URGES THE NECESSITY OF STRICT ECONOMY

Premier Sounds Stern Warning In Budget Speech Last Evening. Expectation Of Balanced Budget, Exclusive Of Expenditures In Rebuilding Prince Of Wales College And Falconwood, Is Announced. Late Liberal Government Scored For Neglecting Huge Overdraft.

Grave need of practicing every economy consistent with efficiency in the various essential departments of Government was emphasized by the Hon. J. D. Stewart, K. C., Premier of the Province, in the course of his Budget speech in the Legislature last night.

The total revenues of the Province for 1932 the Premier estimated at \$1,209,870.88. The total expenditures, exclusive of a sum sufficient to rebuild Falconwood Hospital and Prince of Wales College, were estimated at \$1,207,465.

Details of estimated revenue were given by the Premier as follows: Dominion subsidy, \$497,181.88; C. N. R. property tax, \$40,000; public lands \$100; Provincial Secretary's fees \$1,250; Prothonotary's fees, \$2,500; Registry office \$6,500; County Courts, \$1,500; Falconwood Hospital, \$10,000; Private bills, \$350; P. W. C. fees, \$3,000; Fines and penalties, \$1,200; Succession duties, \$25,000; Casual revenue, \$8,000; Fire insur-

ance companies, \$12,000; life insurance companies, \$9,000; acceptance corporation companies, \$800; accident and guarantee companies, \$1,000; domicile companies, \$45,000; trust and loan companies, \$1,700; telegraph company, \$800; electric light companies, \$2,000; telephone company, \$2,500; steamship companies, \$600; brokers, \$1,000; banks, \$15,000; peddlers licenses, \$1,000; life insurance agents, \$350; fire insurance agents, \$38; motor vehicle licenses, \$137,000; Department of Agriculture (technical) \$30,000; Department of Agriculture receipts, \$4,000; Department of Health, \$17,500; Prohibition Commission, \$28,000; direct relief, \$6,000; amusement tax, \$3,000; gasoline tax, \$160,000; real estate, income, property, road, etc., \$115,000; road arrears of taxes, \$20,000. Total \$1,209,870.88.

PEORIA, Ill., Mar. 15.—Police tonight said they were confident that Dr. James W. Parker, 65, a physician, had been kidnapped and that his family soon would receive ransom demands. His automobile was found abandoned this morning near the municipal golf links.

Police Dragnet Blocked Escape Of Four Bandits

CLINTON, Ia., March 15.—An effective police dragnet today blocked escape of four masked bandits with \$100,000 they had taken from the City National Bank here.

Shortly after 8.30 a. m. the quartet fled with the money leaving 38 employes and customers bound in the bank. Within three hours most of the loot was found in a brush pile on a farm near Camanche and two hours later the four men had been captured at various points between here and Davenport. Ia. Officers announced they had confessed the robbery.

The men gave their names as Cliff Edwards of Louisville, Ky.; Earl Pefferies, alias Earl Shearley, Edward Morr's alias T. D. Morse, and Lester Stanley alias Leo Stanley. The last three also were believed to be from Louisville.

New Bill Would Affect Russia

LONDON, March 15.—(Canadian Press Cable)—Commander Oliver Locker-Lampson, Conservative member for Handsworth, Birmingham, today tabled in the House of Commons a bill which would prohibit importation of goods made in foreign countries by forced labor.

The bill, which was given first reading, was seen to be aimed at Soviet Russia. The Commander made a lengthy speech in its support in which he dwelt on "the sweating of poor peasants and convicts, and traffic in human flesh and blood."

Timber and wheat constitute the major portion of Great Britain's imports from Soviet Russia. Passage of Commander Locker-Lampson's bill prohibiting the importation of goods produced under forced labor would be in line with existing legislation effective in Canada and United States.

While Canada allows very few articles to enter its territory from Soviet Russia the United States restricts only those suspected of having been produced under forced labor. The burden of proof is left in the hands of the consigner who must furnish reasonable evidence to show forced labor did not enter into the production of the goods. (horo.)

LONDON, March 15.—(A.P.)—Zaro Agha, the 158-year-old Turk who says he is the oldest man in the world, was in a hospital today with acute indigestion. He collapsed in a restaurant after dinner yesterday and his condition was said to be serious.

BRITISH BUDGET WILL BALANCE

ILFORD, Essex, Eng., Mar. 15.—(A.P.)—Stanley Baldwin, Lord President of the Council, announced tonight that the current budget would balance.

In his first public political speech since he joined the National Government's Cabinet, the Conservative leader said: "Today we are in a position when we know that the budget will balance. We know that borrowing on current accounts has been stopped, and I hope stopped forever. We are in a position to look with observant sympathy on those great countries which have not yet succeeded in balancing their current budget."

Lady Athlete Badly Injured

TORONTO, Ont., Mar. 15.—Fanny "Bobby" Rosenfeld, Canadian Olympic track star, received severe head injuries today when struck down by a motor car as she stepped from her own car to the road. She was rushed to hospital and after treatment removed to her home. Her injuries, said to be serious but not critical, consist of deep scalp wounds and a badly bruised knee.

HITLER PEEVED

WEIMAR, GERMANY, Mar. 15.—(AP)—Adolf Hitler, rival of President Von Hindenburg for leadership of Germany, appeared as a witness at an official hearing revolving around his citizenship today and said he took the enquiry as a personal insult.

After answering questions regarding the administrative methods of Wilhelm Frick, former National Socialist Minister of the Interior in Thuringia, he told the officiating Commissioner to take his hands out of his pockets when speaking to him (Hitler) and stalked out of the courtroom.

Questioned as to whether he had approved Frick's scheme to make him a citizen, one of the issues at stake, Hitler trembled with rage and roared that he had refused to accept citizenship from the Brunen regime. He denied he had authorized Frick's measures, but asserted it was monstrous that a man who had fought four years at the front should have been refused naturalization, while thousands of East Galician Jews had been made citizens.

The National Socialist leader was admitted to citizenship several weeks ago by his acceptance of an appointment as Counselor to the Brunswick Legation in Berlin.

U. S. Ignores Jap Message

WASHINGTON, D. C., Mar. 15.—Henry Puyis' new Manchurian Government today appealed to the United States for recognition. A message came to the State Department from Changchun, the Capital of the new state, signed by Hsieh Chieh Shih, Minister of Foreign Affairs asking for United States favor. But the Department refused to acknowledge that it had even received the message.

PRISONER DIES FROM SHOCK AT DORCHESTER

Pole Runs Amuck In Penitentiary Yard And Attacks Other Prisoners And Guard, Before Being Shot By Guard.

DORCHESTER, N. B., March 15.—(By the Canadian Press)—Shot in the leg after he had struck down three fellow-prisoners with a crowbar and was running in a mad frenzy towards the guard in charge of the gang, George Synco, 40 year old inmate of Dorchester Penitentiary, died in the prison hospital yesterday of what was officially termed "shock."

Details of the prisoner's death were not available to the public until after the inquest begun in the Penitentiary this morning, had finished in the Court House this afternoon.

In their verdict, the jury exonerated N. P. Ward, the keeper, who killed Synco with a revolver bullet in the leg. He used no more

Still No Trace The Lindbergh Baby Boy

JERSEY CITY, N. J., Mar. 15.—A lead in the two-week-old Lindbergh kidnaping case, described as "important enough to be taken seriously," was being tracked down tonight by detectives as they investigated the story of an old plot to steal the famous flyer's son.

The importance of the clue was stressed by Joseph Fishman, Deputy Commissioner of corrections of New York City, after he had brought a prisoner from the Tombs prison in New York to Jersey City to confront two persons he charged with being in on the plot. The prisoner, who has been a mysterious figure in the case for days and was interviewed in the Tombs by a confidential representative of Colonel Lindbergh last week, was identified today as John Smith when he left New York. It was learned, however, his real name is Charles Fitzgerald.

No Statement

OTTAWA, Ont., March 15.—The government had no statement to make in the matter at present. This was the statement of H. H. Will Search For Lost Fur Ship

NOME, Alaska, Mar. 15.—(A.P.)—Airplane search for the lost fur ship Baychimo in the Arctic ice will be made with the opening today of a regular air mail route from here to Point Barrow.

The plane will be flown by W. B. Graham, Alaska pilot, and a man named Laddin and Mrs. Edna Christofferson, Portland, Ore., sportswoman, will accompany him as passengers.

Several intermediate stops were scheduled and the search out over the Arctic ocean will be made after leaving Walwright. Graham and Mrs. Christofferson expected to find the "ghost vessel," and salvage furs they believed still aboard. Graham said the new air mail line will connect at Unalaklik, southeast of here, with the mail planes from the Yukon.

The Alaska pilot and Mrs. Christofferson came north recently from Seattle. They were lost several days in northern British Columbia when their plane was forced down in a storm.

Too Tired To Carry On

A younger brother of Kreuger was making arrangements to have the body taken back to his native Sweden for burial.

FRANCE LIFTS EMBARGO ON CAN. FRUITS

PARIS, March 15.—(A.P.)—The French Government tonight lifted a blanket embargo on fresh fruits from Canada, the United States and several countries, imposing instead conditions under which fruit will be admitted. The embargo was imposed last week to prevent the entrance of the San Jose scale into France.

The Ministry of Agriculture order also made a special provision for fruit, in French ports or in transit when the decree of March was promulgated.

Fruit importers protested when the embargo was clamped on last week, declaring that losses to shippers would amount to many thousands of dollars, because importers or shippers could not reship before the fruit spoiled.

West Indies Will Be Represented

GRANBY, Que., March 15.—(By the Canadian Press)—In the interest of Empire Trade the West Indies should be directly represented at the coming Imperial Conference at Ottawa it was resolved by the Granby Board of Trade at a meeting held here today.

Mrs. Gandhi Is Re-Arrested

BARDOLI, India, Mar. 15.—(A.P.)—Mrs. M. K. Gandhi, wife of the Nationalist leader, was arrested again today and sentenced to six months imprisonment for participation in the civil disobedience campaign.

She was arrested first on Jan. 11, after her husband had gone to jail, and served six weeks.

Is Determined To Abolish Oath

DUBLIN, IRISH FREE STATE, Mar. 15.—(AP)—Eamon De Valera, new President of the Free State, reaffirmed his determination to abolish the oath of allegiance to the British Crown when he appeared before the Dail tonight.

He followed his statement by asserting that when the oath is removed there would be no excuse for disobedience to the law, an assertion which some of his hearers interpreted as a hint to extremists that they would be allowed to cause no trouble.

The President was replying to questions as to the release of political prisoners.

"We want every section of the community," he said, "to be able to send its representatives to the Assembly without having to coerce their consciences by taking the oath."

"We have a mandate to remove it. When it is removed I say there will be no excuse for anyone not to give perfectly willing obedience to the law. During the election we made it clear that we stood for one government and one army."

The President introduced no legislation for the purpose of removing the oath, however, and the Dail adjourned until April 20, after a quiet session.

FLASH

SYDNEY, Australia, Mar. 15.—Premier T. Lang, of New South Wales was closely guarded by police today on reports that an attempt would be made to kidnap him. It was understood that the kidnapers planned to seize the Premier and prevent him from formally opening the new Harbor bridge here. The bridge is the longest suspension arch bridge in the world.
