Hon. W. H. Dennis

When the afternoon session opened Hon. Mr. Dennis addressed the gathering. On behalf of the government he welcomed the dairymen.

He advised the consideration of holding the farmers meeting during the winter week of the Legislature in future. He considered this would be more convenient and matters could be brought before the members.

Mr. Dennis told the dairymen to demand of the government to give them anything reasonably necessary to advance agriculture. He expressed belief that the government was not sufficiently behind public organizations. He then referred to the action of the government in assisting the Tyne Valley Cheese Factory during the year.

Mr. W. R. Shaw followed with a talk on the formation of a central dairymen's organization in Canada. He outlined the events leading up to the organizing of this producers association, The Dairy Farmers of Canada. He went on to outline the objects of this organization.

Mr. Earl Innes, Herbert, moved that the P. E. I. Dairymen affiliate with this Canadian organization. It was seconded by Mr. Lincoln Dewar.

Mr. F. T. Morrow

Mr. Fraser T. Morrow, cheese instructor and inspector, Charlottetown, outlined some of the highlights in connection with his work.

He suggested certain improvements to factory equipment before the work was again started. He referred to "unsuitable containers" in the curing rooms in Island factories.

Mr. D. A. MacDonald, Earl Innes, and Mr. W. R. Shaw took part in a discussion which took place then. The latter stressed the need of better administration and sanitary conditions at factories. A few unsanitary patrons are responsible for placing other patrons' cheese in a lower grade, he declared, and suggested that regulations be enforced to remedy this.

Mr. L. W. Roper, Charlottetown, suggested that each factory be made appoint a barn inspector.

Mr. Lincoln Dewar asked about the possibility of establishing central curing plants. There was not the business to warrant it, Mr. Morrow thought.

Mr. J. J. MacDonald was of the opinion that an inspector should be employed for the whole season. Mr. Allison Profit, who was in the chair, thought that the solution was in the hands of the local board. This cheese or butter maker should be

PRESIDENT'S REPORT

In his review of the year's activities, Mr. E. C. Holm, spoke in part as follows:
About a year has passed since we met at our last annual session—a year that has made history in the British Empire and the North American continent; a year that has left saddened hearts in many places—yet should have in place of a spirit of thankfulness because war has not touched our fair land—with its horrors and destructions. But we may not be long immune and should we not look upon the opportunity offered us through the present Victory Loan as a thanks offering for the gift of peace and happy homes as well as a way to show our patriotism.

Your Board of Directors held several meetings during the year. This was done in an endeavor to keep in touch with dairy work and the various problems arising out of minimum and maximum price regulations on butter.

Probably the outstanding event in connection with dairy work in this province was the formation of the Cheese Board to assist the cheese factories in marketing their products. It was decided to hold a discussion of the possibilities of a similar move in connection with butter—or at least a method of setting a minimum price—should be taken up at this meeting.

He concluded by inviting a discussion on ways of increasing milk production and the most economical way of doing it with view to the labor shortage and cost of importing feed.

DAIRY REPORT

The following report was submitted by Mr. Warren L. Brenton, Dairy Superintendent:

War time conditions are having a far reaching effect in the carrying on of the Dairy Industry. Often the Rules and Regulations under War Time Government Control were somewhat confusing, but in general were accepted and carried out as necessary in such times. Practically all supplies of Free Markets have been thus replaced—Permits, Report Forms must be adhered to in the manufacture and sale of all Dairy Products.

The Ceding Price Rulings being decided on between certain specified dates and during such time were not all uniform. This is still causing much uncertainty among local salesmen, nevertheless, the Creamery and Cheese Factory Patrons have, during the year, received a substantial increase for their milk and cream produced—particularly so during the summer months, the time of cheaper and greater production, than the last number of years. Both Butter and Cheese prices in the early part of the year were relatively low as compared to costs of feeds and dairy supplies.

Such minimum prices for Number 1 Creamery Solids were (and Creamery Print is practically one cent higher).

June, 30¢ per lb.—May 29 1-2 31 1-2; Oct. 32.

Prices advanced sharply following the assurance of certain production, bought up their Storage Commitments earlier than in previous years. This had the effect that the demand exceeded the supply, resulting in advances in prices. This was further impeded by the Dairy Board raising the set price of Cheese one cent per pound.

Later, prices began to decline and at the end of October, Montreal prices were at 32 1-2 f.o.b.

Butter

The number of pounds of Creamery Butter manufactured (according to the Dominion Bureau of Statistics) was 2,622,892 pounds, an increase over 1940 of 655,550 pounds. All Canada's production 288,109,940 and increase over 1940 of 1,386,771 pounds.

Only 3,770 boxes were officially graded: 87.83% 1st Grade; 8.23% 2nd, and 3.94% below 3rd. (Note this was caused by spots of soot showing on top of one churning quality of Butter otherwise good).

Last year, in comparison 13,945 boxes were graded: 55.17% 1st, 43.83% 2nd, and 0.98% 3rd.

The Butter in every Creamery showed a marked improvement in quality. The yearly average price received for Butter was 34¢ per pound. The average price paid for Butter Fat was 36.07 cents per pound.

Cheese

The first request made of the Government was for a two cent (2¢) straight bonus on all Cheese manufactured in the Province together with trucking and Cold Storage charges. The Government did not view with favour establishing the precedent of such a policy. They developed among them the idea of a Central Selling Agency for all cheese produced.

The formation of a Cheese Board and the financial backing by our Government made it possible for the Patrons of all Factories to receive a monthly advance payment of one dollar per hundred pounds of milk for Cheese purposes.

With ideal pasture conditions for milk production the late season of several factories beginning operations was thus made up for, showing a substantial increase over the preceding pounds produced and value received.

The total reported pounds of Cheese manufactured was 706,706. Cheese factories operated at Tignish, Tyne Valley, Abram's Village, Grand River, Kensington, Kinkora, Charlottetown, East River, Dundas, Gowan Brae, and in November, Dunstaffnage, where they manufacture Cheese throughout the winter months. This is the first time that a Cheese Factory in this Province has decided to carry on through the whole year. Number 1's Graded—7,338 with 65.94% 1st Grade; 30.65% 2nd; 3.41% 3rd; 75% with 69.3% 1st; 28.82% 2nd; 39% 3rd; and 0.48% below 3rd.

The chief cause of the lowering of grades was openness, which to a large extent is attributed to foreign water in the milk, and improper cooling. Such troubles may be pre-

General Conditions

The general conditions of our dairy factories throughout the province are very creditable with few exceptions.

The most urgent need, I believe is to have their pasteurizers and vats re-lined or replaced, and the elimination of all rusty containers.

The Central Creameries Limited have set an excellent example to other dairy companies in having their patrons unsatisfied customers gathered and shipped away for reaming. The quality of cream received at their plants were being improved and showed up quite plainly in the excellent quality of their butter manufactured throughout the year.

Ice Cream Plants

The amount of ice cream produced compares favourably with other seasons. A few of the operators must have a clean sweet milk properly handled at the factory.

Pasteurizing plants

The same plants were in operation. Nothing definite to report but the Brighton Dairy and Roper Brothers.

The fluid milk and cream trade demands seem ever increasing and the prices received are to say the least, not proportionate to the care and labour involved.

At times inspection shows laxness in some details; dissatisfaction over both weights and tests have been continually investigated and to a great extent corrected. The quality of both milk and cream has been well maintained.

Assists Plants

An innovation was made by our Department of Agriculture in granting special assistance in order that the Tyne Valley might operate, all so near the end of the year, the Department made special arrangements with the Dairy and Cold Storage Limited at O'Leary, that services formerly rendered by this company may continue without interruption.

A short course in cheese making with Mr. T. J. Hicks, Chief Dairy Produce Grader of Montreal in charge, was again conducted in the Cheese Room of the Pure Milk Co. at Charlottetown. The attendance was so few in number, we will suggest a course this year. More interest must be forthcoming from the local factory officials before much hope may be held for improvement in our cheese makers methods.
