Gloucester, Mass. the headquarters of the New England fishing fleet, is probably the one section of the Republic that is least friendly to the Dominion. Gloucester strenuously opposes any proposals of fair trade between the States and the Provinces. And the Times of that city, which is especially devoted to the fishing interest, has of late been considerably excited over what other newspapers have reported to be the approaching union of Newfoundland with Canada. It sees in the proposed union a sad prospect for American fishermen because the entire control of the British North American fishery waters would be transferred to Ottawa, which the Times very mistakenly think is an unfriendly quarter.

Of course, as we have said, the Gloucester Times is in error in supposing that the Dominion Government is unfriendly and it is probably quite as much mistaken in regard to the manner in which American fishing interests would be affected by the proposed union, should it take place. It would seem reasonable to suppose that it would be an advantage to our American coast to have but one government on this side to deal with instead of two as at present. But what the Times seems most concerned about is that Canadian fishing vessels would, after the union, have some advantage over American fishing vessels in the matter of bait to be obtained in Newfoundland waters. And this question of bait is to the Times a most important one. We quote:

As an example of the value of Newfoundland's bait supply, not alone to the United States, but also to the Canadian vessels fishing on the Grand Banks, it is only necessary to point out that while 63 Gloucester schooners procured licenses in Newfoundland waters last season to buy bait, no less than 99 Canadian vessels did the same, so it will readily be seen what an immense boon it will be to the Dominion to obtain control—absolute and direct—of this important lever in controlling the deep sea fisheries of the North Atlantic. It is impossible to suppose, then, in view of the well-known attitude of the Ottawa cabinet on this bait fishery question, that Canada will refrain from "putting the screws on," if she can absorb this colony. That will mean that the New England fishermen must prepare themselves to face a completely altered fishery situation. If they are forbidden access to the bait supplies, their industry must be crippled. If they concede reciprocity to Canada in fish products, the stocks of fish which will be sent from the Maritime Provinces (then including Newfoundland) will be so great as to compel a lowering of the price of the American-caught article, and a corresponding decline in the profits of the American interests involved. Canada is seeking new markets for her fish; the United States is doing the same; the power which holds possession of the bait supply, which alone makes the industry possible, will be able to dictate its own

terms to the other. Furthermore The Times proceeds to point out that the winter herring fishery on the Newfoundland coast when controlled by Canada would probably pass entirely into hands of Canadian fishermen. "The Canadians would seek to control it themselves, either by absolutely forbidding the Americans to engage in it, or by imposing an export tax on herring shipped in foreign bottoms, which would assuredly compel the Americans to abandon the industry." So says The Times. These afford good reasons from the Gloucester standpoint for opposing the union between Newfoundland and Canada. If we mistake not, the argument will be read in both Canada and Newfoundland as a very good one in favor of bringing about the union as speedily as possible. And after all it is Canada and Newfoundland that will have the only effective voice is hastening or delaying the date of a coalescence that is inevitable.

Fortunately with American control in the Philippines and British supervision in Egypt the measures necessary for its suppression will not be neglected. Cholera is also prevalent in India, the home of this plague. Mohammedan fatalism is a most serious obstacle in dealing with this deadly plague in all countries where the followers of the Prophet have their homes, but none the less progress is being made and cholera from year to year is less dreaded and less deadly than in earlier times.
