A MORE HIGHLY CONCENTRATED FERTILIZER NEEDED

Sir.—The usual fertilizer used here for potatoes is a 4-8-7 or a 5-8-7 or variations of these. With the materials obtained for home-mixing these are about as strong a formula as can be made. The 5-8-7 formula has proved satisfactory in Aroostook as well as here on the Island. The Aroostook farmers are proving by experiments carried on the past two years that what is called a "double strength" 10-16-14 fertilizer has been giving every bit as good satisfaction in applying but one-half the quantity as of the common "single strength" 5-8-7. Director W. J. Morse of the Maine Station, is authority for the statement that the 10-16-14 potato fertilizer at the Aroostook County Farm, both this year and last, gave satisfactory results equal in every way to the leaner, less rich, 5-8-7 formula. It is easy to see the advantages of saving labor in hauling, handling this "double strength" fertilizer. Results in the field with 10-16-14 fertilizer, they say, are equal in all cases, and in some cases superior to a 5-8-7 mixture, furnishing the same amount of plant food per acre. Apparently Aroostook farmers are like those in other sections. They can see no reason for hauling and handling two tons of fertilizer if one ton will give equally good results. I am sir, etc.

FATTENING STEERS ON CULL POTATOES

(Experimental Farm Note)

The Dominion Experimental Station at Charlottetown, P. E. I., has conducted a number of experiments in feeding cull or refuse potatoes to steers, starting in the autumn of 1924 with three pens fed swede turnips and three pens fed cull potatoes. The results of two of these experiments have been published in the annual reports of the Station and the results of the third will be published in the 1928 report.

The swede turnips were valued at \$2.00 per ton and the cull potatoes at \$4.00 per ton for feeding. It was found that cull potatoes could be used to advantage to replace turnips in fattening steers. In fact, up to the present time the increased gain of the steers fed the cull potatoes was more than paid for the extra cost of the potatoes, even though the latter were valued at double the price of swede turnips. The increased gains of the steers fed either potatoes or turnips over those not receiving either of these succulent feeds averaged over one half pound gain per steer per day. The average profit over feed on steers fed swede turnips or cull potatoes was \$18.75 above that on steers finished without these succulent feeds.

It was found that not only did roots or potatoes hasten the fattening of the steers but the quality of the finish was greatly improved and the steers receiving these feeds command a much higher price on the market.

The feeding of moderate quantities of cull potatoes to stock is recommended during seasons when the price for potatoes is low. The feeder must be the judge of the quantity that the animal can use to advantage, but twenty-five pounds per steer per day were fed to advantage in the experiments mentioned.

EARLY TULIPS FOR BRILLIANT COLORS

The single early tulips, coming early in April, give the first brilliant scarlets and other shades of red in the garden. While the single early tulips have been overshadowed by the magnificence of the May flowering types which are double their height and size, they are regaining much of their former popularity as their value in the garden is appreciated. There is nothing else to give their color at their season of bloom.

The single early tulips with their rather short stems, compared with Darwin's, their uniform height and regular flowers are specially adapted for formal beds where they give glowing sheets of color before the trees are leaved out. They are also very effective scattered in groups of from six to a dozen through perennial beds and borders.

There have been new large flowered single tulips, later than the majority of the class, introduced in recent years which now take the single early tulip season along so that it overlaps the May flowering varieties such as General De Wet, a magnificent orange tulip of great size, and Sarah Bernhardt or Hobbema, a peculiar rose shade.

The single early tulips are also best adapted for pot plants, but the usual gardener is not likely to have the success with tulips indoors that he will with narcissi or hyacinths.
