Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years of age, may homestead a quarter section available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry proxies may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency but not Sub-Agency on certain conditions.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$1.00 per acre. Duties—Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent; also 30 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$1.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years cultivate 30 acres and erect a house worth \$300. The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

Letter From England

Mrs. James Power, Emerald, has received the following letter from Pte. Edward T. Croken of the 105th Battalion, now in England: Shorncliffe, Eng. Oct. 25th, 1915

Dear Madam:— You will no doubt be surprised to receive a letter from me but as I have quite a few idle moments I sometimes like to occupy them by writing to some good old friends I used to know. I hope the arrival of this will find you and family all in good health. I read the Emerald Notes in the Guardian and see that Mayme spent a week with you, that is no doubt some time ago as it takes a parcel of papers anywhere from six weeks to almost six months to reach us, therefore news received from that source is generally a few days late. Letters on the other hand are not so long about coming. Three weeks is about the time required for letters to come from Canada. There is such an enormous amount of mail coming across that you will easily understand why the papers are not delivered as speedily as the letters. I suppose you have no doubt heard a considerable amount about the movements of the 105th Battalion since we left Cherbourg on the morning of July 16th and after sailing for eight days landed in Liverpool. As far as weather conditions were concerned we had all that could be desired as the waters of the mighty ocean were almost as peaceful as a mill pond. We had on board almost five thousand troops and believe me we spent many anxious moments on board ship. We were chased by a German war craft but luck favored us and we escaped. It would be hard enough to meet death on the battlefield but to be sunk in mid ocean was not a very pleasant thought. There is no great danger in crossing as the British Navy controls the sea but there is always a chance of the Germans getting a shot in once in a while and they are pretty crafty people and always on the alert—have you already aware they have sunk quite a number of ships.

After landing we went aboard the train and had a pleasant ride across the country about two hundred miles. To describe the beauties of England would take a much abler pen than mine. On we travelled through parts of London but not the most interesting ones. Will see it all when I get my furlough. I also expect to visit Scotland and K. I. in the near future. We do see some grand sights and when we return will be able to give a general description of our travels you would no doubt ask about the war. That is a question I would like to be able to answer. It is looking fairly bright at present and it is the opinion of military authorities over here that the end is not far distant. Let us hope so. I do not think that I will see much of it for some months to come. I hear from Frank and Eugene quite often. They are both in the firing line at present and at latest reports are getting along O. K. Luck must have been with Frank as he has been in some of the worst battles of the present war and that is saying something. Out of the original 26th Battalion, which he belongs to there is less than thirty men left. The majority of them have been wounded. I met quite a few returned soldiers that knew him on the firing line. He and Eugene met in France and spent a day together. I sure would like to have been with them but if everything goes all right I expect that we will all return to Canada together. This of course is something we cannot foresee and remains to be decided by Him who has control of our future actions. There are very few if any who would not like to return to the dear ones on P. E. I. who are no doubt doing their best to keep the home fires burning. I have an idea that there are a good many anxious people down there as long as we remain in England. My writing desk is a soldiers kit and I am laying on the tent floor—not a very good position but I am getting used to it now. Give my regards to all my old friends in Emerald. I would write to them all but as you know it is only occasionally that we get the time. Remember me to Mr. Power and all the family also to Mrs. McKenna and family tell George I will drop him a line some time. Another German Lie Naked by Britain

(Canadian Press Despatch.) LONDON, November 7.—The admiralty tonight in a published communique, again denies that it ever issued orders that survivors of German submarines need not be rescued.

The communique states that the German press "is trying to make capital out of what they describe as a second Baralong case, possibly in order to incite American opinion against Great Britain, or as a pretext for an unrestrained submarine campaign."

The communique cites the facts of the case showing that a British auxiliary, flying a neutral flag, on September 24, 1915, approached a German submarine in the western channel engaged in sinking a British merchantman. When within range the auxiliary hoisted a white ensign and fired on and sank the submarine, and then rescued the crew of the merchantman from their boats. When this was done she also rescued two of the submarine's crew, who had climbed into a drifting boat.
