MARKET GOSSIP

MONTEAL, Que., April 3—After a forenoon attempt to absorb offerings the market turned down in sympathy with a break in United States Smelting which dipped to a new low on its current down wing. While yesterday's action is not entirely satisfactory, selling pressure was not severe and does not reverse the trend which may still be regarded as moderately bullish, with probabilities favoring another attempt to advance prices from the current level. Oil continues to act decidedly better than average and may be picked up on all reactions. Buys—Con Oil, Texas Corp and Seaboard Oil. Yesterday secondary gold shares maintained the improved tone shown on Monday. San Antonio was exceedingly heavy while the senior golds weakened moderately. The latter division, however, still shows effective buying support during periods of reaction. Gold shares are likely to experience some further selling of moderate proportions before they rise in a position to resume the advance. Banon.

BANON'S 'NOON LETTER'
MONTEAL, Que., April 3—This morning's extreme dullness at prices indicates suggests that no material reaction should occur. Some further irregularity, however, is likely on the resumption of the advance. Reports indicate that business is holding fairly well. BARRING LETTER
Tuesday Afternoon
NEW YORK, N. Y., April 3—Disappointment over failure of Supreme Court to render its decision in Pension Law caused rally to lose most of what they had gained yesterday. I think the decision will be favorable and help the rally more than the rate decision did. What would help still more would be an announcement from Washington that the Administration will concentrate more on recovery and less on reform. Am. Power 7 per cent pd sold near 17 1/2, the 6 per cent pd sold near 14 1/2 up 2 points and both will sell much higher. Air Reduction sold at 12 1/2, equal to 11 1/2 with the dividend where it is up exactly 10 points since recommended about 2 weeks ago. For the time being it is good enough. North American still recommended above 20. Phillip Morris, still expect to see it considerably higher before losing over 2 1/2 points. Low—can still be bought. The industrial averages closed at 101. They might react near 90, but above the middle of this month they should start up and go above 110. Baring.

(Canadian Press) MONTEAL, April 3—Butter prices were weaker on the Montreal dairy market today, while other lines held unchanged. No 1 regraded butter brought 22 1/2 to 23 cents a pound for solids and 25 cents for prints. The egg market remained easier, graded shipments in cartons or less bringing 18 cents a dozen for a large, 15 to 15 1/2 cents for a medium and 16 cents for A pullets, B and C. Cheese continued at 11 1/2 to 11 3/4 cents a pound for no. 1 Ontario full make, and a cent higher for summer lines. Quebec no 2 white potatoes in 50 pound bags brought 45 to 50 cents with Quebec mountains at 55 to 60 cents and New Brunswick cobbler the same. New Brunswick mountains sold for 50 to 55 cents and Prince Edward Island mountains at 45 to 50 cents.
