Gets \$10,750,000 for Living 240 Days a Year in England

Will of Baroness Von Eckhardstein's Father Makes Millionaire by Odd Provision

LONDON, Dec. 18.—Baroness von Eckhardstein has become a millionaire through the strange provision of living 240 out of each 365 days of each year in England. These terms are contained in the will of her father, Sir John Blundell Maple, the great London house-furnisher, who died five years ago.

ROYALTY ROBS CLUB OF ITS BEST COOKS

Famous Chef of the Jockey Club Has Been Installed in King Alphonso's Kitchen

PARIS, Dec. 18.—All the courtiers of Paris are thinking and saying unpleasant things of King Alphonso of Spain, who has just called on Marshal, the famous chef of the Jockey club and installed him as master of the royal kitchen at Madrid.

NOTORIOUS ANARCHIST MEETS TRAGIC DEATH

Attacked After Leaving an Anarchist Gathering and Illegitimately He Died

LONDON, Dec. 18.—Libertat, the notorious Anarchist, has met with a tragic death. On leaving an anarchist gathering in Rue du Chevalier de la Barre, in Paris, he was attacked by several persons. In the course of the fight he was kicked in the abdomen and was removed to the Lariboisiere hospital, where he died shortly afterwards.

BUYING AND SELLING EMERALDS IS THEFT

Former French President's Son Has to Answer to Charge Under Colombian Laws

PARIS, Dec. 18.—The son of a former French president stands accused of theft and fraud by the Colombian government. The law of Colombia states forth that a person, foreigner or native, who finds an emerald in Colombian soil cannot dispose of it as he chooses. He is required to turn over the gem to the government who pays him about one-fifth of its value.

LONDON, Dec. 18.—The students of Glasgow university—both boys and girls—are up in arms against an anti-flirting campaign waged against them by "prudes on the prowl."

LOOKING TO THE WELFARE OF THE WORKINGMEN

Property Belonging to the Duchy of Cornwall to Be Cleared Away and Modern Building Put Up

LONDON, Dec. 18.—Always interested in the welfare of workingmen, the Prince of Wales has decided that all the dilapidated property in South Wales, belonging to the Duchy of Cornwall, shall be swept away and replaced by modern buildings.

KING VICTOR RAISES SALARIES OF EMPLOYEES IN ROYAL RESIDENCES

Civil List of Italy's Ruler Largest in Europe, but He Lives Within His Income

ROME, Dec. 18.—King Victor Emmanuel has raised the salaries of all his employees at the quirin palace and a dozen other royal residences, the clerks getting an increase of one-fifth and the servants one-tenth. This general "raise" will cost the king about \$15,000 a year.

COST OF LONDON'S BIG HORSE SHOW

Parapet Surrounding Arena to Be Decorated with Gold Leaf at \$6,000 Expense

LAVISH SCHEME PLANNED

Prizes Will Be \$60,000 Next Year as Against \$47,700 in 1908

LONDON, Dec. 18.—London's equine carnival will have a lavish display of decoration that makes it unique among society public functions of the world. The third International horse show, which will be held at Olympia, Kensington, in June, will cost \$250,000, compared with \$190,000 this year; while the prizes will amount to \$60,000, as compared with \$47,700 this year.

WHY FARM HANDS DID NOT MARRY

No Houses to Occupy—Parish of Lindsell Threatened with Depopulation

LONDON, Dec. 18.—The spectacle of a number of young able-bodied farm laborers publicly testifying to their inability to get married solely because there are no houses available in which they can live was witnessed at a parish meeting in the village of Lindsell, Essex.

SECONDARY NAVAL BASES AT GRIMSBY AND DUNDEE

British Admiralty Has Under Consideration Several Schemes and Work Will Soon Commence

LONDON, Dec. 18.—The British admiralty has under consideration several schemes for the development of secondary naval bases on the coast north of the mouth of the Thames, and to be taken up as soon as it is possible to obtain the requisite funds.

MURDERERS AT LARGE

Ten Cruel London Crimes Remain Unpunished

LONDON, Dec. 18.—In the last six years there have been ten murders in London which have not been discovered, cases of infanticide not being included. The total number of murders in the six years is ninety-two, divided as follows:

This table does not include mysterious deaths where the juries returned an open verdict. Four of the ten murders untraced since 1902 were cases in which women died as the result of illegal operations.
