CARE AND FEEDING OF BROOD SOWS

Brood sow troubles usually have their origin in faulty feeding, unsatisfactory housing conditions and lack of exercise. At the Federal Experiment Station, it has been found that exercise both in summer and winter is a great safeguard against lameness and similar troubles and this is more important with young sows than with the case with mature sows. Exercise during the summer months is an easy problem to solve on any farm. At this station the brood sows are turned out to pasture immediately after the litter has been weaned. The pasture may be natural grass but clover, oats, peas and vetches or rape is to be preferred. The sows in addition receive one scant feed of a grain mixture daily and of course have access to water. If fall litters are to be expected, it will be necessary to provide a more substantial grain ration as the fattening date approaches.
