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Fighting Resumed By Mexican Rebels

VERA CRUZ, Mexico, May 13.—Fighting between Carranza forces and rebel troops was under way at Hacienda Tamaziz, according to advices here late today. President Carranza's forces said he refused to surrender, despite the fact that the revolutionists offered him safe conduct to Vera Cruz. The battle was described as especially fierce with about 20,000 men engaged. Carranza has about six thousand men, advices here indicated. The revolutionists are confident of victory, declaring they would win because of their superiority in numbers.

Highway Men on the Witness Stand

NEW GLASGOW, N. S., May 12.—The preliminary examination of the highwaymen, Jack MacGillivray and Gus McNeill who figured in the sensational robbery at Thorburn, attracted a great deal of attention today. The place in which the proceedings were held was packed all eager to have a look at the principals. Crown Prosecutor R. Douglas Graham conducted the examination but nothing, but what has already been told was brought out.

Both the accused in turn took the stand and under oath frankly related the story of the crime and their subsequent efforts to get away. Their only anxiety was to get across the line. They had worked together in Butte, Montana, and in Boston. They made no effort to hide any part of their story, and at its close they were committed to stand trial for robbery and shooting in the Supreme Court. They were later taken to the County Jail in Pictou to await the session of the Supreme Court, unless they elect to be tried before the County Court, Judge Patterson, under the Speedy Trials Act.

HINTS FOR The Motorist

BY ALBERT L. CLOUGH

SPECIALIZED INFORMATION ON MOTOR CAR COMPONENTS

Thorough Understanding Of A Car Conduces To Satisfactory Service

In this series of articles, urgent pleas have repeatedly been given that more consideration be given to the matter contained in the instruction books furnished with motor cars, that such books be kept where readily available and that the material embodied in them be fully mastered and conscientiously applied by owners. This is because the instruction book is the best treatise obtainable upon the care and operation of any particular mode of car—a specialized work, gotten out by experienced experts. It is, however, perfectly logical to go further in the same direction and apply the same idea to the auxiliary apparatus used upon cars, which is not built by the car makers themselves and concerning which detailed instructions cannot readily be included in the car instruction book itself. Under this head are included the fuel-feed system, the carburetor, the storage battery, the ignition system, the starting and lighting apparatus, the tires and rims and even the horn. The manufacturer of each one of these pieces of apparatus publishes what he will readily furnish upon request, special printed matter relative to the care and adjustment of his produce and every motorist should be in possession of such literature as is applicable to his particular equipment. Carburetor books, let us give refined methods of adjustment; instructions for forestalling and overcoming troubles—are contained in the fuel feed and electrical system treatises and the storage battery book is almost essential, as car instruction books usually touch but lightly upon this subject. To know one's car is the first condition of success with it and the way to accomplish this is to learn everything possible about it.

J. A. writes: Sometimes, when pulling hard on intermediate speed, the gears of my car jump out of mesh. Why is this and what is the remedy?

Answer: This is probably due to weakness in the gear locking device. This usually consists of a pointed ended plunger, operated by a spring, which engages a slot in the shifter bar, when the gear is fully in engagement and is supposed to hold it in position. The plunger end of the slot may be worn out of shape, the spring may be weak or the plunger may be some misjudgment that prevents the shifter bar being moved enough to let the plunger fully into the slot. It is also possible that the faces of the intermediate gears have been battered out of shape to such an extent that they have required a tendency to pull away from each other sideways. If you take the cover off the transmission so that all parts are exposed and note the action of the lock and gears when in middle speed position, we believe that you will discover the cause of this trouble.

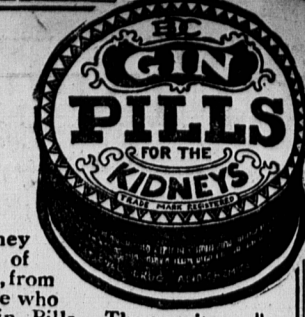
