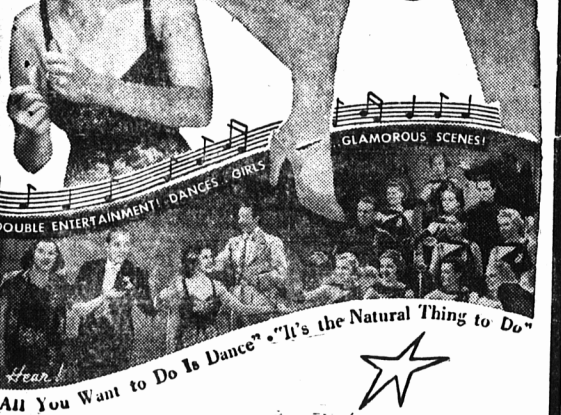

COMMUNITY AND INDIVIDUAL HEALTH INVESTMENTS PAY LARGE DIVIDENDS

Many years ago an older brother came home with the news that a new remedy had been found to relieve the pain of rheumatism. A neighbor was now free from pain thanks to this new medicine the name of which was salicylic acid. The only thought at that time was a medicine to cure the pain; no thought was given to trying to find the cause of rheumatism because rheumatism had always been found in man.

To-day one of the hopeful signs of the times is that not only do physicians want to know why pain or other symptom is present, but the patients themselves question the physician and read and seek other means of learning the cause of their symptoms.

There are still, however, a large number of individuals who are satisfied to take a remedy for headache, stomach ache, rheumatism, diarrhoea or constipation because a friend or acquaintance has recommended this particular remedy. Now these remedies are often helpful and many patent medicines are advertised in our medical journals because their contents are known and the manufacturing druggist is considered reliable. Some physicians become annoyed with patients who have allowed symptoms to continue for days, weeks, or even months, using patent medicines and the remedies suggested by friends, before consulting their physician.

What is really the real or important need of our day? The Surgeon General of the United States Public Health Service, Dr. Thomas Parran, in *Public Health* and *Community Health* says that the best paying investment of all securities is Community Health. This means that by all and every means the simple but true facts of health should be made known to everybody.

"No variety of want is more individual, none strikes with a more uneven hand than illness. The illness of the breadwinner, the disability of a mother, the falling health of children, these present problems which must be met by neighbors with the personal understanding of the whole community."

The thought then is that individual health and community health is the biggest asset of the individual and the community, and all expense and thought invested in community health pays a bigger dividend than any other investment.

CLERGYMEN ARE BARRLED FROM N. B. HOUSE

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire) New Brunswick doesn't want clergymen in its Legislature, but any minister who seeks a direct hand in legislation elsewhere in Canada may try for election in any of the eight other provinces or run for the House of Commons. An old clause barring clergymen from membership was retained Saturday by the New Brunswick Legislature in considering a proposed new Elections Act survey by The Canadian Press found Ministers of the Gospel in the Legislatures of Ontario and Alberta and the House of Commons. In several other provinces they have run for office in the past but none are now sitting.

Ontario's clergymen are Rev. Daniel McIvor (Ld. Port William), United Church; Rev. Ernest G. Hansell, S.C. MacLeod, Christian Church; and Rev. Thomas C. Douglas, C.C.F., Weyburn, Baptist.

Alberta's Legislature leads the list with six, all Social Crediters. They are Hon. N. E. Tanner, Minister of Lands and Mines, and Hon. Solon Low, Provincial Treasurer, both school teachers by profession but bishops in the Church of Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints; Rev. Peter Dawson, Speaker, and Rev. Roy Taylor, deputy speaker, both United Church; Rev. W. A. Wingblade (Wetaskiwin), Baptist; and Rev. I. M. McCune (Gleichen), Church of the Brethren.

Test Flights Of T. C. A. Planes

MONTREAL, Que., April 11—First test flights of the first two of the 10 Lockheed L-14 monoplane ordered by the Trans-Canada Air Lines will be made tomorrow (Tuesday) at Burbank, Calif. Members of the T. C. A. personnel will be present to witness the flights and to pilot the planes to Vancouver as soon as they are satisfied with the tests. The new planes will have accommodation for eleven passengers and a crew of three and will have a cargo capacity of 2,700 pounds, with 250 miles an hour at top speed and cruising speed up to 220 they will be able to provide flight schedules as rapid as anything across the continent. They have a fuel capacity of 534 gallons and a cruising range of 1,570 miles. Each plane has two Pratt and Whitney Hornet engines. Fully loaded, the planes will weigh 17,500 pounds. Wing span is 65 feet six inches, wing area 551 square feet, and overall length 44 feet four inches.
