COUNTING HEADS IN THE BRITISH EMPIRE

LONDON, April 1.—The British Empire is undergoing the process of having its population enumerated by the Government. Tomorrow night has been appointed for the head of every house in the United Kingdom to fill in the census returns, accounting for every soul under his roof. Institutions and establishments holding more than 100 inmates, including prisons and asylums, are specially enumerated, while the War Office and Admiralty are responsible for furnishing the statistics concerning the army and navy respectively.

The census this year is the fifth Imperial census and the twelfth that has been taken of the United Kingdom in decennial periods. The 1901 census showed the population of the Empire to be 396,294,152, a substantial growth from 1891.

themselves, and since the census does not permit of any guesswork, the population of the Empire will go into the official records several hundred thousand under its full strength.

The work in Canada is, of course, under the supervision of the Dominion Government, which pays its army of enumerators a small sum for every name collected. It will occupy about one month to complete the count in Canada, except in some of the more difficult districts of the West and British Columbia. It is thought the results will be ready for publication, however, by the middle of summer. The census figures for the Dominion are awaited with especial interest, for it is believed that Canada will show by far the greatest proportional increase in population of any part of the Empire.

In the British Isles the task of taking the census falls to the Local Government Board. The Registrar-General, for carrying out the work has an army of superintendent registrars and enumerators. To encourage the choice of the best enumerators a bonus is offered, which pays to an honest care in selection and supervision. Women are eligible equally with men, but preference is given to the officials of the various local authorities, civil servants, or pensioned police officers.

This week the schedules were left at every house by the enumerators in their respective districts and will be collected Monday. The returns, after examination and revision by the local registrars, are transmitted to the census office at Millbank. The whole of the census office staff on Monday, 1, and a week later all other documents will be safely housed at Millbank, and the work of preparing the preliminary report begun.

Special steps have been taken to make the enumerator's task as easy as possible. This year the Jewish authorities, for instance, have circularized their members, and in the public elementary schools the teachers have given lessons on the census and the filling up of schedules.

This year's schedule differs in some material particulars from that of 1901. It is more compact, and the columns set apart for particulars as to marriage, and in the occupation column information is required as to the industry with which the occupation is allied.

The question of age is one of the most delicate and troublesome points in regard to the taking of the census. Women who are no longer very young and not yet very old have a traditional and unconquerable objection to saying exactly how old they are. One curious result is that the number of women who return themselves as aged 20 to 25 exceeds at every census the number of girls returned as from 10 to 15 at the previous census. A certain number of women householders, though deterred by fear of a fine from absolutely refusing information, adopt the expedient of sending their answers by proxy to the Registrar-General, hoping in this way at least from the eye of any neighbor, even from the confidential enumerator. It never occurs to any of these women, apparently, to adopt a really effective method of undertaking their duty. In the case of an enumerator herself. In that the census could not prelude to a new tax. In India the counting is particularly difficult, for there questions of caste mysteriously obtrude. On the occasion of the last census it was said that hundreds of thousands of Mussulmans and Hindus hid themselves in the forest all night rather than be counted. No doubt similar difficulties will again present themselves.

DREADNOUGHT LAUNCHED

LONDON, March 30.—The super-dreadnought Monarch was successfully launched at Elewick to-day. Thousands cheered as the fifth of this type of British battleships took the waters.

Mrs. Lewis Harcourt, wife of the colonial secretary, christened it. The Monarch is the largest battleship ever built in the Tyne, and inaugurated a departure in ship construction, being launched with her boilers, funnels, bridges and other equipment already installed. She is of the same type and armament as the Thunderer, which was launched, and is 22,500 tons, and turbines of a total of 27,000 horsepower are expected to make a possible speed of 21 knots an hour.

THE SITUATION AT SPRINGHILL.

HALIFAX, April 3.—Some time ago an injunction was granted against Picketing at Springhill Mines, and a judgment was given against several miners for violating the rule. Appeal was taken by McDougall and others. Their appeal was dismissed with costs on Saturday, and they will now come before court for sentence. Court refused to stay any proceedings pending an appeal to the Privy Council.

SAYS CAMORRISTS CONTROLLED NAPLES

VITEBRO, Italy, March 30.—According to the revelations of Abbatemaggio, who is appearing as a witness against his former associates in the trial for murder, Naples is divided into fourteen Camorrist regions, each having its camorrist hierarchy. In every one of these regions a member of the organization is daily entrusted with the maintenance of order among those affiliated with the camorra. His powers and influence are greater than those of the police or carabinieri, as he is expected to denounce those who commit disorders and thus compromise the existence of the association, which is destined for more important enterprises.

The entire afternoon was taken up with the evidence submitted by Abbatemaggio at the various investigations, the counsel for the defence endeavoring to trap him into contradictions, but the witness maintained his composure and gave a good account of himself, energetically refuting their remarks.

Abbatemaggio said that shortly after the murder of Cuccolo, when he was in the company of Giovanni Rappi, the alleged treasurer of the camorra, he met the priest Vitozzi, who suggested that he might be suspected, should go frequenting to the Mimi Amare Cafe in order to give the police the impression that he was a frequenter of the place. It was in this inn that he alleged to have been communicated to Vitozzi, on bearing this statement by the witness, raised his hands and eyes and with a horrified expression exclaimed, turning toward the prisoner's cage: "If I had ever expected that Ericone was stained with such a monstrous crime, I would have delivered him myself to justice, saying to him: 'Bear the burden of your sins.'"

The tone of his voice was so melodramatic that all burst into laughter, Rappi appearing even more amused than the others.

Abbatemaggio swore that Vitozzi was an active member of the camorra, that he frequented the meetings of the organization, dressed as a layman and was particularly aggressive in helping to carry out the camorrist schemes.

FEAR DANISH SEARCH PARTY HAS PERISHED

COPENHAGEN, March 30.—Grave fears are entertained for Captain Ellmar Mikkelson and Engineer Iversen, who after having been rescued on the coast of East Greenland last year, party to search for traces of the lost explorer-Erichsen. An expedition will be sent to Shannon Island, where provisions were deposited in the hope of finding them there.

Five members of the Mikkelson expedition which was wrecked in the winter of 1909 on the coast of East Greenland were brought back to Norway last August. This expedition left Copenhagen on the Danish Arctic ship Alabama to search for the bodies of the members of Mylius Enrichsen's Greenland expedition who perished in November, 1907, while trying to return from the north coast of Greenland by way of the inland ice. After the rescue of the Mikkelson party, Captain Mikkelson and his engineer decided to renew the search for the bodies of Erichsen and his companions.
