MRS. DANIEL MCINNIS

There passed away peacefully in the early hours of June 15 after a few hours of serious illness, Mrs. Daniel McInnis, Winaloe North, widow of the late Daniel McInnis, at the age of 77 years. Although in failing health for several years, her passing came as a great shock to her son and the community in which she lived for nearly 50 years. Born in North Rustico, July 18, 1868, daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Alexander Laird, she came of a family of 7 brothers and 3 sisters of whom there are but 2 sisters and 1 brother who survive.

Mrs. McInnis all her days was interested in the church; she was a member Tuesday Christian Endeavour Society of North Rustico Church, a life-long member of the Presbyterian Church, President of the Women's Missionary Society of the Harrington Presbyterian Church for more than 20 years. When in good health her place in the church was seldom vacant. One son passed away in 1915; there are left to mourn one son, Earl McInnis, 2 daughters, Mrs. John McInnis, North Winaloe, Mrs. Harry Inman, Augustine Cove, one brother, Gordon Laird, now of New Glasgow, P. E. I.

The funeral service was held on Monday, June 17. Her minister, Rev. Norman Young of Marshfield, conducted a brief service in the home, preceding the service in the Harrington Presbyterian Church at 2:30 p.m. Mr. Young spoke comforting words from Hebrews 12:4: "By your sins unto the hills, Rock of Ages, and Abide with Me. Messrs. R. W. Youker, Claude Craswell, Leonard Gaudre, Charles Gregor, Cleve Robinson, and Charles E. Stewart were the pallbearers. A kind mother was laid to rest in Portage cemetery, Brackley Point.

Three Ships Arrive At Halifax

MONTREAL, Que., June 26 — Nearly 3,000 persons will arrive from overseas on three ships which are scheduled to dock at Halifax on Wednesday, Friday and Saturday according to the latest advice received here by the Canadian National Railways. The first to come to Canada will be the transport ship the Lady Nelson with 238 wives and 19 children and 71 soldiers. The Letitia will bring 464 wives and 346 children of Canadian servicemen, the Aquitania 677 wives and 164 children, 177 Canadian soldiers, 301 British service personnel, 30 Newfoundland Canadian Chinese Merchant Navy sailors and 126 civilians and the former C.N.S. ship the Lady Nelson 238 wives and 19 children and 71 soldiers.

To handle the traffic nine special trains will be operated out of Halifax over Canadian National Railways lines. In addition ten special cars including two hospital cars to carry the sick and wounded soldiers returning on the Lady Nelson will be attached to regular C.N.R. trains.
