**Fred Rose Gets 6-Year Sentence**

MONTREAL, June 20 (CP)—Convicted in Court of King's Bench conspiracy to give unauthorized information to Soviet Russia, Fred Rose, 38-year-old Labrador, was sentenced to six years in penitentiary.

Described by the chief prosecution witness Igor Gouzenko, former cipher clerk in the Russian Embassy in Ottawa, as one of the leading recruiting agents in Canada's espionage ring.

Rose was sentenced to six years in penitentiary for refusing to testify at the Rose trial. All are involved in the spy investigation.

Rose, a 32-year-old, already serving a 2 1/2-year sentence for violating the Official Secrets Act, was given an additional six months on the four others, who have still to face court charges which include the espionage ring.

The trial, which began on June 15, is expected to last several days. Five persons also received jail charges for refusing to testify at the Rose trial.

All are involved in the spy investigation. Rose, a 32-year-old, already serving a 2 1/2-year sentence for violating the Official Secrets Act, was given an additional six months on the four others, who have still to face court charges which include the espionage ring.
