### THE NEWFOUNDLAND LEADERS.

As has been already stated the Newfoundland Government led by Hon. Robert Bond has been triumphantly sustained in the recent election. Parties in the Ancient Colony are designated by the same names as the leading parties in Great Britain and Canada, but the issues which divide them are altogether different. For instance the Reid contract, which was the all-absorbing question in the Newfoundland election is one which in no way affects British or Canadian politics. But the Bond Government is known as Liberal and the Opposition, led by Hon. A. B. Morine, is known as Conservative. None the less party names have an effect upon popular sympathies, and hence we have the St. John's Telegram, the organ of the Newfoundland Liberals, rejoicing greatly over Sir Wilfrid Laurier's victory and even exulting, with no show of reason over the defeat of Sir Charles Tupper.

Our readers may care to learn something about the leaders of the two parties in the sister Island, the more especially as the Opposition Chief is a Nova Scotian by birth and has figured somewhat in the journalistic and political life of Canada. We subjoin some particulars of the two men mainly gleaned from Morgan's Canadian Men and Women of the Time.

Hon. Robert Bond was born in St. John's in 1857, was educated in England, studied law, and at the election, of 1892 was elected to the Newfoundland Assembly. He became Speaker of that body in 1895 and in 1898, on the retirement of Sir William White way was chosen leader of the Liberal party. His rapid rise was due to his fine talents, tact and ability. When Mr. White way returned to active politics in 1899 Mr. Bond became Colonial Secretary. In 1899 he was one of three delegates sent to England on the French Shore question, and was in the same year appointed by the Imperial and Newfoundland Governments to visit the United States to arrange a reciprocity treaty between that country and Newfoundland. This mission was successfully accomplished, but on the intervention of the Canadian Government the treaty was not permitted to go into effect, the British Government taking the view that a treaty covering the fisheries and reciprocity might be prejudicial to the Dominion, if the latter were not included. In 1892 Mr. Bond was sent to Halifax with three other delegates to confer with delegates from Ottawa on the fisheries question and other matters of difference between the two Governments. After the election of 1894 Mr. Bond was unseated and disquali-

fed, but the disability was afterward removed by act of Parliament. He came to Ottawa in 1895 to treat for union with Canada, but the two Governments were unable to agree upon financial terms. In religious faith Premier Bond is a Methodist.

Hon. A. B. Morine, leader of the Opposition in Newfoundland was born at Port Medway, Nova Scotia in 1857, and is just one month the junior of Premier Bond. He received his collegiate education at Dalhousie University of which he is an L.L.B. He was called to the Nova Scotia bar in 1894. In the same year he was admitted a solicitor and barrister in Newfoundland, and has since practiced his profession in St. John's. He began his newspaper career when young as Ottawa correspondent of the Halifax Herald and St. John Sun. Later he was editor of the New Era, Halifax and the Spectator, Annapolis. Proceeding to Newfoundland he became editor of the St. John's Mercury, 1893-5 and of the Herald, 1899-91. He was elected to the Legislature in 1893 for Bonavista and has since been continuously re-elected there. He at first supported Sir William White way, but in 1896 left him because his party passed a resolution against union with Canada. Since that date he has been identified with the Conservative party in Newfoundland. Mr. Morine has been a member of two delegations to England and in 1894 was Colonial Secretary in Mr. Goodridges' Cabinet, and in 1897 Receiver General in the Winter Cabinet. On the defeat of his party and the appointment of Sir James Winter to a Judgeship Mr. Morine was chosen leader of the Opposition. He has always retained an interest in Canada and his native Province of Nova Scotia and in 1892 he ran at a by-election in Queens, N. S. for the Dominion House of Commons, retaining at the same time his seat in the Newfoundland Assembly. He was defeated by a small majority, thus narrowly escaping the extraordinary distinction of being a member of the Parliaments of two entirely separate Colonies.
