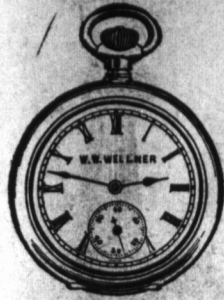

DURING the past season dairying on this Island was most successful. Splendid prices were realized for cheese, and there is no question but that the output of the province this year will show a large increase. During the year the highest price since the industry was established was paid by an Island factory for milk namely 85 cents per 100 lbs. This is a big advance over the prices of former years when as low as 50 cents per 100 lbs has been known to have been paid.

In the basement of the First Methodist church last night a very pleasant evening was spent by all who attended the tea and gift sale. The efforts of those in charge were greeted with a most successful outcome, and mutual profit rewarded buyers and sellers. Refreshment and candy tables stocked with the choicest in their lines found many patrons. The occasion ranks as one of the most delightful affairs of its kind ever held in connection with the congregation.

The Presbytery met in Zion Church at 7.30 o'clock last evening in the presence of a large congregation. Divine Worship was conducted by the Rev. J. Mitchell of Orwell, who preached from the text, Matthew 11.6. Mr. Fullerton, the Moderator pro tem of the Presbytery, narrated the steps, and after the questions had been put by the Rev. W. H. Spencer, and the induction prayer by Rev. John Gillis, introduced Rev. George Elias into the charge of the Zion Church Congregation. Rev. R. G. Strathie, of Summerside addressed the newly-inducted Minister, and Rev. A. D. Stirling of Kensington addressed the people. Splendid music was rendered by the choir and Miss Lena Murray also sang. As the congregation retired the new minister was introduced to the people by Rev. Mr. Strathie, and by Mr. McInnis. The Presbytery then continued the business of the session. The matter of a call from Cavendish congregation to the Rev. George Millar was sustained and ordered to be sent to Mr. Millar.

The senior basket ball league opened up last evening with two of the most exciting games ever played in the Y.M.C.A. Gymnasium. Both games were very fast from start to finish, and it is safe to say that the result was a surprise in both cases. The first game was between the P. W. C. and the Elms. Walter Matheson and Harry Smith made a strong combination as forwards for the Elms and O. G. Kelly and G. B. G. and Howey did good work as guards, and with Prof. Matheson at centre to give up the game they had a strong combination. They won from the Elms by a score of 39-18. The Elms, however, played a strong game and give promise of being a good team. Doucett at centre played brilliantly. The second game was between the Victoria Athletic Club and Prowse Bros. team. In the first half Prowse Bros. showed best and the game was fast and clean. In the last half the Vics had decidedly the best of it and won out by a score of 14-9. The last ten minutes of this game was rather rough, and consequently not nearly as good basket ball as the first. The Vics have three new men at the game and with a little more practice will develop a strong team. Prowse Bros. also have greater possibilities before them. Next Thursday the Abegweitis play the C. B. C. champions of last year, and the P. W. C. second team play the West Kent as intermediate match.
