SERMON ON SHAKESPEARE

LESSON II. JULY 10. GOLDEN TEXT. "The words that I speak unto you, they are spirit and they are life."—John 6:63.

UNEXPECTED SUGGESTIONS.

Kindness enthroned in the heart of kingliness opens the way to the King. The poor, and the burdened, and the wronged, and the suffering may make free claim to His compassion and His power. And kindness and kingliness never hesitate to perform the deed of mercy because of the laugh of the scorners.

"It is more blessed to give than to receive." That is the teaching of greatness when the choice element of that greatness is goodness. One may be a great athlete, or a great scholar, or a great financier, and at the same time be a dwarfed and withered soul. But Jesus desires most of all that the strength of men shall be manifest in the things and doings which are gracious.

Nothing can repair the damage of persistent enmity. It taints all that it touches and carries all that it can lay hold upon down to destruction. Faith brings Jesus into yoked companionship with the believer, and lo! it is the easy, restful yoke of love.

Go to headquarters to get your difficulties stretched out and the kinks in your understanding of things removed. What does it matter concerning the opinions of those who are like fickle and jealous-minded children who are not content at any game?

Delight thyself in the Sabbath. Make it a delight, the holy of the Lord, honorable. . . . then shalt thou delight thyself in the Lord. The best use of the Sabbath is the use which brings men into the closest and most joyful relation to God. The Sabbath is a privilege. It was made for man.

Offences must needs come, but woe to the man by whom they come! Jesus Christ admits no divisive forces in His kingdom. That were a folly with which one would not even charge the devil. The claims of Jesus are too tremendous to be trifled with. "He that believeth not hath been judged already."

Murder is not a crime of the hand so much as it is the foul sin of the heart. "He that hateth his brother is a murderer." Conscience says so, one day it will waken the murderer as though the dead were at his elbow. But every sin is born of some lust. Those of Herod and Herodias and Salome wallowed deeply.

Observe the tenderness and sympathy of Jesus at every turn of His kingdom-teaching ministry. No need of the people escaped Him and no sorrow failed to find Him as a sinner.

Fear not. Jesus is Master. There is no night so dark and there is no storm so violent, and there is no wave so mighty, and there is no sea so deep that Jesus cannot reach and save the one in peril. Let these things figure what they may.

God's great purposes will always bend to meet the faith whose humility and wit makes its argument and appeal for mercy. There is nothing flabby and characterless about faith. Its footstool is reason and just overhead is God.

Only a seed! But where did it fall? Harvests depend upon the nature of the soil upon which the seed is scattered. The homesteader is anxious about that. His future success is bound up largely in that. And what the soil of the heart may be is surely worth as much consideration. The harvests of heaven are growing to-day.

FASHIONABLE DRESS IN THE DAYS OF MADISON.

There was a pleasing imitation of the costumes of the classic Greek age, and the gowns, which were cut low in the neck, with a muslin ruff behind the head, hung in graceful, natural folds. Tight lacing was not so important to a lady wearing the "round gown," for it was gathered loosely only a short distance below the shoulders. The gloves came up to the elbows, and the slippers of kid or silk barely covered the toes and had no heels. In England at this time a lady wearing she went to court wore an enormous dress puffed out with hundreds of flounces and frills; but there were no special costumes prescribed or worn for the White House. The skirts of the older women trailed in real trains as we understand them, and the girls wore skirts which barely reached to their ankles.

The costumes of many of the men lent color to the scene. Although the president himself wore a black suit with black silk stockings, others had light blue or green coats, garnished with large gilt or pearl buttons, the long narrow tails reaching down to their calves. Pantaloon were common in general use, but were not as yet permitted for evening wear, and buff-colored or drab small stockings were worn with white silk stockings. It was about the time that Beau Brummel introduced starch into the neck-cloths of Europe, and many gentlemen in America obeyed his edict. The ends of their shirt collars stuck up over their chains and reached to their ears. Some of them wore what they called "puffing cravats," which were designed to puff out the chest and make it appear deep; and all had fine cambic shirt-frills. They wore patent-leather pumps or low shoes with buckles, boots being forbidden for the evening, because the blacking came off when it came in contact with ladies' dresses. Some of the older men had their hair powdered, combed back and gathered in a queue behind, but the style was going out, and the

younger men were a few fops had it in curls over the head. The snuff-box was in use, and Mrs. Madison carried one made of ivory, but after her young friend Henry Clay came to Washington she took her snuff from his box, when he was at her receptions, not only as a mark of her favor, but because he always carried a fine brand of rappee.—Gailard Hunt, in Harper's Magazine for June.

The forces of righteousness have a harder battle before them to do what bribery had the United States against Spain or Japan against Russia. The enemy is an octopus with tentacles reaching through every department of life, when one limb is hacked away a hundred seem to grow in its place. The worst feature about it is that the higher the civilization apparently the more widespread the evil. Not unnaturally in a low state of civilization a few rule; in a high state many have power. It is only where men have personal power or influence to sell that political bribery can exist. The United States is in the van of civilization, and within her borders are more fingers contaminated with base bribes, more men who have sold the mighty space of their large honors than there are in any other civilized country. On the other hand there is a stalwart army of earnest men and women vigorously and fearlessly fighting the forces of corruption. They are the leaven of righteousness in the nation, and, in the end, their influence must prevail; otherwise creation has been in vain and society is a farce.

The examples of the contempt and abhorrence in which bribery is held are manifold. In what horror is the act of Judas, which took place two thousand years ago still held by humanity; the name of Benedict Arnold, one of the bravest soldiers that ever led a charge, is as we have pointed out in a previous sermon, the most abominated in America. The one sold his friend and leader for a base bribe, the other attempted to sell his country. Not all the water on the surface of the globe can wash their deeds from the memory of man, not all the fire in the bowels of the earth can purify their names. Yet every man who, in any degree, is induced by a bribe to break a trust or self-principle is a Judas or an Arnold.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

Any person who presents a quarter-section of any male over 18 years old may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending home steader.

Duties.—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on an arm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may present a quarter-section along with his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a pre-emption, may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$5.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.
