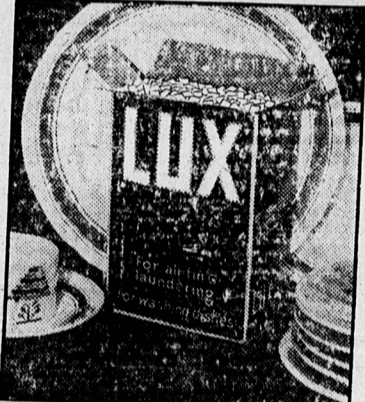

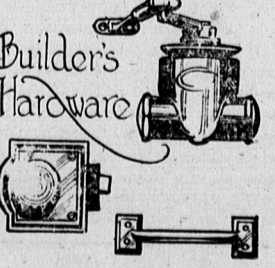
