A correspondent writing the Farmer's Advocate says: another year has been entered upon, and looking back over the past, the Prince Edward Island farmer may say like the Psalmist of old: "The lines are fallen unto me in pleasant places; yea, I have a goodly heritage." True he may not make as much money as his brother in the "Golden West," but he generally has enough and to spare. The poet Longfellow's description of the Acadian farmers, in his Evangeline— "There the richest was poor, And the poorest lived in abundance" applies to the Prince Edward Islander in a very marked manner. There are doubtless a few people not so well fed and clothed as one could wish, due generally to laziness and shiftlessness; but the heart-rending scenes of poverty and misery so prevalent in the Old Land are entirely unknown here. Very few farmers have their supply of wood out yet, as there have only been a few weeks of sleighing this winter. Winter here so far has been very mild, which has helped out the feed greatly. There is a good supply of straw, but some farmers are, short of hay for milk cows, as the clover was all winter-killed last year; and after seeing the fields all stripped of snow so often this winter, the prospects are that this year it will be the same. Pork has dropped in price since last writing. Beef is dull, hides have gone down almost to nothing, but butter is higher than before. Eggs are also a good price. If more farmers would go in for winter dairying and pork-raising, instead of selling off their produce, they would improve their farms and better themselves financially as well, as, without a doubt, this is the best paying branch of farm husbandry.

At a recent hockey match in the Hillsboro Rink between the Rogers Hardware Co., and Goff & Co., the former were the successful players. The score was 8-3.

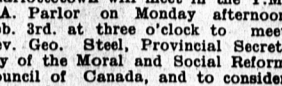
Prof. Theo. Ross, City, left yesterday afternoon for Georgetown en route to Ottawa where he will attend a meeting of the Canadian Seed Growers' Association, which meets in that city on Monday next.

The Ministerial Association of Charlottetown will meet in the Y.M.C.A. Parlor on Monday afternoon Feb. 3rd, at three o'clock to meet Rev. Geo. The marriage occurred on Saturday evening at the residence of the bride's mother, Mrs. M. A. Green, Vancouver, of Miss Bertha Hannah Green, of Prince Edward Island and Jas. Springfield, of Edmonton, Alt. The ceremony was performed by Rev. J. P. Westman in the presence of a number of friends and relatives of the bride and groom. The bride wore a dainty gown of white point d'esprit over white Louise silk, and carried white carnations. She was attended by Miss Francis McKeen who was prettily dressed in blue silk mull. Chester Green acted as best man. After congratulations had been offered, a supper was served. The bride received a great number of costly and handsome gifts.

Yesterday morning the body of the late Premier Peters was early brought to St. Peter's Cathedral where at eight o'clock a service was held. The body was afterwards taken to the Provincial building. It was an impressive scene that was presented yesterday afternoon in the Legislative Council Chamber, where lay in state the body of the late Premier. The spacious chamber, where often he had sat to conduct the business of his native Province; where he as leader of the Government had year by year lifted up his voice, and which had often been the scene of parliamentary debates in which he had borne a strenuous part was now turned into a chamber of mourning and draped with hangings expressive of the regret of the people the late leader had so ably represented. Many passed through and viewed the body as it lay in its casket, surrounded by floral offerings from those who mourned for the dead man. Military guards stood silently guarding the body, and on duty at the doors. At half past two the funeral procession was formed as outlined in yesterday's Guardian, and moved off over the snow covered streets and through the bitter cold of a typical winter day to St. Peter's Cathedral, where the burial service of the Church of England was said by Canon Simpson, assisted by Rev. S. J. Woodroffe of St. Paul's, and a full choir. After the affecting service had been finished, the procession proceeded to St. Peter's Cemetery, where interment took place. The body was accompanied to the grave by the military guard of honor, the mourners, and many citizens. The last prayer was then said at the graveside by Canon Simpson, and the firing party fired three blank rounds over the grave of the departed Premier.
