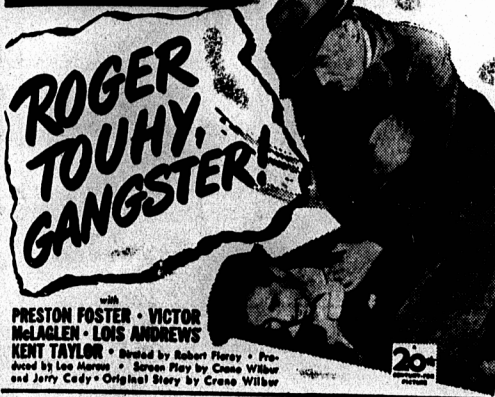

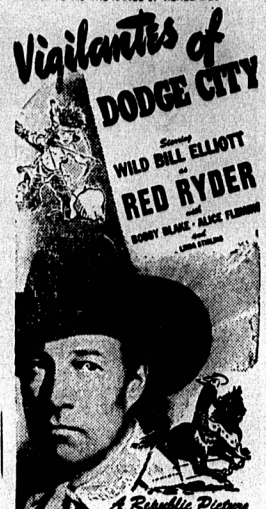

MR. ALEXANDER MACKENZIE

The death occurred at Beach Point on Feb. 26th of Mr. Alexander Mackenzie, although laid aside for many years, his death has cast a gloom over the entire community. During his many years of illness, he was never known to murmur or complain, but joyfully looked forward to the day when he would be at home forever with the Lord, whom he dearly loved and so faithfully served. He had a host of friends but no enemies. Loved by young and old, one could say of him "to know him, was to love him".

The late Mr. Mackenzie was a native of Cape Breton and was born on June 6th, 1848. His parents were of Scottish descent. In religion our late brother was a Presbyterian, but he treated ever one alike, regardless of race, color or creed.

The hymns sung were: Jesus Lover of my Soul, Rock of ages and Shall We Gather at the River. Mrs. Vere Beck was organist. Also a duet by Luther Jordan and his daughter, Miss Vera Mackay. Go there, don't you, with his son Carl presiding at the organ.

His good wife, whose maiden name was Sarah Mackenzie of Gaspareaux, P.E.I., predeceased in the year 1923, as also a son, and two daughters somewhat later. Much sympathy goes out to James and John, who were so loving and kind to their father.

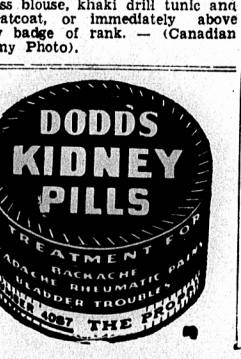

An invitation is hereby extended by the Provincial Advisory Reconstruction Committee to all bodies of public opinion in the Province of Prince Edward Island to prepare briefs on matters connected with the future welfare of this Province and to outline measures for the rehabilitation of men and women of the armed and auxiliary forces upon the cessation of hostilities.

In particular the invitation is extended to the Mayors and the Councillors of all incorporated Towns and City, to Boards of Trade, Chamber of Commerce, Women's Institutes, Fishermen's Unions, Federation of Agriculture, Livestock and Breeding Associations, Credit Unions, Co-operative Associations, P.E.I. Hospital Association, the Medical Association, the Dental Association, the Anti-Tuberculosis Association, the Institute for the Blind, the Teachers' Federation, the Nurses' Association, the Potato Growers Associations, and any other bodies not specifically mentioned in the above list, that might be interested in submitting briefs.

All briefs should be submitted to the Secretary of Department of Reconstruction, J. F. Connolly, Charlottetown, P. E. I.
