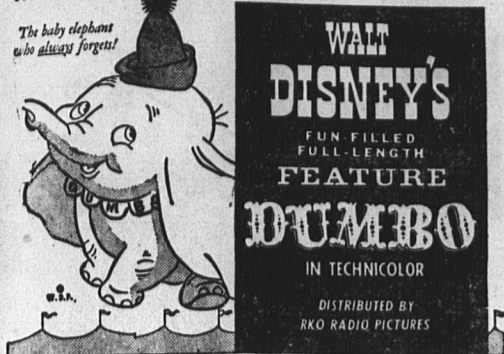

OTTAWA, June 18—(CP)—The Royal Canadian Air Force in its 294th casualty list of the war today listed the names of eight men missing after air operations, one previously reported missing who now is reported prisoner of war, one seriously injured on active service and two seriously ill—all overseas.

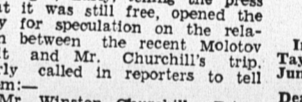

Psychic mediums who claim to retain their earthly personalities, because he said he frequently had received "communications" from his soldier son, Raymond, who died on a Flanders battlefield in 1916.

He wanted to prove his psychic ideas, so he left secret messages in a sealed envelope—which he promised to repeat in a message from the other side.

No living person knows the contents of that envelope. So if a medium appeared with a bit of ghostly writing that duplicated the Lodge message, it would be pretty convincing proof that there was something substantial in the theories to which Sir Oliver devoted half his lifetime.

Psychicists refuse, however, to admit the converse—the failure of Lodge to communicate with his earthly friends would invalidate the theories of psychic research.

After Sir Oliver prepared the messages and tuned them over to the society of psychical research, he commented: "When the right people are sitting with a medium I shall try to give them the message, but it might take as long as a year."

Then he died, Aug. 22, 1940. I have just visited the society whose secretary W. H. Salter is in custody of the Lodge letter.

Salter, a big red-faced Englishman, was unhesitatingly skeptical in describing psychic phenomena—even those he said he had witnessed.

I learned from him that several hundred messages had been reported by professional and amateur mediums as coming from the late Sir Oliver but none was considered worth digging the sealed envelope from its resting place away from wartime bombing threats.

chase of many consumed goods must be curtailed and everybody must invest in war savings. The government is asking for \$150,000,000 this year which is \$12 for every man, woman and child in the Dominion, he said.

Mr. Turner asserted that in the near future it was hoped that every child in Canada would have these stamps for sale. He appealed to the Women's Institute to promote the investment in war savings among their members.

Mr. J. W. Gillespie, field worker of the Canadian National Institute for the blind, Halifax, spoke of the work being done for the blind. He explained that there has been a school for the blind in the Maritimes for 75 years. There are 2,381 blind people in the Maritimes provinces—141 on Prince Edward Island. He went on to describe some of the work being done.

drenched the battlefield where the Russians have stood firm against a nine-day German offensive. Sevastopol admittedly was hard pressed by the battering land and air assaults which started June 5, but according to official sources in Moscow the lines had not been penetrated.

The German high command claimed its troops were winning bitterly-defended ground at the Soviet naval base, fall of which would remove a threat to the flank of the expected Nazi thrust from the Crimea toward the oil lands of the Caucasus.

The German communique claimed Nazi troops "stormed the main forts in the northern part of the defence system, including the Maxim Gorky fort, the most modern and strongest bastion of the whole fortress," and drove through to within two miles of Sevastopol harbor.
