CH'TOWN FARMERS' MARKET.

The prevailing bad roads combined with disagreeable weather has caused the market to be very poorly supplied.

Some dressed hogs are still offering and the price for the best medium weights is 6 cts, and slightly lower figures for light or heavy carcasses. Live hogs at the Dominion Packing yards are worth 4 1/2 cts for best bacon, and for heavy or light grades lesser figures.

Oats are not as brisk as they were a few weeks ago. 34 cts per bushel for black and a fraction lower for white are near about the export prices now being paid.

Potatoes are in good demand and with lively inquiries from parties in the Provinces and U. States, the seller may be let to ask too much. A New York potato buyer yesterday expressed himself as follows: "Potatoes are now too high for me to reach with any hope of profit, and with daily arrivals of European potatoes in the New York and Boston markets the sharp demand cannot be long maintained. About 40 cts per bush is now the regular price.

Eggs for export are bringing 12 cts per doz. and from market baskets for city consumption 14 to 15 cts per doz.

Butter, (prints) bring 24 cts per lb, tubs, 18 to 19 cts per lb.

Hay, (loose) 65 to 70 cts per 100 lbs and very little offering.

SHOT HIS CHUM.

HALIFAX, April 24.—A boy named Finn, was accidentally shot yesterday afternoon, in the woods, some distance this side of the Three Mile House. He, with three or four companions, were amusing themselves with a rifle of small calibre, when in some manner it was discharged, the bullet taking effect over Finn's eye. The boys gave the alarm and Finn was removed to the Victoria general hospital, where the bullet was extracted shortly after his arrival. He is said to be in a serious condition.
