The chief Superintendent of Education has been requested by the Board of Health of the City of Charlottetown to intimate that it is expected that all students in attendance at the Prince of Wales College and Normal School will be vaccinated before they resume their studies at that institution.

The mails crossed both ways at the Cape yesterday, and the special train arrived in the City a little after four o'clock. If the boats make a crossing today they will not cross tomorrow. All the mail which had accumulated at Cape Tormentine for the Island has now been brought over to this side.

The S. S. Stanley is now in Georgetown, having given up the attempt to navigate the ice-blocked straits until a change of weather makes the route possible. There is no change in the position of the Minto; she is still icebound off Plotou Island. Yesterday a heavy easterly snow storm was prevailing in the straits.

JOHN L. PETERS, of P. E. Island, was taken to the pest house at Bangor Me. last Saturday morning suffering with smallpox. Peters said he had been working for the Pennsylvania Hub Co. about three miles from Henderson, on the Canadian Pacific, and that he had left there Thursday, Feb. 14, going directly to Boston, where he remained until February 18, when he came to Bangor. All precautions have been taken at the hospital, and results in charge anticipate no serious results from the case.

LESLIE E. SELLEN, formerly of this City but who has been for some years attached to the Royal Canadian North West Mounted Police, and who recently did distinguished service on a special trip to Hudsons Bay, for which he was highly commended, is now in Ottawa. He is at present in civil life, but his services are desired by the Police authorities and it is not quite settled whether he will re-enlist or take up his residence in Montreal. His trip was written up and illustrated in a recent issue of the Magazine Guardian. He is a brother of Mrs. W. B. Prowse of this City.

W. P. BURROWS, of Summerside, has been in Charlottetown for a couple of days in connection with the Provincial Seed Fair which is to be held in Summerside, March 27 and 28. He reports having had a large number of inquiries for the prize list. This is the time of year that farmers begin to think about getting their seeds and this gathering ought to afford an excellent opportunity for the disposal of a surplus stock of superior seed. S. J. Moore, seed inspector for the Maritime Provinces has sent a circular to the leading seedsmen of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick advising them of this opportunity for the purchase of superior seed. In his letter to the Department of Agriculture he urges the necessity of all the seed sold for sale being pure, free from weed seeds and well graded.

E. JENNISON SMITH held a special night at Kensington on Thursday. Although a terrific storm was on the building was filled by people who came from miles around. The lectures gave an impassioned address on Temperance, and as it closed he acted his famous "rag" of War, which was received with a rapturous approval by the audience. An after meeting was held to consider the case of Prohibition Inspector Leslie. The audience comprised adherents of both sides. Rev. An amendment was moved expressing the dissatisfaction felt by many with the Prosecutor and the amendment was carried by a vote of 113 to 33, the original motion being lost.

L. E. PROWSE arrived in Halifax, from England, yesterday. He will if he can make connections, cross by the Capes today, and probably arrive home this afternoon.

SOME of the S. Stanley's passengers came from Georgetown to Charlottetown yesterday having resigned their intention to try and cross the mainland by the steamer. One or two went to the Capes last night.

The innovation brought about by the introduction of a watchman in the Post Office lobby is being highly commended by the general public. The hope is widely expressed that the present condition of affairs may be continued.

THE passengers who left the Minto the other day intending to cross to Prince Edward Island, but who only reached Plotou Island, abandoned their attempt to cross to White Sands, and went to Caribou instead. They will come home by the Capes.

LOB-TER fishermen are making preparations for the opening of the fishing season. The Taylors, at St. Peter's Island have a number of boats ready, and the Dreadnaught of this City will, it is reported, be one of their fleet coming season. She was taken to the Island a few days ago.

JOSEPH WOODS, foreman tailor for the establishment of McLellan Bros., has returned from a visit to New York, Boston, and other cities, having acquired the very latest ideas in the art, and fully equipped to place his firm in the front rank as regards catering to the fashionable tailoring trade.

On the 3rd inst., the celebration of the patronal feast of St. Thomas College, St. Paul, and in the presence of Archbishop Ireland the Rev. Daniel Hughes, D. D. a native of this Province, preached the special sermon which drew from the distinguished Archbishop and all present the highest meed of praise.

THE Board of Health of this City have decided to maintain the regulations stopping public assemblies in force till next Wednesday. There is beginning to be some impatience shown by the public at large regarding the restrictions which are of course interfering to some extent with certain lines of business and amusement.

A TELEGRAM was received in the city yesterday, announcing the sudden death of ex-Councillor Eden, of Halifax. Deceased was a brother of James Eden of this city, and father of Mrs. O. Gavin Duffy. Mr. Eden formerly belonged to Charlottetown and was married to Miss McCarey, sister of Joseph McCarey of the Post Office.

A RESIDENT of West River was in the City yesterday cashing cheques received from New York fish dealers, covering shipments sent during the past winter. He says he averaged four cents a pound for all he sent, and did well at that price. His chief regret was that the interrupted steamer service prevented his earning many more dollars than he otherwise would have received. This case is only one example of many. The extent of the loss sustained by fishermen in this Province from the irregular communication can be reckoned in the thousand of dollars.

MOORE, Seed Inspector for the Maritime Provinces, has sent the following circular to the leading retail seedsmen in Nova Scotia and New Brunswick: Department of Agriculture, Office of Seed Commissioner, Ottawa, March 11th, 1907. At the previous seed fair on the Island quite large quantities of very desirable seed grains have been offered at reasonable prices. 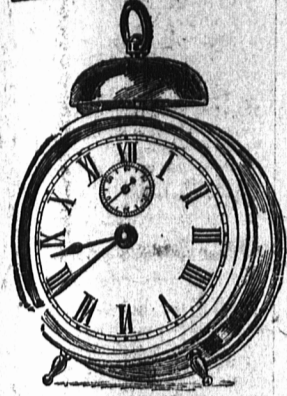
