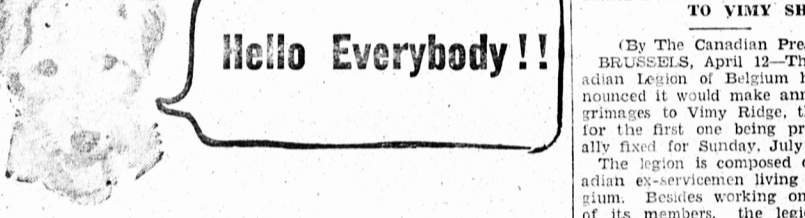

Cites The Benefits Under F. C. A. Act In This Province

The following comments from bulletins recently issued by the Canadian Chamber of Agriculture to the directors and secretaries of provincial farm organizations affiliated therewith, will be read with interest in this Province:

Act Under Attack From Different Sources Farm organizations across Canada are expressing concern over the continued and ever increasing attacks that are being made upon the Farmers Creditors Arrangements Act. The result has been that an increasing number of farm organizations across Canada have been passing resolutions lately endorsing this legislation.

Island Case Cited Senator McArthur and Senator Hughes, both from Prince Edward Island, have been attacking the Farmers Creditors Arrangement Act recently in the Canadian Senate. The following are a few typical cases handled by the Prince Edward Island Board of Review. They illustrate the unscrupulous manner in which a certain type of creditor has sought to exploit helpless debtors.

What a Rich Man Tried to Do Case No. 2: A very poor farmer owed \$105 for one year's interest. The mortgagee, one of the richest men in Prince Edward Island, demanded \$25 additional, being a compound interest bonus for the year. The mortgagee insisted upon the payments of the compound interest under threat of foreclosure proceedings. This case was adjusted by the Board.

Unjust Treatment of a Widow Case No. 3: This woman owned a fair farm and provided a living thereon for her adopted son, his wife and a family of ten children. She owed a mortgage of \$650 at 7% interest with \$32 of interest only due. The mortgagee threatened to foreclose on the property and put herself and dependents on the road. The case was adjusted by the Board.
