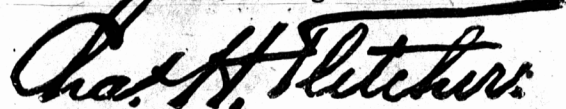

A HERO.

NEW YORK, Dec. 6.—Although only twenty years old, Charles Kaplow, of St. Paul, Minn., has performed three feats of life saving which make of him, indeed, a unique hero.

His last feat was when in St. Mark's Hospital he permitted thirty-six square inches of skin to be cut from his body to be grafted on Bertha Wuecher, four years old.

The child had been scalded and a skin grafting operation was necessary to save her life. An appeal for volunteers was made and a reward of \$25 offered through the newspapers by Drs. B. T. Tilton, and Abraham A. Levy, who performed the operation.

Kaplow, read the announcement and, though the little girl was unknown to him, went at once to the hospital. He refused any compensation and offered to pay for the services of the nurse who will care for him.

"The operation was a complete success," said Dr. Levy. "The little girl will be able to leave the hospital in three weeks and Mr. Kaplow may live in a week."

ARCHDUKE AT SCHOOL.

CLITHEROE, Lancashire, Dec. 6.—His Imperial Highness Francis Charles, Archduke of Austria, Hungary, has entered Stonyhurst College, the famous Jesuit seminary near Clitheroe, as a "philosopher." The young Archduke is the grandson of the present Emperor. His work will be the gaining of a perfect acquaintance with English, and he is in company with an Austrian count, to take private lessons in the language. He will also follow a course of study in philosophy, logic psychology. The Archduke's life, however, will not be one of rigorous study.
