DR. RYERSON ON WOUNDS.

Observations of the Canadian Red Cross Representative in Africa.

OTTAWA, Sept. 12.—At a medical convention here this afternoon Dr. Ryerson dealt with wounds and their treatment as observed by him while in South Africa. Of 12,377 men wounded but 732 have died of their wounds. Dr. Ryerson expressed a doubt that explosive bullets were used by the Boers. He saw no case where a poison in the bullet was used, although it was alleged they were used.

He spoke favorably of hospital administration but said that the medical organization of the army was not perfect but would require organization after the war was over.

KRUGER ESCAPES.

LORENZO MARQUESS, Sept. 12.—President Kruger and several Transvaal officials are staying at the house of Mr. G. Pott, the consul of the Netherlands here. It is rumored that he will sail for Europe September 24 on the German steamer Herzog.
