KING SENDS HIS GREETINGS

WASHINGTON, Nov. 3.—President Harding celebrated his 56th birthday yesterday quietly at White House, no special program being arranged for the occasion.

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Nov. 7.—Three men lost at sea and thirteen vessels wrecked are the known marine toll of the Atlantic hurricane which swept Newfoundland from Friday last until Monday, news of which filtered in over repaired wires today.

Captain George Guegue and Michael Connors, of the schooner Clarence B., bound from the Labrador coast to Brigus, were washed overboard in the height of the storm and the vessel so damaged that the rest of the crew were forced to abandon her at Pile's Island.

The Arleen, a three-masted coal laden schooner, of the Atlantic coast, was wrecked at Twillingate and cast up with her crew, the M. P. Cashin, and Violet-Charlie. Five schooners are on the rocks at Plate Cove, Norman's Cove, Kee's Island and Deer Island report one wreck each.

Harbor Breton on the west coast, reports that three churches were destroyed during the storm.

LIVERPOOL, Nov. 7.—George Harvey, the United States ambassador to Great Britain, told an audience at the Liverpool Chamber of Commerce tonight that it was futile to hope that the United States would suggest any day-by-day merger in a definite alliance with Great Britain and France.

"Our first president fixed the foreign policy of the United States clearly and unequivocally when he adjured his countrymen never to enter a permanent alliance with any other power," said Mr. Harvey.

"This policy has been reaffirmed by practically all his successors. It was reiterated with great positiveness in our latest national campaign by our present president and was confirmed by a majority of the people so great as to be beyond the pale of comparison."

"In view of these circumstances, I do not believe that the United States will ever propose a permanent alliance, however desirable that action may seem to be, an utter impossibility? May it not be, then, the part of wisdom to avoid discussion or even suggestion of a proposal which, however wise it may be, could hardly serve any purpose other than to feed enemies and distress friends of both Great Britain and France who live in the United States?"

LIFE IN THE MOON In an article appearing in Popular Astronomy, describing the results of two years' study of the moon, Professor William Pickering of Harvard University, challenges the assumption of astronomers that the moon is dead, and that nothing can live on its surface.

He declares his conviction that them markings often observed on the face of our satellite actually represent areas of vegetation. The crops of this vegetation grow every day on the moon, the day of moon being a period of 14 of our days during which it is lighted by the sun.

Professor Pickering declares that in the craters with which the surface of the moon is studded there is water and heat, that that has been observed steam issuing from them. When the moon emerges from its period of darkness the sun's rays start up a mushroom-like growth in the crater fields. He has, he asserts, actually been able to distinguish the patterns of the growing fields. "We find, therefore (he concluded) a living world at our very doors, where life is some 200,000 miles from Mars, but utterly unlike anything on our own planet, a world which the astronomical profession in general for the past 50 years has systematically neglected."
