THE Halifax Herald says that among the 25 invalided soldiers who sailed for Canada on Thursday, last, is Private J. S. Walker, of the 82nd Batt.

FRANK STEPHEN met with a mishap at Boston in practicing, which prevented him competing in the Labor Day races. In a brief despatch one leg is described as strained.—Halifax Herald.

THE steamer Elliott sailed shortly after four o'clock yesterday afternoon for Sydney. Her cargo consisted of 10 bbls. of pork, 200 bales of hay, 105 cases of eggs, 75 bbls. vegetables, 4,700 feet of lumber, 35 bags potatoes, 3 horses, 32 head of cattle, besides a large quantity of sundries, making almost a full cargo. The Elliott will sail from Charlottetown on Thursdays arriving in Sydney 24 hours later. She also leaves Summerside on Wednesdays at noon. Yesterday's sailing was the fifth one during the present season. The Elliott has a capacity of 450 tons of freight and it is thought that a passenger traffic will be established a little later on between Charlottetown and Sydney.

LAST night Captain Vatcher, of the Rollo Company gave a supper to his company and a number of other firemen. The table was beautifully decorated and laden with luxuries. Chief Hermans in his usual happy manner presided. Seated on his left was Assistant Chief Pickard. After the serving of supper a number of toasts were drunk among which was one to the recently appointed Captain of Rollo Company. During the evening, bright and entertaining speeches were made by Assistant Chief Pickard, Capt. Ronaghan, Capt. Large, Capt. Gillies and others. The song by Mr. Hermans was much appreciated. The happy spirit that prevailed and the compliments paid to Capt. Vatcher and others during the evening speak well for the unity of the firemen of our city. As the assembly dispersed all expressed a desire for a repetition of a like event.

TUPPER FOSTER

Conservative Demonstration at Summerside.

LEFURGEY NOMINATED

Lib. Con. Candidate for East Prince and Accepts the Trust.

THE demonstration in honor to Sir Charles Tupper and Hon. George E. Foster yesterday was one of the biggest political events in the history of the town. Early in the day quite a quantity of bunting was spread to the breeze and the town generally had on its holiday attire. About five o'clock the train arrived from Charlottetown with the distinguished visitors, who were accompanied by Senator Ferguson, Senator and Mrs. McDonald, Mr. and Mrs. W. S. Stewart, Mr. and Mrs. J. A. Messervey, Messrs. P. Blake, D. Nicholson, J. B. Dawson, R. B. Norton, W. L. Cotton, D. O. M. Reddin. They were met at the station by a large number of citizens and many prominent persons from different parts of the country. The Summerside Cornet band was also in evidence and played a number of choice selections. Sir Charles and Mr. Foster were greeted with rousing cheers as they alighted from the train and were driven to Market Hall where the Liberal Conservative convention was in session.

Sir Charles addressed the convention congratulating the electors on the choice they had made in nominating Mr. McQuarrie as their standard bearer. Mr. Foster also addressed the meeting briefly dealing with prominent political issues. At 7.30 a procession headed by the Summerside Cornet Band, carriages containing distinguished visitors and prominent citizens was formed at the Russ Hotel and paraded through the principal streets to the public Square. The band stand was handsomely decorated and the square brilliantly illuminated by Chinese lanterns.

An address of welcome to Sir Charles Tupper and Hon. Mr. Foster was read by Mr. Neil McQuarrie. Sir Charles in one of his brilliant campaign speeches expressed the pleasure he had

again visiting Summerside, the land of his childhood and of many happy memories. He was dismayed on arrival here to learn that owing to interests Mr. Lefurgey who had borne the standard of the Liberal Conservative party at the last election, had been obliged to decline the unanimous nomination tendered him by the convention. He was pleased however that so able and talented a man as Mr. McQuarrie had been found to fill up the gap. Mr. McQuarrie had consented to accept the nomination only on condition that Mr. Lefurgey would adhere to his decision. He (Mr. Tupper) was authorized now to say that Mr. Lefurgey had been prevailed upon to reconsider the matter and that he had consented to accept the nomination and he continued, "I have no hesitation in saying that in the next election Mr. Lefurgey will be one of the great phalanx of Liberal Conservative members in the Canadian House of Commons." He spoke for nearly an hour, and although the conditions were not at all favorable for out door speaking his voice was distinctly heard in every part of the Square. It is estimated that there were nearly 2000 people present. Mr. Foster gave a most telling and eloquent address speaking for about two hours. Mr. Edward Hackett gave a short address. The demonstration was in every way a decided success and the Liberal Conservative cause in East and West Prince has, no doubt, been strengthened.

At the Liberal Conservative Convention yesterday afternoon in the Market Hall the nomination was unanimously tendered to Mr. A. A. Lefurgey. Mr. Lefurgey thanked the delegates for the honor conferred upon him, but his business interests compelled him to decline. Mr. Neil McQuarrie was then tendered the nomination which was made unanimous. He accepted on condition that Mr. Lefurgey could not be persuaded to reconsider his decision.

Moore, formerly of Charlottetown, and now of the Dept. of Agriculture, Ottawa, leaves in a few days for Cape Town, South Africa for the purpose of developing trade in the interests of the department with which he is connected. Mr. Moore sails direct from St. John, N. B., by steamer, laden with supplies for the South African troops. He will be absent until the last of January.
