

# Another World's Title For Dominion

## Canadiens Too Good For Rangers

### Habitants Flash Championship Hockey To Take New Yorkers 3-1—Morenz Shows Class On Two Goals.

 MONTREAL, Que., Feb. 14.—The New York Rangers found Montreal Canadiens at the peak of their National Hockey League championship form on Saturday night and were forced to accept defeat, 3 goals to 1. Led by Howie Morenz, who netted twice, Canadiens ran in two goals in the first period and one in the second, yielding but one score in the third period when Rangers sent in waves of four and five men on the attack.

The match ended the regular season meetings between the clubs, Canadiens having won the series by virtue of three wins and a draw to two losses.

The game was not quite five minutes old when Morenz led in a successful Canadian drive. He fed Gagnon the puck and the right-winger was forced behind the cage by Seibert. The puck came out to Morenz who was parked in front of the net and who beat Roach with a shot from three feet away.

Pete Lepine climaxed a brilliant five minutes work by tricking his way down left wing. When checked near the corner he laid down a perfect pass to Laroche, who came in fast from the right, feinted and defeated Roach with a passing puck to the corner of the net.

A fast break away from their own end gave Canadiens their third score, which came in the second

period. Jollat got a pass from Gagnon well back in his own territory. Like a flash he darted down left wing, flanked by Morenz and Gagnon. Inside the Rangers' blue-line Jollat slipped over a pass which Morenz took in his stride. A quick swerve and he was in front of Roach who did not have a chance on the shot, which went bullet-like to the left corner of the net.

Somers was the marksman when the Rangers' third period persistence eventually brought them a goal. Four New Yorkers were within the Canadian territory. Somers, Dillon and Murdoch worked a short passing game until the puck jockeying, cleared the defence and gave Somers perfect position for a short wrist-flick in to the net.

way down the course and then jump over the side of the course in amongst the spectators and cars. She narrowly missed striking a motor car with her forefeet, then fell, throwing her driver also. The accident was due to her tongue getting stuck back over the bit, causing a shutting off of the air to the lungs. Fortunately, driver, horse and equipment escaped unhurt. Owing to the uncertainty as to the condition of the ice, the free-for-all and Class A Trot and Pace entries did not appear. This left two classes with good racing in each.

## Canada Retains Hockey Prestige

### Winnipeg Hold Americans To Overtime 2-2 Draw To Win Coveted Olympic Crown.

 LAKE PLACID, N. Y., Feb. 14.—Canada won her fourth consecutive Olympic hockey title after a bitter struggle with an aggressive United States team here yesterday afternoon, holding the Americans to a 2-2 tie through thirty minutes of overtime play. The vaunted defensive skill of the Winnipeggers was strained to the limit as the United States team bored in with the hope of an extra game today to decide the title. Having beaten the Americans 2-1 in overtime in their first meeting, the Canadians were two points up and held desperately to their draw yesterday the extra point confirming them as 1932 Olympic Champions.

#### Maintains Prestige

The United States never before made such a potent threat to gain the world's hockey supremacy Canada has so jealously guarded as her own since the game was admitted as an Olympic sport. Winnipeg Falcons, Toronto Granites and Varsity Grads have all maintained Canada's traditional supremacy in hockey world, and now the title reverts to a hockey team from the western city.

a nearly impregnable defence. With a minute to go the Canadians were beaten 2-1. Romeo Rivers flung a hard drive at the United States goalie from the boards just inside the blue line, and the red light flashed just 33 seconds before the third period bell rang.

#### Great Defence

Rivers' goal gave the Canadians another chance and for three ten minute overtime periods they stood solidly on the defence and turned back the rushing Americans. Devastating backchecking and crushing body checks disrupted those drives of the questing American forwards. Winnipeggers heaved the puck down to the other end of the ice as often as they could and made their opponents skate after it.

#### Came From Behind

Yesterday the harassed Winnipeggers twice struggled out from underneath to tie the score as the Americans unleashed a surprisingly effective attack and covered up with

#### SPORTS A FINANCIAL FAILURE

The prices charged for the use of a knife and fork, together with a bed in the club or one of the dozen wooden hotels that crowd the slopes of the mountain resort, are partially responsible. Mere sustenance costs about \$10 a day, while fair living sets a transient back some \$20.

## Lots Of Action In Toronto Tilt

### Free-For-All Fight In Last Minutes Of Leaf-Maroon Game Called For Seven Major Penalties—Toronto Won 6-0.

TORONTO, Ont., Feb. 14.—(By the Canadian Press)—With sticks and gloves strewn the ice, players of the Montreal Maroons and Toronto Maple Leaf teams wound up their National Hockey League game Saturday night in the wildest free-for-all fight ever witnessed on local ice. The Leafs won the hockey game 6 to 0, but the fight which broke out with barely ten seconds left to play, was a no-decision affair.

The fight started brewing from the opening of the second period when butt-ending bumping and high-sticking sneaked into the play. The break came when Harvey Jackson and Lionel Conacher tangled behind the Maroon net in the last minute. Immediately players of

both sides picked an opponent. Sticks were dropped, gloves flew to one side and fists flew in all directions.

Referee Cooper Smeaton and Mike Rodden called in manfully in an attempt to stop the strife and met the usual peacemakers' fate. Players came out of the penalty box and off the benches, some to try and separate the combatants and others to take a hand in the affair. Finally order was restored and the remaining seconds of the game played out.

The aftermath brought seven major penalties. In addition Bill Phillips of the Maroons and Happy Day of the Leafs will be dealt with by the N. H. L. the former for applying a strangle hold on Referee Cooper Smeaton; the latter for leaving the penalty box to join the scrap. Harvey Jackson, Alex Levinsky and King Clancy of the Leafs; Harold Starr, Archie Wilcox, Lionel Conacher and Nels Stewart of the Maroons were given major penalties.

#### THIRD FOR STARR

This was the third major for Starr; and he is automatically suspended for one game, Nels Stewart retired from the ice with an injured thumb after the fray.

Prior to the free-for-all, the game was fast and interesting. A better finish around the nets and greater speed on the attack enabled the Leafs to amass their total of six goals while Benny Grant, borrowed from Syracuse of the International League to replace the suspended Chabot, played a brilliant game in the Leaf goal. The Leafs scored two goals in the first period, added three in the second and netted one in the third.
