Sports Palace To Be Controlled By Col. Hammond

One Of Late Tex Richard's Earliest Associates Gets Controlling Share In Madison Square Garden.

NEW YORK, May 2.—Madison Square Garden, the sports palace Tex Richard built, returned today to the control of one of his earliest associates, Col. John S. Hammond, the man who fought hardest—and for years lost the battle—for continuance of the policies of the great promoter.
Hammond announced today that with the exception of minor legal details he and his unnamed associates had bought the stock interests of Richard P. Hoyt and Hayden Stone Co., the bankers who underwrote Richard's \$7,000,000 venture nine years ago. The deal was reported to have involved the transfer of 112,000 shares of stock at \$7 per share, slightly above the market value.
At the same time the white-haired Colonel, a West Point graduate who first met Richard when they were both interested in cattle in Argentina, announced that while he would become Chairman of the Garden Board of Directors, and return to the Presidency of New York Rangers, of the National Hockey League, Col. John R. Kilpatrick would remain as president of the Corporation. Lester Patrick, who succeeded to the presidency of the Rangers when Hammond withdrew, will remain as manager of the big blue team.

OPENING HOME GAME LOST BY LEAFS

MONTREAL, May 2.—Montreal Royals opened their 1934 International League season before a crowd of 6,000 here today by defeating the Syracuse Chiefs, 2-1 in a well-pitched ball game which was played in balmy spring weather. Royals won the game in the seventh when Orsby scored after the catch of an outfield fly. The visitors' lone run came in the sixth when Joe Beas, subbing for injured Manager High at third base hit a homer over the right field scoreboard. The Royals tied the count in the same frame.
Toronto's Maple Leafs opened the 1934 International Baseball League at home, with the usual "opening day" results, dropping a 2-2 decision to Albany. One of the largest crowds ever to witness an inaugural 1930s crowd crammed into the park and sat through a lot of ceremony and handpicking, only to walk out disappointed when five hits, bunched in the second inning, brought the Albany squad three runs and a safe lead. Toronto managed to get one run back in the fourth and another in the seventh, but when then on were held at bay by Jones, who came in for Milligan in the eighth. Sterritt Blake handled the hurting for Toronto, but was replaced in the seventh by Elcher.

TO TREAT SKIN THAT HAS COARSENE

Here is a treatment for skin which has become coarse and the pores enlarged. Put a teaspoon powdered borax into a basin of cold water overnight; stir up well and allow to settle.
In the morning rub the face vigorously with a wash cloth dipped in the borax water, taking care not to stir up the borax which has settled at the bottom.

Now take an oatmeal bag (a tablespoon oatmeal in a little square of muslin), dip it into the water and rub between the two hands. This will give out a lovely creamy sort of emulsion, which must then be rubbed off with cold water; dry the face carefully and dab on a mixture of witch hazel and tincture of benzoin (a teaspoon which hazel in a wine glass of water and ten drops tincture of benzoin).

Cubs Drop To Second Place As Pirates Win 4-2

NEW YORK, May 2.—Pittsburgh Pirates hit timely behind the start pitching of Helge Meina at home and the fast going Chicago Cubs, and Lonnie Warneke on the mound, were beaten for the second day in succession. The score was 4-2.
It was the first time this year the Cubs have lost twice in a row. The defeat also toppled the Cubs from the National League leadership as New York Giants vanquished Brooklyn.

and St. Louis Cardinals took their fourth straight game, their third consecutive one from the Reds, 4-1, at St. Louis.
Sunny Jim Bottomley was confined to his hotel room with a cold, and Manager Bob O'Farrell sent Mark Koenig to first, Sparky Adams to third, and Johnny Moore to right field instead of Ivy Shiver.
Tex Carleton, who limited the Reds to two hits in the first six innings, finally weakened and was replaced in the ninth after giving two singles.

TOURING TEAM MAKES GREAT START IN THE STUD

LONDON, May 2.—With a smashing century by the one and only Don Bradman, not out, the touring Australian cricketers today made an aggressive start on their long season in England.

Bradman, holder of many batting records, scored 112 and Captain P. M. Woodfull 48 by the close of play. Clarence Grimmett took five wickets for 58.
