### THE COOK'S CORNER

**PINEAPPLE-RHUBARB PIE**

2 cups diced rhubarb  
1 cup cups drained crushed pineapple  
1 tablespoon lemon juice  
1 cup sugar  
2 tablespoons flour  
1 unbeaten egg white

Pastry

Dice unpeeled rhubarb into a colander and pour boiling water over it. Drain well. Mix with drained crushed pineapple and lemon juice. Line a pie plate with pastry and brush with some of the egg white; pour in the rhubarb mixture and sprinkle with mixed sugar and flour. Dot generously with butter and cover with a top crust. Brush top with remaining egg white and bake in hot oven 10 minutes. Reduce the heat and bake 30 minutes longer.

**RHUBARB SHORTCAKES**

Split and butter rich hot biscuits. Put together with rhubarb sauce. Top with more rhubarb and small balls vanilla ice cream.
