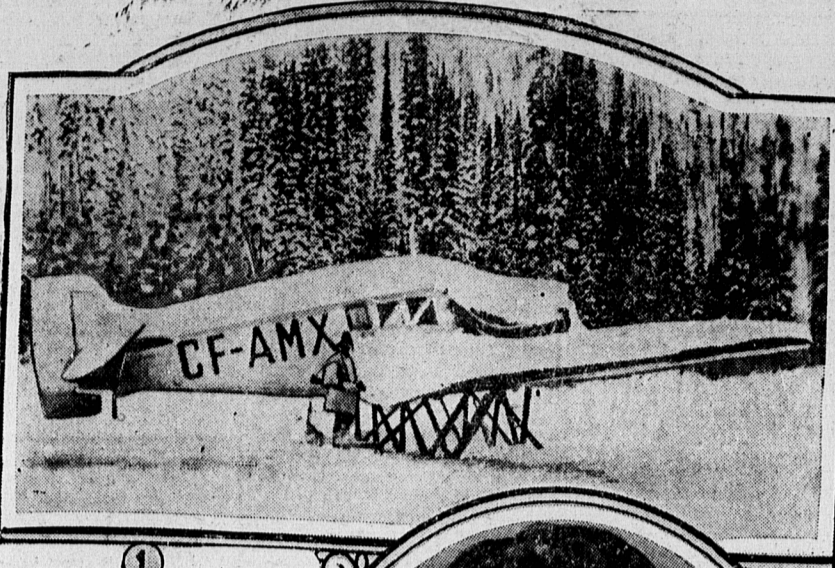


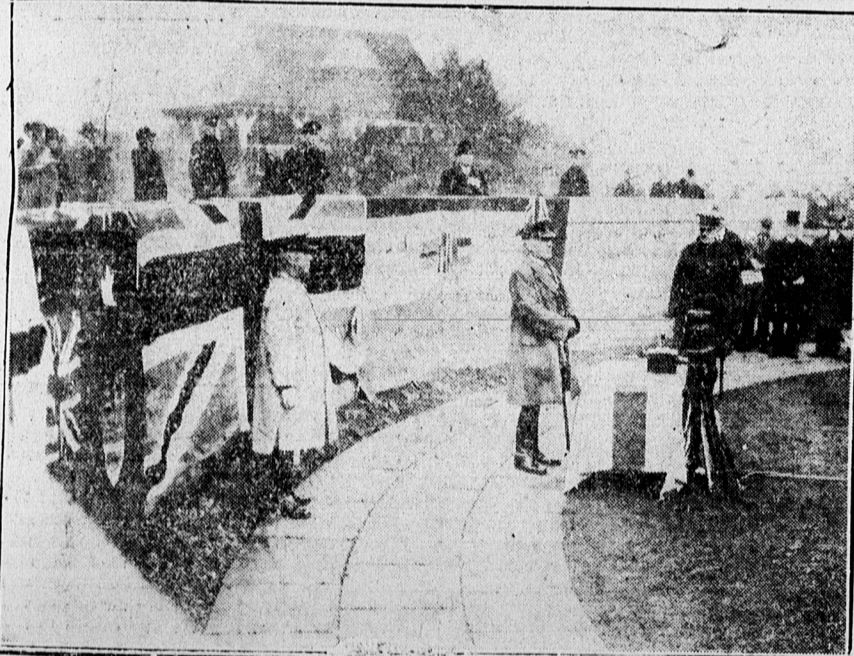

Feeding The Oyster



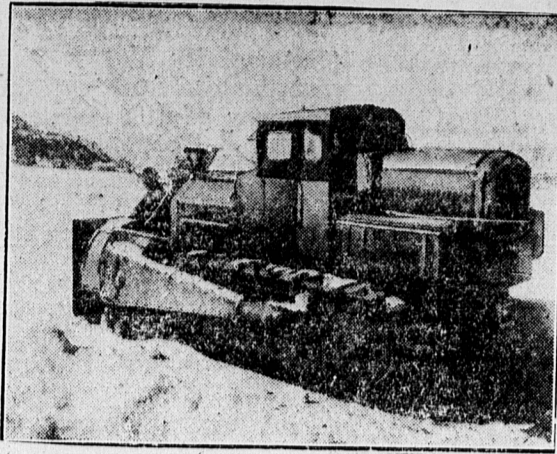

Powerful Snow Plow



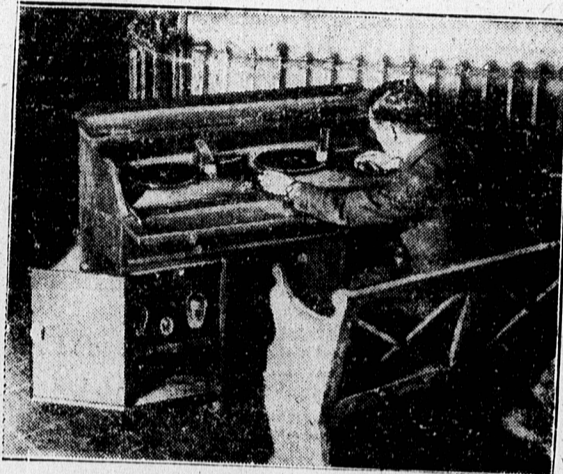

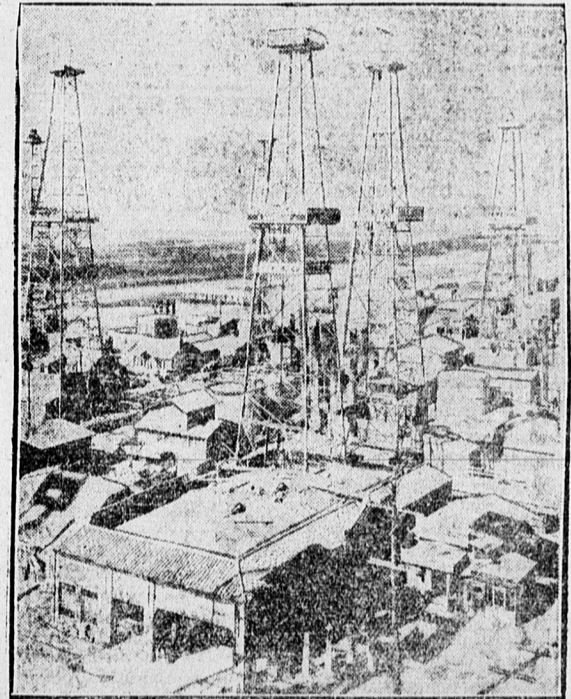
