Much discussion has lately taken place in this Province as to the advisability of growing alfalfa. The Farmer's Advocate says:--The growing of alfalfa is at present rather a vexed question. As a rule, when seeding with grass seed for hay, the planter expects to pasture the meadow after the hay is taken off. Alfalfa is unquestionably one of the best pasture crops grown, furnishing a large amount of exceedingly nutritious feed. It should not, however, be grown alone for pasture, as it is liable to cause bloating--rather more liable than clover. In a mixture with grasses, it is quite safe. The danger of injury to alfalfa by pasturing has been somewhat overestimated by some speakers. It is true that pasturing, especially in the autumn, is rather hard on alfalfa, and may injure the stand, if it does not lead to outright winter-killing. For this reason, it is extremely unwise to graze alfalfa, or to graze and give place to white clover and grass. It is so valuable while it lasts that it should be omitted from no permanent pasture mixture on reasonably well-drained soils. The disadvantage of growing it is almost certain to become over-mature and woody before the hay is cut.

Prince Edward Island riflemen may be interested to learn that the Overseas Edition of the "Daily Mail" has, with the assistance of several Rifle Clubs and Associations in different parts of the world, inaugurated an Inter-Colonial Empire Day Rifle Competition to be shot on May 24th and on succeeding Empire Days. The contest has aroused lively interest in all parts of the Empire and already some 85 Rifle Associations have signified their intention of competing. Canada will be represented by no less than 40 teams from all parts of the Dominion from British Columbia to Nova Scotia; while entries have also been made from Newfoundland, the Channel Islands, India, Strait Settlements, British West Indies, Cape Colony, Natal, Rhodesia, Uganda, British Honduras, Australia and New Zealand. It is anticipated that before May 24 every section of the British Empire will be represented. A fifty guinea challenge cup will be presented by the Overseas "Daily Mail," Carmelite House, London, England. Messages of approval of the scheme have been received from Field-Marshal Lord Roberts, Field-Marshal Sir Evelyn Wood, General Sir John French and Major-General Lord Chelmsford. Lord Roberts has written thus concerning the movement: "Anything that tends to draw closer the ties that unite the Colonies to each other and to the Mother-country should be encouraged, more especially a Competition like this where the weapon is one the attainment of skill in the use of which by all good citizens will do so much to strengthen the defence of the Empire. I wish the Competition may be enlarged year by year." The conditions of the contest are as follows:--Ranges--200, 500 and 600 yards. Rounds--The sighting shot at each range. Seven scoring shots. Position--Any with head to target. Team--Eight highest scores on day of the match to count as team.
