35 Horses Slated To Run Today In Famous Cambridgeshire Stakes

NEWMARKET, England, Oct. 26.—(AP)—Thirty-five horses still are slated to run on the rain-soaked turf tomorrow in the 109-year-old Cambridgeshire Stakes, one of the biggest betting events on the British racing calendar.

The nine-furlong gallop on historic Newmarket Heath is the second leg of Britain's "autumn double," a popular project of bookmakers to keep money in circulation at the slack end of the season.

The first leg of the double was the Cesarewitch two weeks ago. It was won by Woodburn, who was linked in many doubles with Speciality, a stablemate in the barn of trainer Charlie Eley.

Naturally, if Speciality wins the modest \$12,735 stakes the bookies will pay out plenty. To hedge they have made Speciality a 11-to-2 favorite. . . . The three-year-old bay colt's chances are flattened by that price, since he was third in his last outing.

Actually, the field is a class "B" collection of handicap horses. Outsiders usually win and there are plenty to choose from.

Fill D'or II was scratched today, leaving 35 horses with their \$120 fee paid and eligible to go to the post at 8:45 a.m., EST.

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Sportsmen See Need For Game Bird Conservation

In answer to the possibility of the stoppage of game-bird importations, local sportsmen are calling for a revival of the idea of a Department of Natural Resources to be set up by the Provincial Government. The new department, they argue, would offer leadership and action in the conservation and propagation of fish and game, thereby developing an unspoiled natural resource which is the island itself, as a hunters' paradise.

To leave matters where they now stand, it was argued, would be to lose the ground which hard work and strenuous effort has gained in the past three or four years.

Pheasants Unlimited have a creditable performance behind them since the fall of 1945 when with the financial help of the Department of Agriculture they imported their first 106 pheasants from Jamesville, Wis., at about \$5 apiece. Five hundred more from the same place were distributed during the next two spring seasons, plus 30 prairie chickens, which were all that were left of the 200 ordered after the weatherman was through with them. Alberta's ban, because of local shortages, stonned further shipping of the prairie chicken.

Whitlock Is Suspended For Three Games

HALIFAX, Oct. 26.—(CP)—Suspension of Roy (Buck) Whitlock, high-scoring Moncton Hawks centre, for three games, effected Oct. 29 to Nov. 3, was announced here tonight by Judge J. Elliott Hudson, president of the Maritime Senior Hockey League.

President Hudson made the announcement after receiving a report from referee Bert Sleep and Charlie Nelson concerning Whitlock's attack on Sleep during the Moncton-Dartmouth Arrows game here Saturday night.

The report said: "Moncton player Buck Whitlock attacked referee Bert Sleep, giving repeated blows to the face and body with both hockey stick and fists. Player Whitlock came out of the penalty box to give these blows." Whitlock had been on a ten-minute tripping penalty and a 10-minute misconduct was added when he shoved Sleep. After Arrows scored a goal, Whitlock jumped out of the penalty box and bloodied Sleep's nose and up in his attack. He drew a match misconduct for that.

No decision was made on a proposal from Saint John Beavers about Whitlock's presence in the Moncton lineup as Hawks edged Beavers 3-2 at Saint John last night. Saint John officials contended Whitlock was automatically under suspension after receiving the match misconduct.

Whitlock will not be permitted to play or sit on the player's bench for the following games: Friday, Halifax at Moncton; Monday, Saint John at Moncton and Wednesday, Moncton at Dartmouth.

President Hudson said the suspension was short because of Whitlock's stellar playing and sportsmanlike attitude previously. He said repetition of the incident by any player would be more severely dealt with to prevent the league from becoming a "sluggers' paradise."

Harness Racing Drivers Suspended

FOXBORO, Mass., Oct. 26.—(AP)—Two harness racing drivers, one of them a Canadian, were suspended today for infractions of rules at the Bay State Raceway.

George Nediker of Sherbrooke, Que., was suspended for one week for "conspiring to fraudulently affect the result of a race on Oct. 21 and for wagering on another horse in a race in which a horse trained by him and in his personal charge was a starter."

Howard F. Dupe of Yarmouth, Me., was suspended for two years for "conspiring to fraudulently affect the results of a race on Oct. 21 and for not driving in a manner that would result in the true performance of his horse."
