FEAR OF JAPAN

NO IDLE DREAM.

In the files of the State Department is a protest by Japan against the acquisition of Hawaii by the United States. It was made at the time the legislation was pending and has never been withdrawn. Japan did not protest the acquisition of the Philippines by this country, but she did not want Hawaii to become United States territory. This significant fact is what causes more alarm among people who are aware of the unpreparedness of this country for war than otherwise would be the case. They know that the mobile army is not properly organized for an emergency such as might happen in case Japan should declare war on account of the recent troubles in California.

Army and navy men, it is well understood, have been warned not to discuss war possibilities with Japan. Those officers whose duty it is to look after plans to meet possible emergencies have been told to desist in order that there shall be no cause for irritation pending the negotiations between this country and Japan. And yet these officers, or other military experts, have figured out carefully the possibilities and their opinion is that in case of war with Japan that country would occupy the Philippines, Hawaii, Alaska, the Canal Zone, parts of Washington, and Oregon, and perhaps portions of California.

WOULD POWERS INTERFERE?

In such an event they are speculating on how long the other great powers of the world would permit a war to continue which would prove such an injury to business and commerce. More than that, it is not so long ago that a treaty with Russia was abrogated and the canal treaty

with Great Britain broken by greatly strained. Other nations feel that they have been affronted and they might feel inclined to tell the United States to come to a settlement with Japan—that is, if Japan should secure the advantages which are predicted as possible.

“I am not an alarmist,” remarked Hon. Julius Kahn, the ranking minority member on the House military committee, “but as a resident of California I know something about the situation, and I know also the disadvantages we labor under, in not having a mobile army, where officers and men have been trained in actual units as well as a reserve which could fill the ranks in a sudden emergency.

LESSON OF HISTORY.

“Let the man who thinks this is simply a ‘scare’ read the history of the past fifteen years. From time to time Russia would take some action and Japan would protest. Then would follow a period of negotiations extending for months and years. Then some other act of Russia would cause another protest by Japan, and further negotiations. And so it went along, year after year, Japan was preparing all the time. And finally, when fully prepared, she struck with such suddenness and ferocity that a powerful nation like Russia was defeated on the sea and land and compelled to conclude a peace most humiliating.

“It is not because I want war that I want an army properly organized, trained and drilled, with a reserve which will meet emergencies. It is because I want to avoid war. With such an army as a country situated like the United States should have there would not be much possibility of war, and there would be far less war scares to alarm our people.”

HALIFAX MAN

ROBBED OF \$16,000.

HALIFAX, Sept. 12.—Fred Mahar, manager of the Halifax Arena, received word last evening that his brother Harry, has just had a thrilling experience in South Carolina. He in company with two other men were held up by highwaymen and robbed of \$16,000.

Harry Mahar and Fred Butman, who are employees of the J. T. White Construction Company, had drawn \$16,000 from the bank, and accompanied by Deputy Sheriff J. G. Joyner, they were proceeding to the company's offices.

At Parr's Shoal station, they were confronted by three men with blackened faces and drawn revolvers and ordered to throw up their hands. Deputy Sheriff Coyner refused, and reached for his gun, but before he

could get it, one of the trio fired and brought him down. The bullet crashed through his hip. It was useless for the other two to offer resistance, and the robbers seized the grip with the \$16,000 and made off. Several persons saw the hold-up and an alarm was given. The police with blood hounds were quickly on the scene but the highwaymen succeeded in getting away. The company has offered a reward of six hundred for the capture of the men.

PROTECTIVE LABOR LAWS.

BERNE, Switzerland, Sept. 11.—At the invitation of the Swiss Federal Council an international Government commission met here today to arrange a basis for the periodical exchange between the Governments of statistics in regard to the application of protective labor laws.

CANADA THIRD IN THE PALMA SHOOT

CAMP DERBY, OHIO, Sept. 10.—United States won the Palma match. Its score was 1,714. The team from the Argentine Republic was second, with a score of 1,684, nine points ahead of Canada, with a score of 1,675. Sweden made 1,494 and Peru 1,465.

Canada was tied with the United States for first place at 800 yards, but fell behind at the longer ranges. Private Hawkins, King's prize winner at Bisley, and Lieutenant Morris made the best scores of the Canadian team. The individual scores follow:—

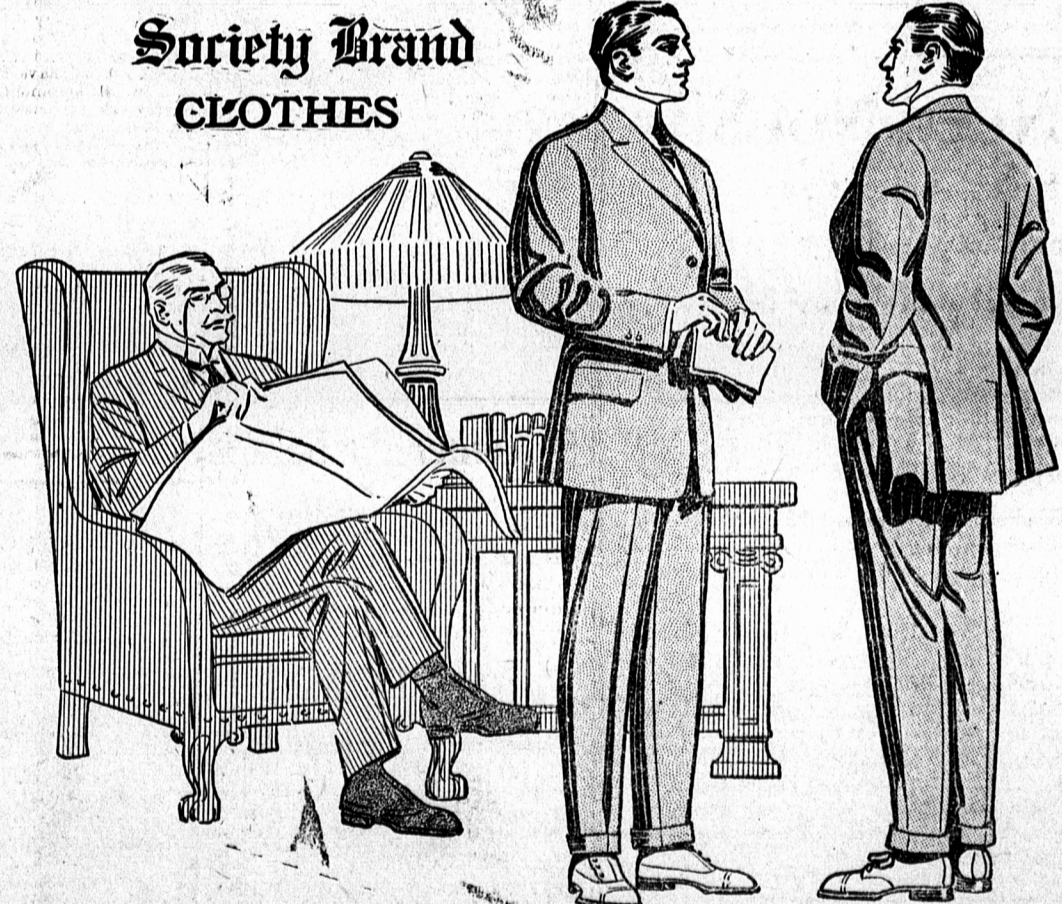
