**MONTREAL EXCHANGE**

Canadian Colnease preferred, which was strong yesterday on encouraging reports from the company, succumbed to the pressure of profit-taking sales to close with a sharp loss. At the final bell it held a decline of 1 3/4 points at 118 1/4. Bruck Silk lost 1-4 at 19 and Canadian Cement a similar amount at 19 3/4. Canada Northern Power, Eastern Dries, International Nickel and one or two more were lower at the close.

Leaders among the stocks closing the day with gains included Canada Cement preferred, which spurred to the fore in the late minutes of the session to finish with a gain of 2 1/2 points at 45 1/2. Movement in Canada Cement followed the rise in construction issues on other markets. Dominion Coal preferred jumped 3 points at 58 and the alcohol, Dryden and others were also higher. Bank shares were irregular.

**Montreal Stock Market**

NEW YORK, April 10—Stocks today more than recovered their losses of the two previous markets. Bonds were firmer in the speculative than in the gilt-edge section, the latter having had most of the play last week.

Share traders found cheer in a number of quarters. Settlement of the motor products strike, a substantial gain in March shipments of the leading steel producer, optimistic comment of executives at some annual stockholders' meetings, additional improvement for metal prices, a good report on last month's automobile production, the Senate's limitation of the extra 10 percent income tax and additional tempering of the regulation bill were prominent items on the market's bill of fare. Activity increased to 1,417,772 shares.

Motor company equities led the upturn, which netted many gains of fractions to a couple of points throughout the general list. Division of the Ford stock, which was losing about two points in the dividend omission, though its extreme loss was reduced. General Motors, Chrysler and Hudson looked fairly strong.

Trading held back, however, because of the New York State Senate's change of heart with respect to Governor Herbert Lehman's power programme, but there were no special casualties. American Telephone, which has been drifting lower since the Splan report was published, rallied more than a point. Alcohol issues improved and rails firmed. Santa Fe's 2 point rise being prominent. Mining shares developed few features, though Kennecott and Anaconda rose in response to copper's improvement. American Can, Goodyear, Motor Products, Chrysler, General Motors, Evans, Ford, Austin Nichols, Armour of Illinois Preferred, 34 1/2, and the Canadian dollar moved in opposite directions in the foreign exchange markets today.

The Canadian dollar displayed a firm tone and increased its premium from 24 1/2 to 25 1/2 cents, a closing rate of 25 1/2 cents. The French franc closed unchanged at 5.00 cents.

**MINING**

TORONTO, April 10—Silver stocks featured the afternoon trading in the mining department of the Toronto Stock Exchange today. News came through from Washington of Senatorial action favorable to the white metal. All the leaders closed higher on heavy volume. Senior gold issues were generally firm with some light gains, showing cheaper gold and the mildly weak and base metals mainly unchanged.

Eighty thousand shares of white metal changed hands and the close was up 6 cents at 48. Midorona on a late start in the afternoon, added 1 1/2 cents and closed at 3.52. Other gains in the silver group were 4 for Bear Exploration and 4 for Bear Mining. Premier and 14 for Cobalt contract.

**CURRENCIES**

(Canadian Press) Close

TORONTO, April 10—The Montreal market showed a sharp decline today as currencies followed the movement on outside markets and closed into lower ground. The pound rose to 25 1/2 cents, the dollar 1/2 cent and the United States dollar all showed losses at the close.

The pound was weak right from the start, closing with a loss of 1 1/2 cents at 25 1/2. The franc declined 1/2 cent to 5.00 cents. The dollar was quoted at 1/2 cent to 1/2 cent. Sterling on the New York market was 24 1/2 cents. The French franc closed unchanged at 5.00 cents.

**PRODUCE**

(Canadian Press) Close

MONTREAL, April 10—Butter prices continued to decline from recent weeks on the Montreal dairy and produce market today while other lines were about unchanged from previous levels. No. 1 grade butter was quoted from 28 to 28 1/2 cents a pound for cartons or less, compared with yesterday's quotation of 28 1/2 to 29 cents. Demand was slow as buyers held off, awaiting further declines in prices as the season advances. Volume was light with six boxes being offered for sale. The egg market was steady to firm with graded shipments in cartons or less bringing 19 cents a dozen for A large, 18 cents for A medium, 17 cents for B grade and 16 cents for C. Receipts totaled 4,708 cases.

Current Ontario cheese brought 11 1/2 to 12 1/2 cents a pound and summer white and colored 2 1/2 to 2 3/4 cents. Offerings amounted to 110 boxes.

On the potato market Quebec in 90 pound bags were \$1.05 to \$1.10 and New Brunswick in similar quantities \$1.10 to \$1.15. Prince Edward Island mountains in 90 pound bags sold for \$1.30 to \$1.40.
