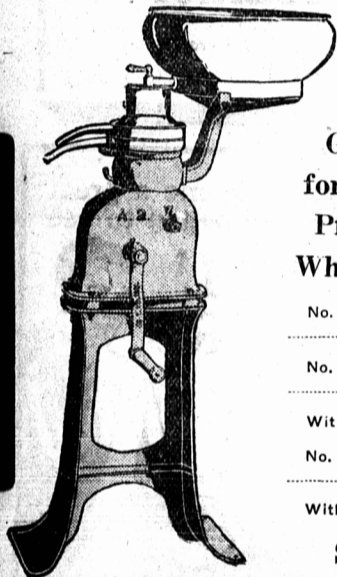

—PROMINENT VISITOR TO CONDUCT SERVICE.—Special Evangelistic services will be held in Montague Christian Church, beginning Sunday June 15th. Rev. R. W. —LOBSTER FISHING SLACK.—The first week of June, this year saw only about an average catch of 200 lbs. lobster per boat. In a great many cases the average per day was much less. At the corresponding date last year the catches averaged 1,000 to 1,200 lbs. per boat. Quite a come down. Monday of this week was windy from the north east and not a general fishing day. No doubt the greatly diminished catch not only on the Island but also in Nova Scotia and Madagalen, must necessarily inflate prices possibly to double the present or past market prices of lobsters. If this materializes, as it must, and the fishermen get double the price scheduled in the beginning of the season, they would be able to come out fair. In other words, if instead of \$3. and \$6 (half line or whole) the market warrants the paying the fishermen \$6 and \$12 per cwt the fishermen would come out at just a moderately diminished wage.

—CROP REPORT.—First crop clover and timothy coming good, old meadow not good, neither old pasture. Grain coming above ground satisfactorily, particularly early sown wheat. Blade looking well. Pasture, as a rule poor and all animals still housed at night, and stable fed. Ground not saturated, and much rain will be needed this summer to make good crops. Slightly less than the usual acreage of grain sown and undoubtedly a much larger acreage of potatoes.

—SUDDEN DEATH.—The community of Georgetown was shocked to learn of the death of Mrs. John King whose death occurred at her home on Sunday, June 8th after a short illness. Life is dear to youth and death seems meant for those of mature years but when her spiritual adviser Rev. Father Kiggins assured her that the Master is there and calleth for thee, her sacrifice of life was generously made all touch with earth seemed to fall asunder and conscious to the last her going forth was only a leave taking, a going ahead to the Home land. Mrs. King was a woman of an excellent character, a favorite with both young and old. Her death was of a kind and loving disposition and will be missed by all. She leaves to mourn besides her sorrowing husband, three daughters Jennie and Priscilla at home, and Annie in United States. Sincere sympathy is extended to the family in their sad and sudden affliction. May her soul rest in peace.—A

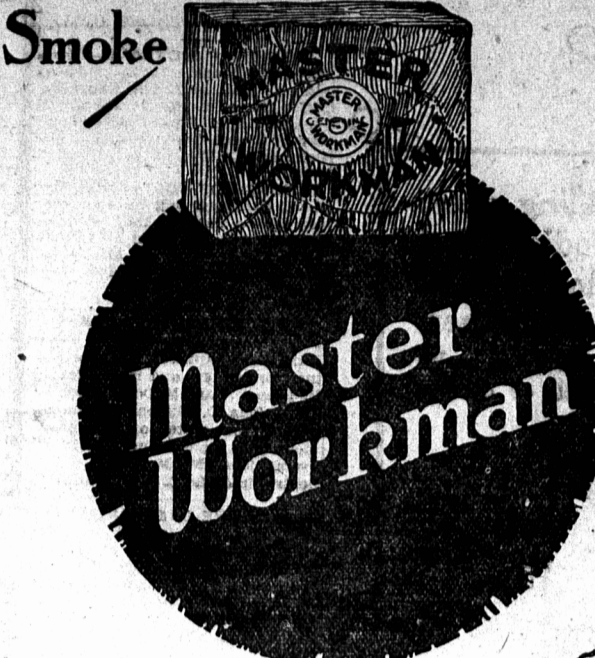

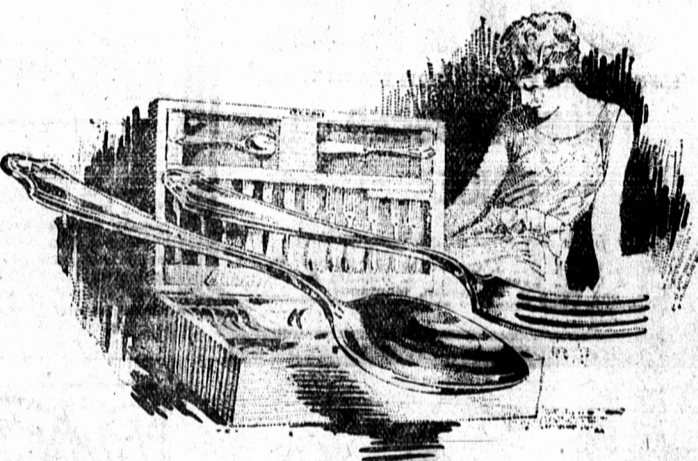
