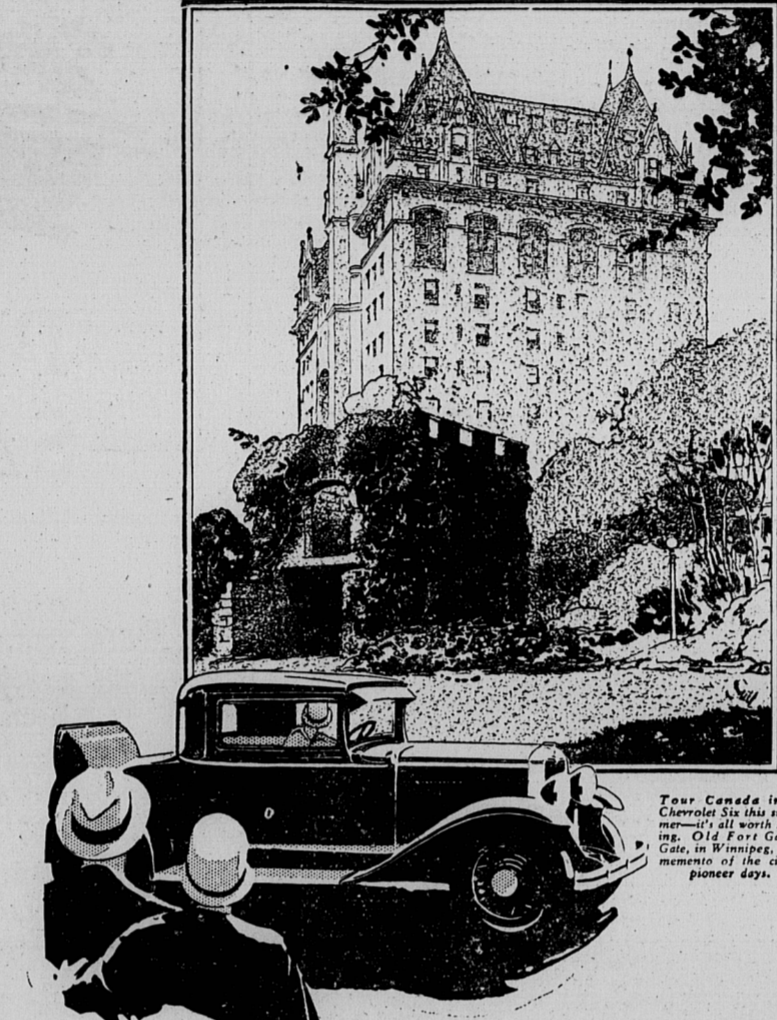

Flooded Under 7 Feet Of Water

LONDON, June 19—England was drenched by a terrific rain and wind storm today, resulting in two known deaths and much property damage.

Two persons were drowned in the floods in the New Mills area at Manchester where several miles of roads were under water and traffic halted. Many children were rescued from upper floors by persons with ladders.

Many farms in Lancashire and Cheshire were isolated, roads being flooded to a depth of seven feet in some instances. Losses of cattle were anticipated.

Traffic was temporarily disrupted in London during the rush hour, due to flooding of the streets and a short circuit in the electric power lines.

Houses in Wembley were reported flooded and lightning caused one fire when it struck a house at Leighton.

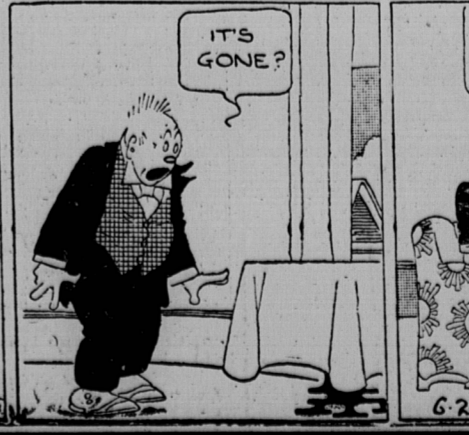
