MONCTON, Feb. 19—The preliminary investigation case of Oliver Steeves, charged with the murder of his wife Lucy Steeves, opened at Courville last yesterday afternoon before the justice of the peace, Councillor John W. Gaskin.

The courtroom was crowded with spectators, including many women and many who had driven a considerable distance to attend. Several witnesses were examined but there were no new developments.

GUARRELS WERE COMMON

One of the witnesses, the nearest neighbor, who lived just across the road, swore that quarrelling was so common in the Steeves house that he paid very little attention to it in fact he heard so much noise from that quarter that when there was a lull he was inclined to look around and see why things were so quiet.

Another new point brought out was the fact that some sugar and other stuff brought home by Steeves from Moncton the night before the fire was left on the sled outside all night. The Attorney General was represented by Clerk of the Peace, Lester Smith and James C. Sheeran, while James Friel K. C. appeared for prisoner.

Father-in-law's Story

Joseph Steeves, father-in-law of the accused and the complainant in the case, was called first. He stated that his daughter Mrs. Steeves had been living at Pine Glen, (Niagara Road) some years ago.

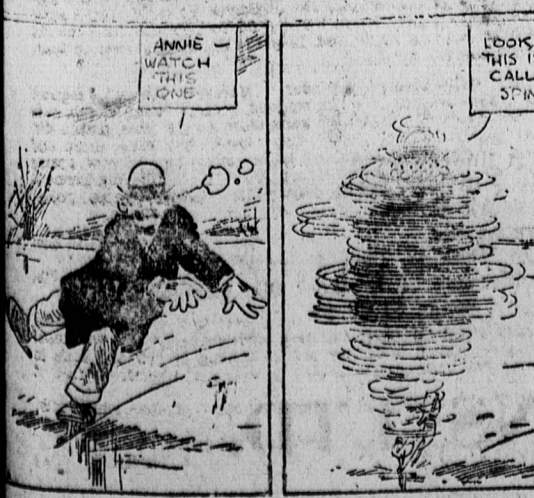
KEEPING BY THEMSELVES FARMERS IN HOUSE ARE WELL

ABLE LENTEN SERMON BY REV. DR. MCLELLAN

Faking as His Subject Romans xiii; 1-2, the Preacher Makes a Strong Appeal for Fuller Obedience to Established Authority.

In St. Dunstan's Cathedral on Sunday evening, Rev. G. D. McLellan, D. D., took as his text, Romans, XIII, 1-2: "Let every soul be subject unto the higher power, for there is no power but of God: the powers that be are ordained of God. Whosoever therefore resisteth the power, resisteth the ordinance of God: and they that resist shall receive to themselves damnation."

Even to the casual observer, the preacher said it is evident that the world today is filled with turmoil and unrest. To one who studies things with relation to their cause, it has still deeper import. But to those who are called upon to teach and to give remedies for their cure, these evils are of still greater moment. Our Holy Father, who is the head of the Universal Church, is in a position to know exactly the conditions as they exist in every country. He, being the head of an Institution with a history and traditions of nine thousand years, can study the present day conditions in the light of that long history and tradition. Moreover, as the successor of him who was charged to teach all nations, it develops upon him to give the goods which these evils may be cured and by which the unrest and turmoil now existing in the world may be overcome.

Our Holy Father has pointed out five causes which he has assigned as the principal ones responsible for the appalling conditions to be found the world over. First among these causes is the denial of authority.

Authority means superiority, and it carries with it the obligation of obedience upon those who come under that authority. For the origin of authority itself we must go back to God, the Being infinite and omnipotent, whose essence and existence are the same, and who desiring that these should be mankind, to share in His perfections willed these creatures into existence. Witness said he had built the house in which the Steeves family lived. There was one room down stairs and one room upstairs and the house was not plastered. Mr. Steeves was stood aside to be called later.

Latest Invention Proves Parentage

(Special to The Guardian)

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Feb. 19—A complicated bit of mechanism today pointed out Paul Vittorio as the father of the child he disclaimed.

Legal recognition of the power and possibility of the mechanism depend on Superior Judge Graham who was to rule whether, on its evidence, Vittorio should be compelled to pay \$180 alimony claimed by his wife.

The mechanism was the "oscillophone" invented by Dr. Albert Abrams, for 12 years Professor of Pathology at Stanford University. Abrams claims that through it he can determine the parentage of a child.

Abrams determines this through "electronic vibrations" of the blood.

In the case of the Vittorio baby, the father denied parentage of the child.

Test Drop of Blood

A drop of blood from the baby and one from the father was taken by Dr. Abrams. The instrument according to the reports of Dr. Abrams showed the "electronic vibrations" which are very mysterious things to the lay man, were the same rate and synchronized. This, according to Abrams, proved Vittorio was the father of the child.

Question of Identity

"The question of identity," said Dr. Abrams today in an interview with the United Press, "is but the grouping of the electronic vibrations." Attar of roses and common coal oil are the same structurally and chemically, but attar of roses through its "electronic vibrations" gives an ethereal essence, while coal oil gives with its obnoxiousness.

The same, he explained, applied to blood. The composition is alike, but the characteristics of the person are traceable to the vibrations of the blood.

Other questions may be answered in similar ways. Race, age, and differentiations of sex are all told.

As an instance he cited the case of the child of a loveless marriage. Such a child will have the vibration rate of the father, but where love plays its true part, the vibration rate of the child is determined from both parents.

The "oscillophone" which performs these uncanny feats, was perfected under Dr. Abrams' instruction by Samuel O. Hoffman who, during the war, developed and perfected the "thermopile" which detected invisible objects.

Dr. Abrams, who is a Fellow of the Royal Medical Society, is the discoverer of the law of "electronic reactions of Abrams" which is being used by many of the most noted French and German pathologists and criminologists in the study of psycho-neuroses.

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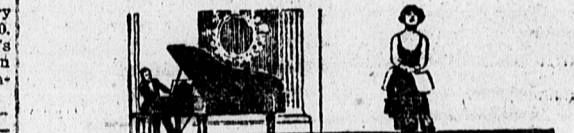

LONDON, Feb. 19—Mr. Lloyd George explained the House of Commons yesterday why Russia will not be represented at the London Conference.

In replying to a question as to whether Russia had been invited to send a representative to the conference on the Turkish Treaty, the Premier said: "Russia having foolishly declined an invitation to the conference of the Allies in London last summer to settle all outstanding questions because it would have involved arresting the march of her invading armies in Poland, we do propose to renew the invitation."
