New Housing Projects Underway In Halifax

HALIFAX, April 29—(CP)—Two new housing projects to provide 550 homes in the Halifax-Dartmouth area are being considered by Central Mortgage and Housing Corporation, the respective municipal governments and private interests, it was reported today.

The new Halifax plan for 180 homes would bring to 638 the number on schedule under three agreements. Preliminary work on a 305-house project already has begun and another 180-house development is contemplated.

Plans for the Dartmouth venture—the largest residential project ever considered in the harbor town—call for 400 homes, a modern community hall and a condensed business section.

Mayor J. E. (Gee) Ahern of Halifax said demand for housing—both for rent and purchase—is "just as great as ever" and his office was flooded daily with appeals for accommodation.

Official Story Of Canadian Army Published May 5

OTTAWA, April 29—(CP)—The official story of the Canadian Army in the Second World War will be published May 5 in a 18,000-word book written by Col. Charles Stacey, director of the Historical Section of the General Staff.

Issued by the Defence Department, it is described as a "historical summary" and simply entitled "The Canadian Army, 1939-45". The first printing is 10,000 copies. (\$2.50).

In the preface, Col. Stacey emphasizes that this is an interim report on the Army—a summary, not a history. A four-volume official history proper is being prepared, with 1950 the target date for completion.

This interim book, with 12 colored paintings by Canadian war artists, 15 maps in color and three in black and white, is a painstaking, detailed work covering the Canadian Army through its training, its build-up and its campaigns.

It is an immensely worth-while record and the speed in which it was compiled exceptional for any comprehensive official book—is a tribute to the determination and diligence of Col. Stacey and his historical section.

The author had access to all relevant official documents in the possession of Defence Headquarters and has produced a book that rings with authenticity through its 312 pages.

Highlight is the account of the Dieppe raid of Aug. 19, 1942. With complete details and documents available, both Allied and German, Col. Stacey in this lengthy chapter provides a series of hitherto undisclosed facts.

The campaigns in Sicily, Italy and Northwest Europe are described in detail, as well as all secondary Canadian operations. Writing from a background of regimental

war diaries and a mass of military information collected by the Historical Section both during the war and since, the author will find few, if any, former soldiers who would dispute his campaign accounts.

The immense detail slows the pace of the story considerably but in the field of official histories it is an exceptionally notable effort. They are usually inclined to be dry. This one is not.

Some of the most controversial issues in the Army's story are touched upon lightly, however. This is the one disappointment that a careful reader will find. It is to be hoped that in the four subsequent volumes the whole story will be given the public.

These controversies include the retirement of Gen. A. G. L. McNair from command of the 1st Canadian Army as a result of the Government's decision to split the Army late in 1943, the reinforcement crisis in the summer and fall of 1944, and several battlefield disputes, especially during the Caen battle, between commanders.

Says Gov't Could Not Sponsor Strip Mining In Alberta

OTTAWA, April 29—(CP)—A Cabinet source said today the Government could not sponsor an offer by Sir Albert Braithwaite to bring 3,000 skilled British workers to Canada to start strip-mining in Alberta coal fields.

The source said the proposal has not been discussed by the Cabinet and that, as far as he knows, it will not be discussed. He said the plan is "interesting" but made no comment on its practicability.

Sir Albert, British engineer and former coal-mine operator, made the offer at a non-partisan dinner here last night. He explained, however, that he already had been refused permission by the Bank of England to export capital to finance the venture.

WHAT WILL CHURCHMEN DO?

We are facing a tremendous problem of adult delinquency today. The liquor traffic can be combated by determined churchmen and women. There must be a unity that this is a personal matter. We must be of purpose and sanity of approach; but most of all, effort to combat the liquor traffic. They could if they would, in my town and in your town, must accept their responsibility in this matter. If not, why should they call themselves Christians?

Yes, my town, with its fine factories, schools Young Men's and Young Women's Christian Association buildings is a fine place to live; but it would be a lot finer if the members of our seventy-five churches would come together in a cooperative effort to combat the liquor traffic. They could if they would, in my town and in your town. — The American Issue.

PAUL ADMONISHES THE CHURCHES

1 Cor. 11: 20-27; Romans 13: 13, 14; Eph. 5: 18-21

This is a real temperance lesson in which the admonitions from Paul's letters to drunkards and social impurity in no uncertain language. The apostle even affirms that those guilty of such unrighteous deeds shall not inherit the Kingdom of God so we need have no compunction about warnings against intemperance.

At the Church in Corinth there were people who even used the Lord's Supper as an occasion for revelry. The whole observance was so perverted as to destroy its meaning and value. They were greedy and selfish with no measure of self-control. No wonder Paul denounces their conduct and with tones of anger in his voice. The abuse was partly due, of course, to the association of the sacred rite with a meal. This is no longer done in Christian groups so that the abuses seem quite foreign to us but the principle of self-control is a valid one and requires our attention in many other situations.
