PARALYZED GIRL 'REBORN' AS CHILD

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 24.—A case of dual personality, which has been puzzling physicians for a year, was brought to light through the medical report of Dr. P. Beasling. The patient is Miss Padine Dearing, twenty-two years of age of No. 124 West Twelfth street, who, according to the physicians, suffered a stoppage of the heart, circulation and respiration for five minutes and recovered to become a person of entirely different temperament and with no memory of her life before the experience.

The case had attracted wide attention for at the time of her illness it was at first believed death had come to her.

"I worked hard and the circulation was resumed in the upper dorsal region. We gave her warm water and she sucked it down greedily, just like a hungry baby; later we gave her some diluted milk in a nursing bottle and she rapidly grew stronger."

His story relates the curious fact that, as Miss Dearing recovered strength, she was entirely cured of her paralysis and was free from all pain; but her memory was gone, she did not know how to talk, and she was as far as mind went just as a new-born child.

Scientists are invited by Dr. Beasling to see the young woman and to discuss the case with him. The patient is now twenty-two years old, and has the simple manner of a child, but is quick and intelligent at learning.

On November 15, 1909, when she was twenty years old, she was stricken with absolute paralysis of the body, together with complete failure of the nerves of nutrition, and for sixty days she was kept alive by artificial methods.

On January 16, says the doctor's report, her condition culminated in dissolution; the pulse ceased, respiration stopped, the blood ceased circulating and rigor mortis ensued.

Dr. Beasling says that after this apparent death he happened to touch the body, and the skin did not feel like that of a dead person.

"I felt the muscles of the neck relax under my fingers, and soon she gave a cry like that of a new-born child," he says.

HORSE NOTE.

Last season one of the best looking and acting trotters that performed over the Ohio half-mile tracks was the roan stallion, Crown Jay, 2:14.

Dr. J. McKenna, superintendent of the McKenna Farm, Washington, Pa., where this good young son of Jay Bird is owned. Crown Jay was kept in the stud until late in the summer, after which he was prepared for the races. With but a short amount of work he was started at Lima, Ohio, where he won a most creditable race, taking second money in a hard fought contest. The following week at Findlay, Ohio, he was up to more and led the bunch in three straight heats, the third of which he

trotted in 2:15—his mark—in a handy fashion. A week or so later, at Kalamazoo, he worked a mile in 2:12 with the final quarter in 30 1/2 seconds and horsemen who saw him go the mile say that he could have gone in 2:10 sure. However that week he met with a mishap that threw him out of training, otherwise he would have a record of 2:10 or better. He is now in excellent shape and after a short season in the stud at the farm he will be prepared for another season's campaign. He is by Jay Bird 5060, dam Katie Kingward (dam of Crown Jay, 2:24, Oakley Baron, 2:23, etc.) by Kingward, 2:25, second dam, Katie Stranger (granddam of four in 2:30) by Stranger third dam Abbie Wilkes, by Bourbon Wilkes, and fourth dam, Katie Abdallah (dam of two) by Abdallah 164. Being a grand individual, an extremely fast horse and with this excellent breeding, it looks as though he ought to be a big success in the stud. Most of the best bred mares at the farm will be bred to him the coming season.—"The Horseman." Katie Kingward is the dam of Crown Jay, 2:15; and Oakley Baron, 2:23, owned by W. S. McKee.

REFUSED TO GIVE RECORD OF HIS VOICE

ST. LOUIS, Feb. 25.—The sentimental side of the character of Thomas A. Edison is revealed in a letter to the president of the boys' science department in Soldan High School. The man who made it possible to preserve the human voice for ages and reproduce it by means of the gramophone when desired, has promised his wife that he will never make a record of his voice that will come into possession of any one except Mrs. Edison.

The letter that contains this bit of sentimental information is one of the treasured possessions of Soldan High School. It will be framed and hung in a most conspicuous position on the walls.

When the boys' science department organized its club last year it was named the "Edison Club." The club gave an opening meeting to the entire school, and decided on calling the occasion "Edison Day." Harry P. Schlenberg, president of the club wrote the wizard, giving the facts and requesting the inventor to supply them with a phonographic record of his voice, that they might reproduce it in the auditorium on "Edison Day."

A HUSBAND KILLER CONDEMNED TO DEATH.

PLYMOUTH, Mass., Feb. 28.—Convicted on the evidence of her nine-year-old daughter of the murder of her husband, Frank Cusumano, Mrs. Lona Cusumano was yesterday condemned to death in the electric chair.

MONTREAL, Feb. 24.—Whist clerks in the London offices of the Canadian Northern steamships are being besieged with letters from girls wishing to come to Canada to be married, the Canadian offices are beginning to feel a thrill of sympathy for their overworked English confreres, for every mail brings in letters from young Canadian men anxious to marry the girls who are coming, says The Witness. They write from all parts of Canada, do these lonely swains, and ask in all kinds of tones to be placed in touch with the girls they are sure will make them happy, and who they promise to make happy in return. All trades and professions are represented by the applicants, who are of all ages, builds and colors, the latter of course merely relating to eyes and hair.

One blushing bachelor, who lives on the Central Vermont line, in the Province of Quebec, states that he is a farmer, owning his own farm of many acres, although but 23 years of age. The description of his loneliness and his own good qualities, modestly set forth, should bring a thrill of reciprocating sympathy to some fair maid in the British Islands, even if she does not cast an eye towards the broad acres.

Other young men write from the cities throughout Canada, but the majority are from the farms in the West. HALIFAX, Feb. 28.—A writ of foreclosure has been issued by the Eastern Trust Co., as Trustee under a debenture mortgage, against the North Atlantic Collieries of Port Morien, C. B., claiming \$390,357 on behalf of the bondholders of the company. This will necessitate the closing down of the mine and throwing several hundred men out of work.

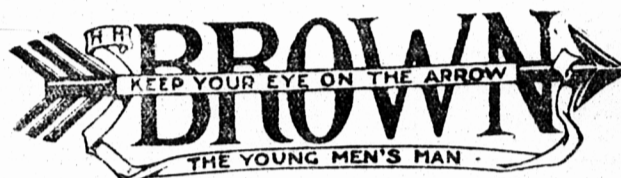

WILL FORTIFY PANAMA CANAL

WASHINGTON, Feb. 25.—After nearly five hours of debate, the house of representatives shortly before 10 o'clock tonight, voted overwhelmingly in favor of the policy of fortifying the Panama canal and appropriating \$3,000,000 to begin the work, the total cost has been estimated at \$12,000,000.

The action of the house practically settles the question of fortification for the sentiment in the senate is said to be more than 2 to 1 in favor of protecting the isthmian waterway by seacoast batteries.

The real test in the house came on an amendment proposed by Representative Tawney, of Minnesota, chairman of the committee on appropriations. It provided that no part of the money set aside for fortification should be used until the president of the United States had attempted to negotiate treaties with all of the leading maritime nations, guaranteeing the neutrality and international protection of the canal.

This was defeated by a vote of 163 to 63, after a slashing speech against the amendment by Representative Sherley, of Kentucky, a Democrat.

The appropriation was finally carried by a vote of 123 to 81.

RADCLIFFE THE HANGMAN IS DEAD.

TORONTO, Feb. 28.—The hangman is dead. Donald James Radcliff, officially known as "Radcliffe," the man who officiated at most of the executions in Canada for the past 29 years, died at his home, Parkdale, yesterday.

LOST HER HAIR FROM FRIGHT, WINS OUT.

ST. PAUL, Minn., Feb. 25.—The State Supreme Court by a decision yesterday, sustained the verdict given to Tillie Ominsky, of St. Paul, recently for the loss of her hair as the result of fright from an accident, in the factory of Charles Weinhausen & Co. The court says that the verdict of the jury involving a finding that fright and nervous shock resulting from an accident caused the particular ailment for which damages were awarded is sustained by the evidence.

Miss Ominsky's dress was caught in a machine near which she was standing. She was drawn toward the machine, and a lower attachment struck her in the face, causing a slight wound. She went home, nervous and hysterical, and about ten days after the accident, her hair, which had been abundant, began to fall out, and in three weeks she was entirely bald. Her father brought suit and got a verdict of \$2,000.

TEN YEAR OLD GIRL ON FIRE.

SYDNEY, Feb. 25.—Advices from Sydney Mines this morning report a serious accident at that town Wednesday noon, when a young girl, aged 10 years, named Hodges, had a narrow escape from being burned to death. The child was playing at her home in the rear of A. A. McLean's tailoring establishment, when her clothing caught fire. Screaming with pain she rushed into the street, over her head from foot in a mass of flames.

John Purvis, of the Nova Scotia Steel and Coal Company's staff who was returning from his noon lunch, seeing the girl in the distance, rushed up to her and dragging off his overcoat enveloped the little screaming figure in its folds. The blaze was eventually smothered, but not before the little one had received a bad burning. The girl will recover.
