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INDIAN CONGRESS APPROVES BRITAIN'S PLAN

BIG FOUR REMAIN IN DEADLOCK

Foreign Secretary Bevin Charges Russia Trying To Back Out Of Agreement

PARIS, July 6 (AP)—Foreign Secretary Bevin of Britain in a bitter debate Saturday night charged that Russia was trying to back out of her agreement to call a European peace conference July 29, American informants reported, and the Big Four ministers remained deadlocked for a second day.

The ministers adjourned their deadlocked session on Monday without having reached an agreement on how to convene the conference and without authorizing the issuing of invitations.

Mr. Bevin and State Secretary Byrnes of the United States both told foreign correspondents that they do not agree to his proposal that rules of procedure be imposed upon the peace party by the four-power foreign ministers.

In a 1-1/2-hour session, Mr. Bevin asserted that Russia appeared to be stalling the 21-power conference.

France and the United States had accepted all the other Soviet conditions.

British informants quoted Mr. Bevin as saying:

"Two days ago you agreed on the date of the peace conference."

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Cardinal Villeneuve Given Last Rites

New Cases To Come Before U.N. Council

NEW YORK, July 7 (AP)—The United Nations Security Council, which has been enjoying a lull for 10 days, may soon get four new cases including the explosive Palestine question.

Although the council has not acted in any of these cases, developments during the last few days have indicated that complete action will be taken shortly.

In addition to the Palestine question, the other three were: 1. A request from Siam that the council settle a French-Siam dispute over the boundaries between Siam and Indo-China.

2. A request from Argentina for a ruling on the ownership of the Falkland Islands, disputed by Argentina and Great Britain.

3. An Egyptian request for U. N. intervention in the event that the British and the United States troops from Egypt.

Latest demands that the Palestine question be taken up by the council came from the Communist party in Britain, and were seen by some as a hint in putting the matter back on the agenda.

Ask Prayers For Recovery

Extreme Unction Administered—Nature Of Illness Not Disclosed.

QUEBEC, July 7 (CP)—It was announced at the archbishop's palace tonight that last rites of the Roman Catholic Church have been administered to Cardinal Villeneuve, Archbishop of Quebec. The nature of the Cardinal's illness was not disclosed.

Mons. J. Omer Plante, Auxiliary Bishop of Quebec, asked that prayers be offered for the Cardinal's recovery.

The 62-year-old Cardinal recently returned to Quebec from a tour of the Maritime Provinces. He took part in religious celebrations there and word of his illness came as a surprise.

Cardinal Villeneuve was installed as Archbishop of Quebec in February, 1932, and was elevated to the Cardinalate the following year.

A brief announcement from the archbishop's palace said:

"His Eminence the Cardinal Archbishop was confined to his room and it was deemed wise to administer him the Extreme Unction procedure. Conservative Association members are being asked to pray for his recovery."

Prepare For Strike At Sydney Steel Plant

SYDNEY, N. S., July 7 (CP)—Preparations continued tonight for a general strike at the Dominion Steel and Coal Corporation's steel plant as final decision on the proposed work stoppage was expected July 12 when the national advisory committee of the United Steel Workers of America will confer in Hamilton.

The Sydney union executive has received a telegram from National Director Charles H. Millard, advising speedup in plans for the walkout. He urged that strike committees be lined up, preparations made for picket lines and that signs be made ready.

"Everything points to a strike," he said, urging that "all be prepared for work on the 12th."

The last general tie-up here was a "spontaneous walkout" in 1943 which lasted 14 days. The last major strike, however, was in 1925.

Of the steel plant's estimated payroll of \$500,000, about 4,200 are union members. However, practically all employees would be affected by a prolonged layoff.

Sees Growing Lawlessness In States

Crime Increase Greater Than In 1945, F.B.I. Director Says

WASHINGTON, July 7 (AP)—J. Edgar Hoover, director of the Federal Bureau of Investigation, said Saturday the United States is facing a potential army of 6,000,000 criminals and an ever increasing wave of lawlessness which is feeding the criminal ranks with a never ending supply of recruits.

"The crime increase so far this year is greater than the 12.4 per cent increase recorded for 1945. And every 20.1 seconds last year a serious crime was committed; every 64 minutes someone was raped, feloniously assaulted or slain."

Mr. Hoover stressed that the "vast army" of criminals "is 10 times greater in number than the number of students in our colleges and universities. And for every school teacher in America there are more than seven criminals."

He attributed the crime wave to "a recession of moral fortitude, laxity in parental control, lowered moral standards, social and economic conditions, and abuses and wrongs which are being perpetrated by the lawless."

"A lack of interest in the fundamentals of matrimony, in the proper rearing of children, is a cause for concern and is contributing to delinquency."

"The increase in crime, the F. B. I. director said, "is the prototyping of our parole system by the whims of the well-wishing mob which is clamoring for leniency."

"Men and women who should never be paroled are set free to prey on the public again."

Endorse Long Term Plan For Independence

Formation Of Constituent Assembly Will Now Be Proceeded With

BOMBAY, July 7 (CP)—Over-riding Socialist opposition and heeding the pleas of Mohandas K. Gandhi and other leaders, the delegate assembly of the All-India Congress approved today by a 224 to 51 vote the British cabinet mission's long-term plan for Indian independence.

The plan already had been endorsed by the Congress party's working committee, which submitted it to the assembly at an emergency two-day meeting here.

On Saturday Pandit Jawaharlal Nehru formally assumed leadership of the Congress Party and urged his followers to maintain intact "the weapon with which the nation has fought the Britishers all these years—the congress machinery."

Nehru, in his first address as Congress president, appealed for solidarity within the party.

"Now we stand on the doorstep of freedom," he said. "The British regime in India is beginning to end. This is the most delicate moment in India's history and we must be prepared to face new problems."

The British Cabinet mission's proposals include the creation of a constituent union of India and the election of a constituent assembly to draw a charter for Indian independence. Socialists demanded rejection of all the proposals.

One Socialist speaker, Mrs. Aruna Saf Ali, addressed Gandhi, declaring "we have followed you for the last 25 years and it is time for you to follow us."

Gandhi, spiritual leader of the dominantly Hindu party, said:

"The British have assured us of their sincerity and I see no reason to doubt their sincerity. There may be some defects in the British plan but it is up to us to make it right through our efforts."

As a result of the action the constituent assembly will proceed now with formation of the constituent assembly. The Muslim League chief minister of the Congress Party, has already approved the British plan.

As there were no further nominations, Mr. MacKenzie was declared to be unopposed.

Criminal Attack On New Brunswick Girl

LAWRENCE, Mass., July 7 (CP)—A story told by an 18-year-old girl who recently arrived from New Brunswick, being lured into a graveyard and criminally attacked by four men, brought about the arrest of two suspects today.

Although badly beaten and repeatedly attacked, the girl caught a glimpse of the registration number of the car used by her abductors.

Taken into custody after investigation by police were Charles Mansour, 20, a taxi driver, and George Karamouropoulos, 21, a welder. They were charged with rape.

Police identified the victim as Pauline Leger, who came here recently from St. Joseph's, N. B., and was staying at the home of friends.

The girl, who was working in a Lawrence shoe factory, told police she was walking along the street Friday evening when one of the suspects spoke to her, suggesting she might like to have some ice cream. She said she accepted and instead was taken to a nearby cafe and ordered beer.

After leaving the man led her into the Bellevue cemetery before she realized it. As she protested and attempted to turn back, three men leaped out from behind her and threw her to the ground, threatening to kill her if she cried out.

She was attacked in turn by her escort and two of the other men, the girl charged.

Following the attack, a taxi appeared "out of nowhere," the girl related, and she was forced to enter it with the men. The four men, she said, attacked her in the taxi. They later released her from the cab in Lawrence.

Victim Of Fire Never Identified

HARTFORD, Conn., July 7 (AP)—Two years ago Saturday a curly-headed blue-eyed little girl skipped off to a circus. Today she lies in a lime grave in Wilson, marked only by the number "1509."

No one claimed the little girl, who with 167 others, died in the catastrophic Ringling Brothers and Barnum and Bailey circus fire in Hartford, although all of her features were distinguishable.

Clear Up Mystery Of Finding Bones

Tracing of the automobile revealed the three were Harry McKinney, Brockville mercantile business station, was a relative of Mr. Saev, and Miss Elizabeth Coniff of Rochester, N. Y., a friend of the deceased.

Budget Debate Begins Today

J.M. Macdonnell To Be Chief Financial Critic For The Opposition

OTTAWA, July 7 (CP)—Debate on the budget begins Monday with J.M. Macdonnell (PC-Muskoka-Ontario) taking the floor as chief financial critic for the official progressive Conservative opposition.

Mr. Macdonnell has indicated that he will criticize the Government for failing to cut expenditures sufficiently to permit further reductions in taxes than forecast in Finance Minister Lyle's budget speech June 27.

The opposition has indicated that it will charge the Government with failing to provide the tax relief necessary to provide the peak production called for by Mr. Lyle.

100 Millions For Canadian Treasury

OTTAWA, July 7 (CP)—The Federal Amalgamated Co. Ltd., a crown-owned company which stocked Canada's wartime merchant ships, has announced that it will contribute \$100,000,000 to the Canadian treasury more than \$100,000,000 in net earnings, it was announced Friday by the reconstruction department.

Its wartime fleet is rapidly diminishing through sales to private operators, but Reconstruction Minister Howe recently estimated it would take two or three years to liquidate its obligations.

LONDON, July 7 (AP)—Sir Oswald Mosley last night described as "fantastic nonsense" the question publicly raised by Author H. G. Wells: Was the British family "involved" in any payment of Italian funds to Mosley's British Fascist union?

The wealthy baronet told a reporter:

"Wells has always disliked the Royal Family. He has always disliked me. Now he has got his hatreds muddled. The Royal Family had no connection with the fascist movement or, so far as I know, with politics of any kind."

Destructive Fire In Quebec Town

SHERBROOKE, Que., July 7 (CP)—Six homes, two general stores, a convent, garage and service station were destroyed and 40 persons were left homeless by fire that caused an estimated \$30,000 damage in the town of Kateville, yesterday.
